A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the University of
3	Hawaii cancer center reduces the burden of cancer through
4	research, education, patient care, and community outreach. The
5	University of Hawaii cancer center is the only National Cancer
6	Institute-designated cancer center in Hawaii and the Pacific
7	region. The University of Hawaii cancer center is a member of
8	the Hawaii Cancer Consortium along with five hospital groups and
9	the University of Hawaii's John A. Burns school of medicine.
10	The University of Hawaii's John A. Burns school of medicine
11	educates and trains health care professionals, including
12	physicians, biomedical scientists, and allied health workers.
13	The John A. Burns school of medicine also conducts fundamental
14	medical research and translates discoveries into delivery
15	practices. Because the John A. Burns school of medicine is a
16	community-based medical school without its own university

- 1 hospital, it partners with private hospitals in the community to
- 2 achieve its educational mission.
- 3 The legislature further finds that public funds and other
- 4 resources the State has made available to the John A. Burns
- 5 school of medicine and University of Hawaii cancer center have
- 6 been substantial. The magnitude of state funds and other
- 7 resources provided to the University of Hawaii, the distinction
- 8 of the University being the sole public institution of higher
- 9 education in the State, and the University of Hawaii cancer
- 10 center being the only National Cancer Institute-designated
- 11 cancer center in Hawaii underscore the importance of
- 12 establishing complementary strategic priorities and coordinating
- 13 the management and deployment of state resources appropriated to
- 14 the John A. Burns school of medicine and University of Hawaii
- 15 cancer center.
- 16 It is in the public's interest that State resources be
- 17 efficiently and effectively managed to optimize the public
- 18 benefits. Just as co-locating the physical facilities for the
- 19 John A. Burns school of medicine and University of Hawaii cancer
- 20 center on adjoining sites in Kakaako promotes synergistic
- 21 efforts, the legislature determines that it is a statewide

- 1 concern to ensure that the management of public resources
- 2 provided to the John A. Burns school of medicine and University
- 3 of Hawaii cancer center be integrated, coordinated, and focused
- 4 on common priorities to avoid unnecessary duplication of
- 5 administrative expenses or conflicting priorities.
- 6 The legislature additionally finds that placing resources
- 7 devoted to training and educating physicians and conducting
- 8 cancer research in an integrated university organizational
- 9 structure, as opposed to stand-alone and duplicative
- 10 organizations, will foster a uniform strategic vision. Unified
- 11 leadership will also allow better coordination with the
- 12 University of Hawaii's private partners in the hospital
- 13 community and with other state agencies.
- 14 The legislature also finds that as a matter of statewide
- 15 concern, the University of Hawaii cancer center should be more
- 16 closely affiliated with the John A. Burns school of medicine and
- 17 be administered as an organized research unit of the John A.
- 18 Burns school of medicine. Merging the John A. Burns school of
- 19 medicine and University of Hawaii cancer center's administrative
- 20 services and infrastructure teams will offer efficiency by

- 1 eliminating redundancy and sharing administrative expertise and
- 2 experience to reduce processing delays.
- 3 The legislature notes that several outstanding medical
- 4 schools at other universities integrate their cancer research
- 5 programs closely with their medical schools. For example, the
- 6 Washington University School of Medicine in Saint Louis is the
- 7 parent institution to the Siteman Cancer Center. The Siteman
- 8 Cancer Center is designated as a comprehensive cancer center and
- 9 holds an "exceptional" rating from the National Cancer
- 10 Institute. The MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, Texas is a
- 11 comprehensive cancer center and operates in close affiliation
- 12 with the McGovern Medical School as part of the University of
- 13 Texas Health Science Center at Houston.
- 14 The legislature also notes that from 2014 to 2016, the
- 15 University of Hawaii developed business plans, hired
- 16 consultants, and made presentations to its board of regents on
- 17 the University's plans to integrate the University of Hawaii
- 18 Kakaako health science campus and eliminate operational
- 19 redundancies between the John A. Burns school of medicine and
- 20 University of Hawaii cancer center. Further, the University of
- 21 Hawaii frequently groups different organized research units

