

## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

- URGING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO ELEVATE HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE AND CULTURAL EDUCATION IN PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOLS BY EXPANDING ACCESS TO HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE AND CULTURAL CLASSES THAT FULFILL CORE REQUIREMENTS THROUGHOUT SECONDARY EDUCATION.
- 1 WHEREAS, article X, section 1, of the Hawaii State
  2 Constitution provides for the establishment of a statewide
  3 system of public schools; and
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- 5 WHEREAS, article X, section 4, of the Hawaii State 6 Constitution requires that the "State shall promote the study of 7 Hawaiian culture, history, and language" and "provide for a 8 Hawaiian education program consisting of language, culture, and 9 history in the public schools"; and 10
- WHEREAS, article XV, section 4, of the Hawaii State Constitution recognizes Hawaiian as an official language of the State; and
- WHEREAS, in 2019, the Hawaii Supreme Court held in Clarabal v. Dep't of Educ., 145 Hawaii 69 (2019), that the framers of the Hawaii State Constitution intended article X, section 4, to require the State to "provide a Hawaiian education program in public schools that is reasonably calculated to revive and preserve 'ōlelo Hawai'i"; and
- 22 WHEREAS, Chief Justice Recktenwald noted in his concurring 23 opinion in the *Clarabal* case that, "the framers emphasized the 24 importance of reviving 'ōlelo Hawai'i through the public 25 education system, in order to ensure that all children of the 26 State of Hawai'i have exposure to Hawaiian language, culture and 27 history"; and



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2 largest ethnic group in the State's public schools, at twenty-six percent of the student population, and deserve a 3 4 curriculum that is attentive to the perpetuation of their 5 culture and identity; and 6 7 WHEREAS, Hawaiian education benefits students of all ethnic 8 backgrounds by contributing to an understanding and appreciation of Hawaii's unique cultural and historical context; and 9 10 11 WHEREAS, Hawaiian education perpetuates the skills, knowledge, values, and practices of the native people of Hawaii 12 13 and offers innovative and place-based responses to the demands 14 of a rapidly changing world; and 15 16 WHEREAS, embracing an educational philosophy that honors 17 and promotes a native Hawaiian perspective can foster 18 multilingualism, multiculturalism, educational experience, and 19 whole-child development; and 20 21 WHEREAS, the 0.5 credit Modern Hawaiian History class is 22 currently the only core curriculum requirement at the high 23 school level dedicated to addressing article X, section 4, of 24 the Hawaii State Constitution; and 25 26 WHEREAS, the 1997 Hawaii State Legislature mandated the 27 establishment of a Hawaiian language college on the University of Hawaii campus to "...serve as a focal point for the State's 28 29 efforts to revitalize the Hawaiian language ... "; and 30 31 WHEREAS, within the limitations imposed upon it by its mandated resource base and structure, the Hawaiian language 32 33 college has a strong record of innovation and leadership in Hawaiian language and culture education which has drawn national 34 35 attention and which has provided considerable support to State Hawaiian education efforts in Department of Education and 36 Charter schools; and 37 38 39 WHEREAS, high school student participants in the 40 Twenty-Seventh Annual Children and Youth Summit identified the elevation of diverse Hawaiian education courses in public 41 42 schools as a priority for young people in Hawaii; now, 43 therefore, 44

WHEREAS, native Hawaiian students represent the single



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BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, the Senate concurring, that the Board of Education and Department of Education are urged to elevate Hawaiian language and cultural education in public high schools by expanding access to Hawaiian language and cultural classes that fulfill core requirements throughout secondary education; and 8

9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Education's 10 Office of Hawaiian Education is requested to identify public 11 school teachers who have received or would like to receive 12 training in Hawaiian language and culture to increase access to 13 Hawaiian content in secondary schools; and 14

15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education work in 16 partnership with the administration of the Hawaiian language 17 college to identify existing resources for Hawaiian language and 18 culture education for students in public and charter schools and 19 to integrate these resources into its teacher training for said 20 identified public school teachers; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education and Hawaiian language college submit their findings in the form of a report to the 2022 legislature one week before opening of the 2022 session; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Lieutenant
Governor, Chairperson of the Board of Education, Chancellor of
the University of Hawaii at Hilo, and Superintendent of
Education.

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
