SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE COUNTIES TO EXPAND PROPERTY TAX RELIEF FOR LANDS PURCHASED PURSUANT TO THE KULEANA ACT.

WHEREAS, 'ohana who hold title to lands purchased under the 1 2 Kuleana Act have been negatively affected by the ever-increasing property values in Hawai'i; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, lands purchased pursuant to the Kuleana Act, but not classified as kuleana land parcels, subject to increased 6 7 property values have no relief from the correlating high 8 property taxes; and 9 10 WHEREAS, the lack of property tax relief has resulted in lineal descendants losing title to their ancestral lands; and 11 12 WHEREAS, native Hawaiians have an inextricable familial 13 14 relationship to 'āina (land) as the kumulipo (the Native Hawaiian cosmogony and creation chant) establishes that native Hawaiians 15 descend from natural life forms; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, this inextricable familial relationship to 'āina engenders a kuleana (duty) to care for it - he ali'i ke 'āina, he 19 kauwā ke kānaka (the land is a chief; man is its servant); and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, the traditional kuleana to care for the 'āina, 23 strengthened over centuries, resulted in a deep-rooted bond between native Hawaiians and the 'āina they cared for; and 24 25 WHEREAS, prior to the arrival of foreigners to Hawai'i, 26 'āina was customarily held in trust by the mō'ì (sovereign) for 27 28 the benefit of all; and 29



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1 WHEREAS, this custom was affirmed by Kamehameha III 2 Kauikeaouli in the Constitution of 1840 under the Hawaiian 3 Kingdom; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the Mahele (land division) the foundational 6 process of what would become the private property system in 7 Hawai'i, provided mechanisms for ownership of land by Hawaiian 8 Kingdom subjects and foreign citizens; and 9 10 WHEREAS, recognizing the need to secure title for 11 maka'āinana (commoners) to land for cultivation, the Legislature of the Hawaiian Kingdom enacted the Kuleana Act, the final step 12 in the Māhele process; and 13 14 WHEREAS, Kamehameha III intended maka'āinana to receive one-15 third of the total land of Hawai'i through the Māhele process; 16 17 and 18 19 WHEREAS, numerous reasons explain why the Kuleana Act only 20 resulted in an estimated 28,000 acres of Kuleana Land, less than 21 one percent of the total land of Hawai'i, being claimed by 22 maka'āinana; and 23 24 WHEREAS, the Kuleana Act also allowed Hawaiian Kingdom 25 subjects, including maka'āinana, to purchase government lands 26 (separate from kuleana land); and 27 28 WHEREAS, some 'ohana have maintained ownership of kuleana 29 land for over a century; and 30 31 WHEREAS, many others have lost ownership of these lands due to external forces; and 32 33 WHEREAS, to provide some relief to 'ohana who still own 34 kuleana land, the counties created a property tax exemption for 35 'ohana who can trace continuous lineal ownership of kuleana lands 36 37 to the Kuleana Act; and 38 WHEREAS, during the Māhele, 'ohana also purchased land not 39 classified as kuleana land through other mechanisms under the 40 41 Kuleana Act; and



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1 2 WHEREAS, 'ohana who purchased land pursuant to the Kuleana Act, but not classified as kuleana land, do not benefit from the 3 4 property tax relief provided by the counties; and 5 6 WHEREAS, many 'ohana who purchased land pursuant to the 7 Kuleana Act, but not classified as kuleana land, are being "priced out" as a result of skyrocketing property values that 8 9 are causing property taxes to soar; and 10 11 WHEREAS, rising costs from real estate pressures have created a climate where 'ohana continue to lose lands that are 12 their ancestral homes, farms, and burial places - lands unique 13 14 to Hawai'i and its identity; and 15 16 WHEREAS, government cooperation is needed to prevent the 17 loss of these cherished ancestral lands; now, therefore, 18 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 19 20 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, the House of Representatives concurring, that the counties are urged 21 to expand property tax protections to include all lands 22 purchased by Hawaiian Kingdom subjects under the Kuleana Act and 23 whose titleholders can trace lineal ownership of such lands to 24 25 the Kuleana Act; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body recognizes and appreciates the pilina (relationship) native Hawaiians maintain 28 29 with 'aina and the unique value this pilina contributes to 30 Hawai'i's identity; and 31 32 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body continues to support 33 the continual retention of lands by lineal descendants of 34 Hawaiian Kingdom subjects who claimed land under the Kuleana Act to protect the special relationship between kanaka (people) and 35 'āina; and 36 37 38 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor: 39 Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian 40



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1 Affairs; and mayors and councilmembers of the City and County of

2 Honolulu, County of Hawaii, County of Kauai, and County of Maui.