1	within a	larger administrative structure. For example, the				
2	school of ocean and earth science and technology encompasses					
3	several outstanding research units, including the center for					
4	microbial oceanography: research and education and Hawaii					
5	institute of marine biology.					
6	To m	aintain the National Cancer Institute designation as a				
7	cancer ce	nter consistent with National Cancer Institute				
8	guidelines, the director of the University of Hawaii cancer					
9	center sh	all continue to have a direct line of reporting and				
10	accountab	ility to the provost of the University of Hawaii at				
11	Manoa.					
12	Acco	rdingly, the purpose of this part is to:				
13	(1)	Require the director of the University of Hawaii				
14		cancer center to be appointed by University of				
15		Hawaii's board of regents upon recommendation from the				
16		provost of the University of Hawaii at Manoa instead				
17		of the dean of the University of Hawaii's John A.				
18		Burns school of medicine;				
19	(2)	Require the University of Hawaii cancer center to be				
20		administratively affiliated with the John A. Burns				
21		school of medicine;				

1	(3)	Require the director of the University of Hawaii		
2		cancer center to report to the provost of the		
3		University of Hawaii at Manoa and coordinate with the		
4		president of the University;		
5	(4)	Require funds expended from or originating from the		
6		University of Hawaii tuition and fees special fund for		
7		the John A. Burns school of medicine or University of		
8		Hawaii cancer center to be used for educational		
9		purposes only; and		
10	(5)	Require funds expended from or originating from the		
11		research and training revolving fund for the John A.		
12		Burns school of medicine or University of Hawaii		
13		cancer center to be used for research and research-		
14		related purposes only.		
15	SECT	TION 2. Chapter 304A, part IV, Hawaii Revised Statutes,		
16	is amended by adding a new subpart to be appropriately			
17	designated and to read as follows:			
18		" . Cancer Research Center of Hawaii		
19	§30 4	A- Cancer research center of Hawaii. (a) There is		
20	establish	ed an organized research unit, hereinafter known as the		
21	cancer re	search center of Hawaii, to conduct cancer research.		

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- 1 The cancer research center of Hawaii shall be administered by a
- 2 director to be appointed by the board of regents upon
- 3 recommendation by the provost of the University of Hawaii at
- 4 Manoa with the concurrence by the president of the university.
- 5 The cancer research center of Hawaii shall be affiliated with
- 6 the John A. Burns school of medicine; provided that the director
- 7 of the cancer research center of Hawaii shall report to the
- 8 provost of the University of Hawaii at Manoa and coordinate with
- 9 the president of the university.
- 10 (b) The cancer research center of Hawaii's research agenda
- 11 shall focus on research, education, patient care, and community
- 12 outreach and reflect an understanding of the ethnic, cultural,
- 13 and environmental characteristics of the State and the Pacific
- 14 region.
- (c) The cancer research center of Hawaii may:
- 16 (1) Engage in international research collaborations;
- 17 (2) Undertake research studies and clinical trials; and
- 18 (3) Participate in projects and programs of the National
- 20 SECTION 3. Section 304A-2153, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 amended to read as follows:

1 "§304A-2153 University of Hawaii tuition and fees special 2 fund. (a) There is established the University of Hawaii 3 tuition and fees special fund into which shall be deposited all revenue collected by the university for regular, summer, and 5 continuing education credit tuition, tuition-related course and 6 fee charges, and any other charges to students, except as 7 provided by law. Moneys deposited into the fund shall be 8 expended to maintain or improve the university's programs and 9 operations and shall not be: 10 (1)Used as a justification for reducing any budget 11 request or allotment to the university unless the 12 university requests such a reduction; 13 (2) Transferred unless otherwise authorized by the legislature; and 14 15 (3) Restricted by the governor or the director of finance 16 without the prior approval of the legislature.

- Any rule, policy, or action of any agency or individual in contravention of this subsection shall be void as against public policy.
- 20 (b) Any law to the contrary notwithstanding, the board of 21 regents may authorize expenditures of up to \$3,000,000 annually,

4	(5)	Provide a financial summary of the operating			
5		activities of the University of Hawaii Foundation,			
6		including revenues and expenditures by major reporting			
7		categories; and			
8	(6)	Identify amounts and purposes of all expenditures from			
9		the University of Hawaii support fund.			
10	(c)	Any law to the contrary notwithstanding, the			
11	universit	y may transfer funds from the University of Hawaii			
12	tuition and fees special fund into the scholarship and				
13	assistance special fund established pursuant to				
14	section 304A-2159.				
15	(d)	In estimating its quarterly budget requirements, each			
16	campus of	the University of Hawaii shall prepare a plan for the			
17	fiscal ye	ar for the operation of each of the programs that it is			
18	responsib	le for administering. The operations plan shall be:			
19	(1)	In such form and content as the vice president for			
20		budget and finance and chief financial officer of the			
21		University of Hawaii may prescribe; and			

