HB 308 RELATING TO GRANTS FOR HEALTH AND HUMAN HHH, FIN Status SERVICES.

Establishes a federal grant coordinator position within the office of the director of health (HTH 907). Provides that the federal grant coordinator shall coordinate the planning and preparation of grant proposals for the department of health and the department of human services to ensure that both departments maximize their receipt of

federal grant moneys. Appropriates moneys.

RELATING TO THE NURSING FACILITY SUSTAINABILITY HHH, FIN HB 311 Status PROGRAM. Extends the nursing facility sustainability program to 2024. Allows the nursing facility sustainability fee to be used to enhance capitated rates for the purpose of paying quality incentives. Specifies that the nursing facility sustainability fee limit is 5.5 per cent of overall net patient service revenue. Removes the per resident daily maximum fee of \$20 for each facility. Specifies facilities that meet certain exceptions shall pay a reduced daily fee in comparison to other participating facilities. Appropriates funds. HB 339 RELATING TO THE FAMILY COURT. HHH, JHA Status Makes decisions of the family court appealable to the supreme court instead of the intermediate court of appeals. HB 490 RELATING TO CRIMES AGAINST SENIORS. HHH, JHA Status Lowers the age at which enhanced penalties apply for crimes against seniors from sixty-two years of age to sixty years of age. Makes commission of certain criminal offenses against a senior's person or property applicable if the perpetrator knows or reasonably should know the senior victim's age. Effective 1/1/2022. HB 706 RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE HHH, FIN REVENUE BONDS TO ASSIST WAHIAWA GENERAL Status HOSPITAL. Authorizes the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds for longterm debt restructuring of Wahiawa general hospital. RELATING TO STATEWIDE HEALTH PLANNING. HB 728 HHH, FIN Provides flexibility in the administering of the statewide language Status access resource center. HB 729 RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS. HHH, FIN **Status** Reallocates moneys to fund and administer core homelessness services (HMS 224), including the housing first program, rapid re-housing program, family assessment centers, and homeless outreach and civil legal services. HB 730 RELATING TO HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES. HHH, FIN Status Requires that any provider that is awarded a contract to provide health and human services by a purchasing agency shall be a qualified medicaid provider. Requires the department of health to provide an explanation of how providers may capture federal medicaid moneys. HB 778 RELATING TO HEALTH. HHH, JHA Status Requires courts and administrative panels, in certain proceedings regarding whether a person is dangerous to self or others, to consider the statements of the person's parents. Clarifies that a parent who does

> not reside with a respondent is still a "family member" who may petition for the respondent's entrance into an outpatient treatment

program for substance abuse.

HB 986 Status	RELATING TO NEWBORN HEARING SCREENING. Amends the newborn hearing screening statute to mandate reporting of diagnostic audiologic evaluation results to improve hearing follow-up of infants. Updates definitions and terminology.	HHH, FIN
HB 987 Status	RELATING TO HEARING AND VISION PROGRAM. Amends the hearing and vision program statute to increase the early identification of children with hearing or vision loss, by establishing consistent protocols for hearing and vision screening and follow-up, screener training, and data collection for quality improvement.	HHH, FIN
HB 1113 Status	RELATING TO NON-GENERAL FUNDS. Repeals or reclassifies certain non-general funds administered by the department of human services as recommended by the auditor in auditor report no. 21-02.	HHH, FIN
HB 1297 Status	RELATING TO STATE FINANCES. Makes all special funds subject to deductions for central service expenses into the general fund. Repeals the community health centers special fund and emergency medical services special fund. Beginning 7/1/2021, transfers to the credit of the general fund any amounts allocated to those special funds, including amounts allocated from the cigarette tax and tobacco tax to those special funds. Makes a general fund appropriation to the department of health for operating expenses.	HHH, FIN

Status

Persons wishing to offer comments should submit testimony at least <u>24 hours</u> prior to the hearing. Testimony received after this time will be stamped late and left to the discretion of the chair to consider. While every effort will be made to incorporate all testimony received, materials received on the day of the hearing or improperly identified or directed, may not be processed.

If during the course of the hearing it appears that there will not be sufficient time to allow everyone to be heard, the chairperson reserves the right to limit the remaining testifiers to <u>two-minutes</u>. This two-minute policy will be enforced to ensure fairness and adequate consideration to all bills.

Testimony submitted will be placed on the legislative website. This public posting of testimony on the website should be considered when including personal information in your testimony.

The chair may institute a per-testifier time limit.

Committees meeting in the morning must adjourn prior to the day's Floor Session. Therefore, due to time constraints, not all testifiers may be provided an opportunity to offer verbal comments. However, remote testifiers' written submissions will be considered by the committee.
