## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE HAWAII STATE COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN TO CONVENE A TASK FORCE TO STUDY MISSING AND MURDERED NATIVE HAWAIIAN WOMEN AND GIRLS.

WHEREAS, indigenous women and girls are victims of violence 1 at far greater rates than any other population in the United 2 3 States; and 4 WHEREAS, women and children in Hawaii are facing a 5 widespread epidemic of violence and sex trafficking; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, First Nations in Canada organized a mass movement 9 to expose the crisis of missing and murdered indigenous women and girls, which led to a national report and declaration of a 10 national emergency; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the Urban Indian Health Institute published the 13 report "Murdered and Missing Indigenous Women and Girls: 14 Α snapshot of data from 71 urban cities in the United States" in 15 2018 to document the crisis of missing and murdered indigenous 16 women and girls in the United States; and 17 18 WHEREAS, this report did not include Hawaii or any 19 information on Native Hawaiian women and girls; and 20 21 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiian women as a group are more 22 23 economically vulnerable than Native Hawaiian men, earning on average eighty-three cents for every dollar a man makes, and 24 eighty cents for every dollar a Native Hawaiian man makes in 25 qeneral; and 26 27 WHEREAS, historical trauma through factors such as land 28 dispossession, exposure to sexual violence, incarceration, 29 cultural dislocation, racism, poverty, and ongoing inequities 30



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1 has increased the vulnerability of Native Hawaiian women and girls to sex trafficking and other forms of violent crimes; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, harmful colonial stereotypes have resulted in the 5 sexual fetishization of Native Hawaiian women; and 6 7 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiian women, girls, and members of the 8 lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer community 9 disproportionately experience factors that put them at high risk 10 of being victims of sex trafficking and being involved with the sex industry; and 11 12 WHEREAS, state government agencies are required by various 13 14 federal and state laws to tackle sex trafficking and collect data; and 15 16 17 WHEREAS, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs published the report "Haumea: Transforming the Health of Native Hawaiian 18 19 Women and Empowering Wahine Well-Being" in 2018; and 20 WHEREAS, the report did not include information relating to 21 arrests for human trafficking, commercial sex acts, or 22 involuntary servitude or data specific to the human trafficking 23 of Native Hawaiian women and girls; and 24 25 26 WHEREAS, the Hawaii State Commission on the Status of Women, in partnership with Arizona State University, surveyed 27 twenty-two sex trafficking victims and found that in 2018, 77.3 28 29 percent were Native Hawaiian; and 30 31 WHEREAS, the Hawaii State Commission on the Status of 32 Women, in partnership with Arizona State University, surveyed 33 sixty-four sex trafficking victims and found that sixty-four 34 percent were Native Hawaiian; and 35 WHEREAS, from 2017 to 2019, one out of every three child 36 37 sex trafficking victims reported to the Child Welfare Services 38 child sex trafficking hotline were Native Hawaiian, and ninetyfive percent were girls; and 39 40 41 WHEREAS, family members must often rely on alert mechanisms for missing children, including physical message boards at 42 stores and social media outlets; and 43 44



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WHEREAS, the State must listen to Native Hawaiians and 1 identifying ways to increase reporting on missing and murdered 2 Native Hawaiian women and girls; and 3 4 WHEREAS, five states have passed legislation to address the 5 6 missing and murdered indigenous women and girl crisis; now, 7 therefore. 8 9 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 10 of 2021, the Senate concurring, that the Hawaii State Commission 11 12 on the Status of Women is requested to convene a task force to conduct a study regarding missing and murdered Native Hawaiian 13 14 women and girls; and 15 16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to 17 comprise the following members or their designees: 18 (1)The Executive Director of the Hawaii State Commission 19 20 on the Status of Women, who shall serve as a co-chair of the task force; 21 22 (2) The Chief Executive Officer of the Office of Hawaiian 23 Affairs, who shall serve as a co-chair of the task 24 force; 25 26 (3) The Director of Health; 27 28 29 (4) The Director of Human Services; 30 31 (5) The Administrative Director of the Courts; 32 33 (6) The Attorney General; 34 35 (7) The Chair of the County Committee on the Status of Women of each respective county; and 36 37 38 (8) The Chief of Police of each respective county; and 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force also invite 41 representatives of the following organizations to serve on the task force: 42 43 Papa Ola Lokahi; 44 (1)
