A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STATE COUNCIL ON MENTAL HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that native Hawaiians 2 experience mental health disparities that require culturally 3 responsive solutions. Native Hawaiian youth are more than twice 4 as likely to attempt suicide than their Caucasian peers. Native 5 Hawaiian keiki are overrepresented as victims of abuse and 6 neglect, and native Hawaiian youth experience higher rates of 7 depression and drug use. Native Hawaiians are also less likely 8 than other populations to seek help from the State's mental 9 health services.

10 The legislature recognizes that, to address these 11 disparities, culturally based mental health services are needed. 12 Research shows that treatment programs are four times more 13 successful when interventions are congruent with the client's values and beliefs. The need to provide programs that are 14 15 grounded in native Hawaiian healing and health practices is 16 especially critical given the State's commitment in section 17 226-20, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to "[p]rioritize programs,



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1 services, interventions, and activities that address identified
2 social determinants of health to improve native Hawaiian health
3 and well-being[.]"

4 The legislature finds that the state council on mental 5 health is responsible for ensuring that Hawaii's residents 6 receive adequate and appropriate mental health services. 7 Requiring the council to include members having educational, 8 professional, or practical backgrounds in native Hawaiian and 9 indigenous health, transgenerational trauma, and traditional 10 healing practices will help the State advance and develop 11 culturally responsive policies and programs.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require some members of the state council on mental health to have demonstrated knowledge of or work experience involving traditional native Hawaiian health practices.

16 SECTION 2. Section 334-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 17 amended to read as follows:

18 "§334-10 State council on mental health. (a) There is 19 established, within the department of health for administrative 20 purposes, a state council on mental health. The council shall 21 consist of twenty-one members appointed by the governor as



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1 provided in section 26-34. In making appointments to the 2 council, the governor shall ensure that all service area boards 3 of the State are represented, and that a majority of the members 4 are nonproviders of mental health or other health services, and 5 that a majority of the members are not state employees. The number of parents of children with serious emotional 6 7 disturbances shall be sufficient to provide adequate 8 representation of such children in the deliberations of the 9 council. The council shall be composed of residents of the 10 State, including individuals representing:

11 (1) The principal state agencies with respect to mental 12 health, education, vocational rehabilitation, criminal 13 justice, housing, medicaid, and social services; 14 (2) Public and private entities concerned with the need, 15 planning, operation, funding, and use of mental health

17 (3) Adults with serious mental illnesses who are
18 receiving, or have received, mental health services;
19 (4) The families of such adults or families of children
20 with serious emotional disturbances; and

services and related support services;



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1	(5)	The Hawaii advisory commission on drug abuse and
2		controlled substances who shall be a person
3		knowledgeable about the community and the
4		relationships between mental health, mental illness,
5		and substance abuse.
6	(b)	At least members of the council shall have
7	demonstrat	ed knowledge of or work experience involving native
8	Hawaiian c	concepts of well-being, culturally grounded mental
9	health met	hodologies, or traditional healing and health
10	practices,	as evidenced by:
11	(1)	A college or university degree in a relevant field,
12		such as:
13		(A) Psychology;
14		(B) Social work;
15		(C) Public health;
16		(D) Nursing;
17		(E) Hawaiian studies;
18		(F) Health administration; or
19		(G) Medicine;
20		with a focus on native Hawaiian and indigenous health,
21		transgenerational trauma, or traditional healing and



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1		health practices including hooponopono, laau lapaau,
2		<u>or lomilomi;</u>
3	(2)	A work history that demonstrates an appropriate level
4		of knowledge of or involvement in native Hawaiian and
5		indigenous health, transgenerational trauma, or
6		traditional healing and health practices including
7		hooponopono, laau lapaau, or lomilomi;
8	(3)	A history of health, social, or advocacy work
9		addressing native Hawaiian inequities; or
10	(4)	Substantial community experience as a native Hawaiian
11		traditional and customary practitioner offering
12		healing treatments, techniques, services, or
13		practices.
14	[(b)] <u>(c)</u> The council shall elect a chairperson from among	
15	its members. All members shall serve without compensation but	
16	shall be paid their necessary expenses in attending meetings of	
17	the council.	
18	[(c)] <u>(d)</u> The council shall advise the department on	
19	allocation of resources, statewide needs, and programs affecting	
20	two or more service areas. The council shall review and comment	
21	on the statewide comprehensive integrated service plan and shall	



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1 serve as an advocate for adults with serious mental illness, 2 children with serious emotional disturbances, other individuals 3 with mental illnesses or emotional problems, and individuals with combined mental illness substance abuse disorders. 4 5 $\left[\frac{d}{d}\right]$ (e) If the department's action is not in conformance with the council's advice, the department shall provide a 6 7 written explanation of its position to the council. 8 [++] (f) The council shall prepare and submit an annual 9 report to the governor and the legislature on implementation of 10 the statewide comprehensive integrated service plan. The report 11 presented to the legislature shall be submitted at least twenty 12 days prior to the convening of each regular session. 13 $\left[\frac{f}{f}\right]$ (g) A quorum for purposes of doing business shall 14 consist of a majority of the members serving on the council 15 immediately before a meeting begins. 16 $\left[\frac{1}{2}\right]$ (h) If a quorum is present when a vote is taken, the 17 affirmative vote of a majority of members present shall 18 constitute a valid act of the council unless this chapter, part 19 I of chapter 92, the articles of incorporation, or the bylaws

20 require a greater number of affirmative votes."



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SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

3 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
4 provided that the composition of the state council on mental
5 health shall comply with this Act no later than July 1, 2022.

State Council on Mental Health; Native Hawaiian Health Practices

Description:

Requires the state council on mental health to include an unspecified number of members with demonstrated knowledge of or work experience involving native Hawaiian health practices.

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
