## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The complete streets law, codified as
2	section 264-20.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires the
3	department of transportation and the county transportation
4	departments to adopt a complete streets policy that seeks to
5	reasonably accommodate convenient access and mobility for all
6	users of the public highways within their respective
7	jurisdictions, including pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users
8	motorists, and persons of all ages and abilities.
9	The legislature finds that clarification of the complete
10	streets policy is necessary to ensure its proper implementation
11	and effectiveness.
12	The purpose of this Act is, in part, to:
13	(1) Require the department of transportation to submit an
14	annual report to the legislature detailing compliance
15	with the complete streets policy and principles;
16	(2) Require the department of transportation to establish
17	and publish performance standards with measurable

1		benchmarks reflecting the capacity for all users to
2		travel safely and conveniently along state roadways;
3	(3)	Require that the complete street policies of the State
4		apply to new construction, reconstruction, repaving,
5		operations, and maintenance activities;
6	(4)	Require the department of transportation to create a
7		complete streets policy checklist for each project and
8		post the checklist on its website; and
9	(5)	Require the counties to consider complete street
10		policies when adopting or amending land use
11		ordinances.
12	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 264, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended by	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated
14	and to re	ad as follows:
15	" <u>§</u> 26	4- Ground transportation infrastructure project
16	planning,	design, and implementation. When planning, designing,
17	and imple	menting ground transportation infrastructure, the
18	departmen	t of transportation shall consider and pursue goals for
19	each proj	ect that:
20	(1)	Assess and maximize the total throughput of persons
21		using all modes of transportation;

- 1 State for the establishment of bikeways; provided that bikeways
- 2 shall be established, whenever practicable, wherever a new or
- 3 existing highway, road, or street is being designed, planned,
- 4 constructed, reconstructed, relocated, or rehabilitated. At
- 5 least [two] five per cent of eligible federal funds $[\tau]$  based on
- 6 a three-year average, and in addition, other state highway fund
- 7 moneys as available, shall be expended to:
- 8 (1) Establish multi-use paths, bicycle paths, and bicycle
- 9 lanes; and
- 10 (2) Install signage and safety devices along bikeways;
- 11 provided that the department of transportation shall include the
- 12 bicycling community in a public involvement process to determine
- 13 the location of multi-use paths, bicycle paths, bicycle lanes,
- 14 and installation of signage and safety devices along bikeways.
- 15 Planning for any mass transit system shall include
- 16 appropriate accommodation for bicycle lanes, bikeways, and
- 17 bicycle routes, including bicycle racks on mass transit
- 18 vehicles, to enable mass transit users to connect conveniently
- 19 by bicycle to transit stations and bus stops.
- This subsection shall not be construed as requiring the
- 21 expenditure of a county surcharge on state tax under

- 1 section 46-16.8[7] on bicycle paths if the application of this
- 2 subsection conflicts with section 46-16.8."
- 3 SECTION 4. Section 264-20.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 4 amended to read as follows:
- 5 "[+]\$264-20.5[+] Complete streets. (a) The department of
- 6 transportation and the county transportation departments shall
- 7 adopt a complete streets policy that seeks to reasonably
- 8 accommodate convenient access and mobility for all users of the
- 9 public highways within their respective jurisdictions as
- 10 described under section 264-1, including pedestrians,
- 11 bicyclists, transit users, motorists, and persons of all ages
- 12 and abilities.
- (b) This section shall apply to new construction,
- 14 reconstruction, and maintenance of highways, roads, streets,
- 15 ways, and lanes located within urban, suburban, and rural areas,
- 16 if appropriate for the application of complete streets.
- 17 (c) This section shall not apply if:
- 18 (1) Use of a particular highway, road, street, way, or
- lane by bicyclists or pedestrians is prohibited by
- 20 law, including within interstate highway corridors;

1	(2)	The costs would be excessively disproportionate to the
2		need or probable use of the particular highway, road,
3		street, way, or lane;
4	(3)	There exists a sparseness of population, or there
5		exists other available means, or similar factors
6		indicating an absence of a future need; or
7	(4)	The safety of vehicular, pedestrian, or bicycle
8		traffic may be placed at unacceptable risk.
9	(d)	On or before December 31, 2021, and on or before
10	December	31 of each year thereafter, the director of
11	transport	ation shall submit to the legislature a report
12	detailing	compliance with the complete streets policy and
13	principle	s during the preceding fiscal year. The report shall
14	<u>include:</u>	
15	(1)	A list of transportation facilities and projects
16		initiated during that fiscal year as well as the
17		complete streets features incorporated therein;
18	(2)	<pre>Exceptions made under subsection (c);</pre>
19	(3)	Beginning July 1, 2023, measurable performance
20		standards and benchmarks, as established in
21		conjunction with the Moving Ahead for Progress in the

1		21st Century Act process applicable to each project;
2		and
3	(4)	Problems and suggested solutions and recommendations
4		to improve the process.
5	<u>(e)</u>	The department of transportation shall establish and
6	publish p	erformance standards with measurable benchmarks
7,,,	reflecting	g the capacity for all users of the public highways to
8	travel wi	th appropriate safety and convenience along roadways
9	under the	jurisdiction of the State.
10	<u>(f)</u>	The department of transportation shall ensure that:
11	(1)	The State's complete streets policy applies to new
12		construction, reconstruction, repaving, operations,
13		and maintenance activities; and
14	(2)	A complete streets policy checklist of duties of the
15		department of transportation is published in
16		accordance with section 1-28.5. The complete streets
17		policy checklist shall apply from initial planning
18		through final design, construction, and operation for
19		all new construction, reconstruction, and repaving
20		surface transportation initiatives. The complete
21		streets policy checklist shall be updated from time to

1		time as necessary to facilitate the implementation of
2		the complete streets policy. The complete streets
3		policy checklist with accompanying documentation shall
4		become a public record and shall be accessible on the
5		department of transportation's website within sixty
6		days of completion of the checklist and accompanying
7		documentation.
8		As used in this paragraph, "complete streets
9		policy checklist" refers to a tool to collect data and
10		information about the status of the roadway and the
11		surrounding area, as well as the details of the
12		transportation facility or project, with a goal of
13		identifying specific elements that can be incorporated
14		to support and balance the needs of all users.
15	<u>(g)</u>	In adopting or amending land use ordinances, the
16	counties	shall consider complete street policies to ensure that:
17	(1)	A context-sensitive and multi-modal approach is
18		considered in ordinances;
19	(2)	Consideration is given to allow flexibility in the
20		zoning requirements; and

1	(3) Other factors specific to the community are considered
2	when:
3	(A) The application of this section conflicts with
4	the context of the particular community; or
5	(B) A land use ordinance conflicts with the
6	principles of complete streets."
7	SECTION 5. The director of transportation shall provide
8	training for the department of transportation's maintenance
9	staff in complete streets policies, principles, and
10	implementation procedures that may be applicable to the
11	performance of their duties.
12	SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
13	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
14	SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on May 6, 2137.

#### Report Title:

Transportation; Department of Transportation; Complete Streets Law; Complete Streets Policy; Training; Counties

### Description:

Requires the department of transportation to report on the complete streets policy and principles. Requires the department of transportation to establish standards relating to safe travel along state roadways and a complete streets checklist. Requires the director of transportation to provide training for maintenance staff in complete street policies, principles, and implementation procedures. Requires counties to consider complete street policies when adopting or amending land use ordinances. Effective 5/6/2137. (HD2)
