REQUESTING THAT A WORKING GROUP BE CONVENED TO DEVELOP RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPLEMENTING THE REVITALIZING ECONOMY AND AGRICULTURE LEADERSHIP INITIATIVE.

17	Leadership (REAL) initiative is a multi-phased, catalytic change		
18	initiative that empowers Hawaii farmers to become

21	off-taker markets; and

23 24	WHEREAS, this multi-phased, transformative initiative		
	creates entrepreneurial businesses with industry partners;

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WHEREAS, the REAL initiative is composed of members from 1 the United States Department of Agriculture Natural Resources 2 3 Conservation Service, the Department of Education, Kamehameha 4 Schools, Future Farmers of America, Hawaii Agriculture Resource 5 Center, Molokai Homestead Farmers, Lanakila Pacific, and North Shore Economic Vitality Partnership; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, the REAL initiative is currently underway and its proponents are taking necessary actions with community and 9 10 industry partners to stabilize Hawaii's small farming businesses impacted by the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic; 11 12 and 13 WHEREAS, the timing and urgency of the initiative requires 14 immediate attention, action, and collaboration from governmental 15 regulatory agencies, landowners, and industry participants, so 16 that the initiative may: 17 18 (1)Singularly or collectively obtain from the Department 19 20 of Agriculture, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, Department of Land and Natural Resources, and the 21 University of Hawaii a fifty-year lease on certain 22 23 land for purposes of production infrastructure 24 expansion, including an equipment maintenance center, 25 training hub, and grass feedstock processing center; 26 (2) Establish a grow hub structure and operations, which 27 would include a learning center from which homestead 28 farming and ranching businesses would receive 29 technical assistance and essential wrap-around service 30 support for marketing, branding, fiscal management and 31 operational support from federal agencies (including 32 the United States Small Business Administration); 33 state agencies (including the Department of 34 Agriculture; Agribusiness Development Corporation; 35 Department of Business, Economic Development, and 36 Tourism; Department of Hawaiian Home Lands; Department 37 of Land and Natural Resources; and the University of 38 39 Hawaii College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources); non-profit organizations (including the 40 Hawaii Agriculture Research Center and Sovereign 41 Council of Hawaiian Homestead Associations); and 42



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private organizations, such as Kamehameha Schools and 1 energy, food, and restaurant industry organizations; 2 3 4 (3) Establish farmer and rancher grow hub resources to 5 increase access to local soil and water testing resources, nutritional trials, researchers, and 6 7 entities that are necessary to meet industry timelines for soil and water resource management and validation 8 9 and promotion of Hawaii-sourced products (including 10 the Department of Agriculture, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, University of Hawaii College of Tropical 11 12 Agriculture and Human Resources, and Hawaii Agriculture Research Center); and 13 14 15 (4) Coordinate and access assistance from state agencies to support the successful implementation and 16 diversification of state economic development into 17 restorative agriculture and the ecosystem management 18 19 of land, water, and the environment; now, therefore, 20 21 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, the 22 House of Representatives concurring, that the Chairperson of the 23 Hawaiian Homes Commission, or the Chairperson's designee, is 24 25 requested to convene and serve as the chair of a Revitalizing Economy and Agriculture Leadership working group; and 26 27 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following individuals or 29 their designees are requested to serve as members of the Revitalizing Economy and Agriculture Leadership working group: 30 31 (1) The Administrator of the United States Small Business 32 33 Administration; 34 (2) 35 The Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture; 36 37 (3) The Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources; 38 39 (4) The Director of Business, Economic Development, and 40 41 Tourism; 42