1	(2)	Submitted, together with the estimated quarterly					
2		budget requirements, to the vice president for budget					
3		and finance and chief financial officer on $[such]$ <u>a</u>					
4		date [as] that the vice president for budget and					
5		finance and chief financial officer may prescribe.					
6	(e)	The president and vice president for budget and					
7	finance a	nd chief financial officer of the University of Hawaii:					
8	(1)	Shall review the operations plan for each campus to					
9		determine if:					
10		(A) It is consistent with the policy decisions of the					
11		board of regents and appropriations by the					
12		legislature;					
13		(B) It reflects proper planning and efficient					
14		management methods; and					
15		(C) Appropriations have been made for the planned					
16		purpose and will not be exhausted before the end					
17		of the fiscal year;					
18	(2)	Shall approve the operations plan for each campus if					
19		they determine that the operations plan meets the					
20		requirements of paragraph (1): and

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2 campus at any time during the appropriations period. 3 (f) At the end of each fiscal year, the moneys in the 4 University of Hawaii tuition and fees special fund for each 5 campus shall lapse to the credit of program identification 6 number UOH900 (University of Hawaii, system wide support). 7 (g) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, funds 8 expended from or originating from the University of Hawaii 9 tuition and fees fund for the University of Hawaii school of 10 medicine or the cancer research center of Hawaii shall be used 11 by the school of medicine or the cancer research center of Hawaii for educational purposes only." 12 13 SECTION 4. Section 304A-2253, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 14 amended to read as follows: 15 "\$304A-2253 Research and training revolving fund. (a)

May modify or withhold the planned expenditures of any

18 hundred per cent of the total amount of indirect overhead

There is established a University of Hawaii research and

training revolving fund into which shall be deposited one

- 20 programs. The board of regents is authorized to expend
- 21 one hundred per cent of the revenues deposited in the fund for:

- 7 (b) The annual report required to be made for this
 8 revolving fund shall include but not be limited to a breakdown
 9 of travel expenses.
- 10 (c) Notwithstanding section 304A-107 to the contrary, the 11 board of regents, or its designee, may establish a separate 12 account within the research and training revolving fund for the 13 purpose of providing advance funding to meet reimbursable costs 14 incurred in connection with federally financed research and 15 training projects. Any reimbursement received as a result of 16 providing advance funding shall be deposited into the research 17 and training revolving fund to be used for the purpose of 18 meeting reimbursable costs incurred in connection with federally 19 financed projects.
- 20 (d) Revenues deposited into the fund shall not be used as21 a basis for reducing any current or future budget request or

- 1 allotment to the university unless the university requests such
- 2 a reduction.
- 3 (e) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, funds
- 4 expended from or originating from the research and training
- 5 revolving fund for the University of Hawaii school of medicine
- 6 or the cancer research center of Hawaii shall be used by the
- 7 school of medicine or the cancer research center of Hawaii for
- 8 research and research-related purposes only."
- 9 PART IT
- 10 SECTION 5. The purpose of this part is to allow the
- 11 University of Hawaii to continue its contribution to research
- 12 commercialization and economic development by repealing the
- 13 sunset provision in Act 38, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017.
- 14 SECTION 6. Act 38, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017, is amended
- 15 by amending section 5 to read as follows:
- "SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval [+
- 17 provided that this Act shall be repealed on June 30, 2022]."
- 18 PART III
- 19 SECTION 7. The purpose of this part is to make the
- 20 innovation and commercialization initiative program permanent by

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- 1 repealing the sunset provision in Act 39, Session Laws of
- 2 Hawaii 2017.
- 3 SECTION 8. Act 39, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017, is amended
- 4 by amending section 3 to read as follows:
- 5 "SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017[7
- 6 and shall be repealed on June 30, 2021]."
- 7 PART IV
- 8 SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 9 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 10 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2060.

Report Title:

UH; Cancer Research Center of Hawaii; John A. Burns School of Medicine; Special Funds; Commercialization; Technology Transfer

Description:

Establishes the cancer research center of Hawaii as an organized research unit of the University of Hawaii that conducts cancer research and that shall be administered by a director appointed by the board of regents. Requires the cancer research center of Hawaii to be affiliated with the John A. Burns school of medicine with a direct line of reporting to the provost of University of Hawaii at Manoa. Requires funds expended from the tuition and fees special fund or research and training revolving fund for the John A. Burns school of medicine or cancer research center of Hawaii to be used for research and research-related purposes only. Repeals the sunset provision in Act 38, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017, to make permanent certain provisions relating to technology transfer by the University of Hawaii. Makes the innovation and commercialization initiative program permanent by repealing the sunset provision in Act 39, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017. Effective 7/1/2060. (HD1)

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
