A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE MEDICAID SUSTAINABILITY PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the healthcare system in the State faces major financial challenges in ensuring 2 access to guality healthcare for Hawaii residents due to the 3 coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic and related 4 5 financial and budgetary pressures. Additional federal funding to help financially sustain Hawaii's healthcare system and 6 medicaid program may be accessed through a provider fee. 7 Provider fees are used in forty-nine states and the 8 9 District of Columbia as a means of drawing down federal funds to 10 sustain state medicaid programs due to rising state budget 11 deficits, increasing health care costs, and expanding medicaid enrollment. Of these, sixteen states use health insurer 12 provider fees to draw down federal funds. 13

14 The legislature further finds that medicaid is jointly 15 financed by federal and state governments by statutory formula. 16 The federal government pays between fifty per cent and seventy-17 four per cent of medicaid costs incurred by a state for care



delivered to its medicaid beneficiaries. Federal assistance
 percentages vary by state, with states that have lower per
 capita incomes receiving higher federal matching rates. Under
 federal rules, the state share must be paid through public funds
 that are not federal funds.

6 Provider fees, which are collected from specific categories
7 of health care providers, may be imposed on different classes of
8 health care services, including the revenue of health insurers.

9 The legislature also finds that, in Hawaii, a medicaid 10 sustainability fee assessed on health insurers would help 11 guarantee access to critical medicaid benefits, such as 12 supportive housing, behavioral health, vaccinations, preventive 13 health, primary care, and home- and community-based services at 14 a time when constraints on the State's budget due to the 15 COVID-19 pandemic may force reductions in payments. As such, 16 the provider fee would help preserve access to health care for 17 the medicaid population, which would benefit health insurers in 18 the State. Medicaid coverage helps reduce uncompensated care 19 costs that lead to higher costs for health care insurance 20 premiums. Medicaid helps sustain the State's entire healthcare 21 system as a whole.

16	cited as the "Medicaid Sustainability Program Act". '
17	§ -2 Findings and declaration of necessity. It is the
18	intent of the legislature to establish a medicaid sustainability
19	program that would assess a medicaid fee on health insurers,
19 20	program that would assess a medicaid fee on health insurers, establish a special fund within the state treasury to receive

by the department, and use the revenue from the fee and
 associated federal medicaid matching funds to fund healthcare
 services covered under medicaid and for other purposes as set
 forth in this chapter.

5 S -3 Definitions. As used in this chapter:
6 "Department" means the department of human services.
7 "Fiscal year" means a twelve-month period from July 1 of a
8 particular calendar year to June 30 of the following calendar
9 year, inclusive.

10 "Health insurer" means a self-insured plan, a group health 11 plan as defined in section 607(1) of the Employee Retirement 12 Income Security Act of 1974, a health service benefit plan, a mutual benefit society, a health maintenance organization, a 13 14 managed care organization, or other party that is, by statute, 15 contract, or agreement, legally responsible for payment of a claim for a health care item or service. "Health insurer" does 16 17 not include not-for-profit health plans.

18 "Member month" means the total number of individuals for 19 whom the health insurer has recognized revenue for one month. 20 If revenue is for only part of a month for an individual, a 21 prorated partial member month may be counted. Member months do

(a) Effective S 8 July 1, 2021, or the effective date of any necessary federal 9 approvals, whichever date is later, the department shall charge 10 and collect provider fees, to be known as the medicaid 11 sustainability fee, on health insurers. 12 The medicaid sustainability fee shall be based on the (b) 13 number of member months of health insurers located within this 14 State, during the year ending December 31 of the preceding year. 15 The department shall assess fees based on four tiers (C) 16 of member months as follows: 17 (1)Tier one is more than zero up to 75,000 member months; 18 (2)Tier two is more than 75,000 up to 375,000 member 19 months; 20 Tier three is more than 375,000 up to 500,000 member (3) 21 months; and

(4) Tier four is more than 500,000 up to 4,000,000 member

3 (d) The department shall adopt rules on the medicaid
4 sustainability fees. The fees may be assessed up to \$12 for
5 tier one per medicaid member month and up to \$15 for tier two
6 per medicaid member month; and up to \$1.00 for tier one per non7 medicaid member month.

8 (e) The department may modify the fees assessed for the 9 medicaid sustainability program; provided that the modification 10 is necessary to obtain federal waiver approval consistent with 11 the requirements of 42 Code of Federal Regulations section 12 433.68(e)(2).

13 S -6 Medicaid sustainability fee assessments. (a) 14 Health insurers shall pay the medicaid sustainability fee to the 15 department in accordance with this chapter. The fee shall be 16 divided and paid in twelve equal installments on a monthly 17 basis.

(b) The department shall collect, and each health insurer
shall pay, the medicaid sustainability fee not later than the
thirtieth day after the end of each calendar month.

S -7 Federal approval. The department shall seek
 waivers and any additional approvals from the Centers for
 Medicare and Medicaid Services that may be necessary to
 implement the medicaid sustainability program.

5 S -8 Penalties for failure to pay the medicaid 6 sustainability fee. If a health insurer fails to pay the full 7 amount of any medicaid sustainability fee when due, the health 8 insurer shall pay a penalty equal to prime, plus two per cent, 9 of the fee that was not paid when due. Any subsequent payments 10 shall be credited first to unpaid fee amounts, beginning with 11 the most delinquent installment, rather than to the penalty or 12 interest amounts. The department may waive the penalties of 13 this section for reasonable cause.

14 -9 Special designation of medicaid sustainability S 15 program special fund. Notwithstanding section 37-53, and any 16 law or any administrative rule to the contrary, the specific 17 purposes set out in section -4(c) are established as being 18 the exclusive uses of the medicaid sustainability program 19 special fund. The medicaid sustainability program special fund 20 shall not be used for any other purposes, notwithstanding any 21 authority granted to the governor or any other state official by

1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 2 of human services for the purposes of this Act. 3 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 4 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 5 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050, and 6 shall be repealed on December 31, 2023; provided that 7 section -4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, in section 2 of this Act 8 and sections 3 and 4 of this Act shall be repealed on June 30, 9 2024.
