A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that at least a dozen
- 2 states have enacted laws that recognize American Sign Language,
- 3 or ASL, as a distinct language with its own cultural heritage
- 4 and language rules and structure. Act 152, Session Laws of
- 5 Hawaii 2016, which recognized ASL as a world language for public
- 6 school language requirement purposes, was an important first
- 7 step, and this Act will advance the understanding and
- 8 acknowledgement that ASL is a discrete language and not merely
- 9 signed English.
- 10 The purpose of this Act is to recognize ASL as a fully
- 11 developed, autonomous, natural language with its own grammar,
- 12 syntax, vocabulary, and cultural heritage.
- 13 SECTION 2. Chapter 1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
- 14 by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to
- 15 read as follows:
- 16 "<u>§1- American sign language</u>. American sign language is
- 17 recognized as a fully developed, autonomous, natural language
