## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS AND DEPARTMENT OF BUSINESS, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, AND TOURISM TO WORK TOGETHER TO ESTABLISH A STATEWIDE GREEN JOBS CORPS PROGRAM TO SUPPORT ECONOMIC DIVERSIFICATION, ALLEVIATE THE UNEMPLOYMENT IMPACTS OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC, AND ASSIST THE STATE IN MEETING ITS CLEAN ENERGY GOALS.

1 WHEREAS, the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic 2 caused an unprecedented disruption in the State's economy that 3 resulted in the State's unemployment rate, which was one of the 4 lowest in the country, to surge to one of the highest, thereby 5 creating a need for localized and diverse workforce development 6 initiatives; and

8 WHEREAS, the current standstill in the tourism and 9 hospitality industry, the largest industry in Hawaii, due to the 10 COVID-19 pandemic represents a unique opportunity for the State 11 to build a more resilient, equitable, and diversified economy; 12 and

14 WHEREAS, to support a comprehensive economic recovery and 15 continuing growth, the State must invest in its community and 16 emerging economic sectors to avail residents educational and 17 training opportunities to succeed; and

19 WHEREAS, Hawaii has committed to meeting the energy needs of its people in a safe, reliable, economical and 20 environmentally sound manner, as evidenced by Act 97, Session 21 Laws of Hawaii 2015, which established a renewable portfolio 22 standards target of one hundred percent renewable electric 23 energy by 2045; Act 125, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017, which 24 requires replacement of all cesspools by 2050; and Act 15, 25 Session Laws of Hawaii 2018, which established a statewide zero 26 emissions clean economy target to sequester more atmospheric 27 carbon and greenhouse gases than emitted by 2045; and 28 29



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WHEREAS, after the Great Depression, the United States 1 2 implemented the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) program from 1933 to 1942, as a major part of President Franklin D. 3 Roosevelt's New Deal, which provided Americans with work related 4 5 to the conservation and development of natural resources to alleviate the economic distress, which led to a greater public 6 7 awareness and appreciation of the nation's natural resources and 8 the continued need for a carefully planned, comprehensive 9 national program for the protection and development of natural 10 resources; and

WHEREAS, local efforts to reduce energy dependence and slow 12 13 the threat of global warning have the potential to create 14 significant business opportunities, as evidenced by the Oakland Green Job Corps, which is a program created in 2008 by the City 15 16 of Oakland to meet the needs of local green businesses by 17 recruiting and providing its residents with world-class job training, environmental education, and employment opportunities 18 in the green sector, including but not limited to installation 19 20 of solar panels on rooftops, weatherizing of homes to save 21 energy and lower utility bills, and construction of new green 22 buildings; and

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24 WHEREAS, the creation of a statewide Jobs Corps program similar to the CCC and the Oakland Green Job Corps would provide 25 26 residents of Hawaii who were economically impacted by the 27 COVID-19 pandemic with opportunities to receive the necessary education and training for employment opportunities in the 28 29 resiliency and green sectors, such as local agriculture, 30 conservation, climate adaptation, renewable energy, cesspool 31 conversions, and technology industries; and 32

WHEREAS, the Aloha Connects Innovation program of the 33 34 Economic Development Alliance of Hawaii and KUPU 'Aina Corps, two 35 workforce development initiatives launched by the State with Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act funds, are 36 potential programs to integrate and build upon in establishing a 37 38 statewide Jobs Corps program; and

39 40 WHEREAS, the report "From Today to Tomorrow: 41 Roadmap to Support Economic Recovery in Hawai'i" produced in 42 collaboration by the Hawai'i Executive Collaborative, Hawai'i



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Community Foundation, Harold K.L. Castle Foundation, Strada 1 Education Network, Jobs for the Future, Hawai'i P-20 and the 2 Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii provides an aligned framework to 3 4 establish a statewide Jobs Corps program by outlining a talent development strategy through expanding work-based learning, 5 retraining, credentialing programs, industry-driven solutions, 6 and partnerships; now, therefore, 7 8 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 9 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, the 10 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of 11 Labor and Industrial Relations and Department of Business, 12 Economic Development, and Tourism are requested to work together 13 to establish a statewide Green Jobs Corps program to support 14 economic diversification, alleviate the unemployment impacts of 15 the COVID-19 pandemic, and assist the State in meeting its clean 16 17 energy goals; and 18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Workforce Development 19 20 Council and Hawaii State Energy Office are requested to advise in the effort to establish a statewide Green Jobs Corps program; 21 22 and 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that state lands classified as 24 conservation district be considered as properties to manage and 25 steward through workforce development initiatives; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Business, 28 29 Economic Development, and Tourism and Department of Labor and Industrial Relations are requested to identify public-private 30 31 partnerships and outline components of a statewide Green Jobs Corps program that focuses on resiliency and green sector jobs 32 33 and submit a report of their findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later 34 than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session 35 of 2023; and 36 37

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 1 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor; Director 2 of Labor and Industrial Relations; Director of Business, 3 Economic Development, and Tourism; and Chairperson of the Board 4 5 of Land and Natural Resources. 6 7 8
