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# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PROTECTIVE ORDERS.

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

1           SECTION 1. The legislature finds that promoting the safety  
2 of persons granted long-term protective orders is inherent in  
3 the objective of the orders. The legislature further finds that  
4 the current method by which protected individuals can prove the  
5 existence of an order is cumbersome. Protected individuals,  
6 including minors, are required to carry the nine-page document  
7 on their person at all times. Doing so is not only inconvenient  
8 but may quickly render the order illegible due to wear and tear.  
9           The legislature believes that a better alternative has been  
10 implemented in other states: the option to carry an  
11 identification card the size of a driver's license that provides  
12 all the information needed for law enforcement agencies to  
13 verify a long-term protective order's existence. The  
14 legislature finds that these types of cards, known as "hope  
15 cards", are durable, waterproof, and easily portable. The  
16 cards' functionality serves to increase the safety of the



1 persons protected by these orders by making it easy to carry  
2 proof of protection.

3       The Hawaii hope card program would be responsible for  
4 issuing hope cards to grantees of a long-term protective order,  
5 at a grantee's request, for the purpose of allowing law  
6 enforcement agencies to quickly verify the existence of, and  
7 more easily obtain information on, the long-term protective  
8 order. It is the legislature's intent that hope cards provide a  
9 more convenient method by which protected individuals can prove  
10 that a protective order is in place. The legislature does not  
11 intend that the cards replace the original protective orders  
12 granted by the court.

13       Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish a  
14 Hawaii hope card program within the department of the attorney  
15 general.

16       SECTION 2. Chapter 28, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended  
17 by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and to read  
18 as follows:

19                   "PART       .   HAWAII HOPE CARD PROGRAM



1           §28-       Hawaii hope card program. (a) There is  
2 established within the department of the attorney general the  
3 Hawaii hope card program.

4           (b) Any person who has been granted a long-term protective  
5 order may apply for a hope card from the department of the  
6 attorney general on a form prescribed by the department. After  
7 verifying the validity of the long-term protective order upon  
8 which the application is based, the department of the attorney  
9 general shall issue a hope card to the applicant; provided that  
10 duplicate hope cards may be issued to an applicant upon request  
11 as necessary, including in the following situations:

12           (1) For the applicant to provide the hope card to a school  
13 or employer;

14           (2) To enable use of the hope card by a child or other  
15 individual covered by the long-term protective order;  
16 or

17           (3) For the applicant to provide the hope card to a  
18 school, day care program, or other similar institution  
19 attended by a child or other individual covered by the  
20 long-term protective order.



1 (c) A hope card shall be similar in size and material to a  
2 Hawaii state driver's license; display a color photograph of the  
3 person to be restrained by the long-term protective order, if  
4 available and confirmed by the court issuing the long-term  
5 protective order; and contain essential information if provided  
6 within the long-term protective order, including:

- 7 (1) Identifying characteristics of the person to be  
8 restrained, including name, date of birth, sex, race,  
9 eye and hair color, height, weight, and any  
10 distinguishing features such as scars or tattoos;
- 11 (2) The case number and the issuing court of the long-term  
12 protective order;
- 13 (3) The issuance and expiration dates of the long-term  
14 protective order;
- 15 (4) Identifying characteristics of the applicant,  
16 including name, date of birth, sex, race, eye and hair  
17 color, height, and weight; and
- 18 (5) The names and birth dates of any children or other  
19 individuals who are also covered by the long-term  
20 protective order.



1 (d) Hope cards and duplicates shall be issued at no charge  
2 to applicants.

3 (e) For the purposes of this part, "long-term protective  
4 order" means a protective order that is to remain in effect for  
5 a period of more than ninety days under section 604-10.5, or for  
6 a period of more than one hundred eighty days under chapter 586.

7 **§28- Access to Hawaii hope card program information;**  
8 **verification.** (a) The Hawaii hope card program shall notify  
9 the Hawaii criminal justice data center when a hope card has  
10 been issued regarding a protective order. This information  
11 shall be made available to law enforcement personnel seeking to  
12 verify the validity of the hope card or its underlying  
13 protective order.

14 (b) Access authorized by this section may be provided in  
15 coordination with the Hawaii criminal justice data center  
16 established under chapter 846.

17 **§28- Prohibitions; penalty.** (a) No hope card  
18 applicant or program participant shall knowingly provide false  
19 information on an application.

20 (b) An applicant or program participant who violates this  
21 section shall be fined not more than \$500.



1           §28-        Rulemaking authority. The attorney general shall  
2 adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 as necessary to carry out the  
3 purposes of this part."

4           SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general  
5 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$                    or so  
6 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 and  
7 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal  
8 year 2022-2023 for the department of the attorney general to  
9 administer the Hawaii hope card program.

10           The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department  
11 of the attorney general for the purposes of this Act.

12           SECTION 4. No later than January 1, 2022, the department  
13 of the attorney general shall develop and implement the Hawaii  
14 hope card program established by section 2 of this Act.

15           SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on May 1, 2029.
