SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE STATE TO CONSIDER AND ADOPT INNOVATIVE POLICIES TO IMPROVE TRANSIT AND REDUCE TRAFFIC CONGESTION.

WHEREAS, traffic congestion is a major issue that costs the 1 State millions of dollars annually and negatively contributes to 2 3 the health and welfare of residents; and 4 5 WHEREAS, Honolulu consistently ranks among the worst cities nationally for traffic congestion; and 6 7 WHEREAS, the average commuter on Oahu spends sixty-four 8 hours each year sitting in traffic congestion; and 9 10 WHEREAS, the Department of Business, Economic Development, 11 and Tourism estimates the cost of traffic congestion, including 12 time lost and the excess fuel consumed sitting in traffic, at 13 14 more than \$753,000,000 annually; and 15 16 WHEREAS, there are currently more than 1,275,000 motor 17 vehicles registered in the State, including cars, trucks, motorcycles, and scooters; and 18 19 WHEREAS, as of December 2019, there are only 944,159 20 residents with a valid driver's license, which means there are 21 22 approximately 330,841 more vehicles than drivers in the State; and 23 24 WHEREAS, there are only 4,476 miles of roads, paved and 25 unpaved, in the State; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, the State spends on average \$82,000,000 annually 29 on road repairs; and 30 31 WHEREAS, between 1995 and 2017 Oahu added one hundred ninety miles of new roadways and during that same time period 32

Oahu added 190,000 more registered vehicles while the population 1 on Oahu only grew by approximately twelve percent; and 2 3 WHEREAS, between 1993 and 2017, the nation's one hundred 4 5 largest urbanized areas added 30,511 new freeway lane-miles, an increase of forty-two percent, and over that same time period 6 7 the population in those regions increased by thirty-two percent while traffic delays and congestion exploded by one hundred 8 9 forty-four percent, proving that "widening the freeways" won't solve the traffic problems in the State; and 10 11 WHEREAS, a new focus on affordable housing development will 12 13 add tens of thousands of commuters to the roads in the years to 14 come; and 15 16 WHEREAS, the only effective way of improving transit and reducing traffic in the State is to shift away from spending 17 limited resources on adding lane miles for vehicles and instead 18 investing in alternative transit infrastructure and adopting 19 policies that reduce the number of vehicles on the roads; now, 20 21 therefore, 22 23 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, the 24 House of Representatives concurring, that the State is 25 26 encouraged to consider and adopt innovative policies to invest in alternative transit infrastructure and reduce the number of 27 28 vehicles on the road; and 29 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Transportation is requested to convene a working group to 31 32 examine and consider innovative policies to invest in alternative transit infrastructure and reduce the number of 33 34 vehicles on the road; and 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group be comprised 36 of the following members, or their designees: 37 38 39 (1)The Chairperson of the Senate Standing Committee on 40 Transportation, who should serve as co-chair of the working group; 41 42
