The events of September 11, 2002 shook us to our core and raised up all that we hold dear, our families, our friends and neighbors, our island

We became painfully aware of our economy's dependence on visitors from around the globe and its ripple Emergency powers were granted the Governor. Measures to stimulate the economy and provide tax relief were passed. \$1,000,000 food and housing assistance was appropriated. Temporary programs were created to provide health insurance, extend unemployment insurance benefits and establish an emergency environmental work-

These were short-term fixes to tie us over to the 2002 Session.

In the first 25 days of this session, we continue to grapple with our desires to improve public education, address a looming long-term care • need, help business, pay attention to our natural resources and balance the budget, and do all of this in a systemic way, in a manner that gets to the root of the matter.

How do we do this?

In the area of public education, many feel unable to effect change and are put off by the distance of a very centralized system. I support two innovative restructuring meas- *subject to constitutional amendment

An election for all members of the regional boards of education established by SB 3018 would be held at the 2004 general election.

Regarding long-term care, this issue will not disappear by our inaction. Affording some relief, SB 2416 SD2 which has crossed over to the House, is the culmination of a 10year effort to develop and implement a plan for a dedicated source of revenue to provide a state-funded longterm care services system. drafted, beginning January 1, 2003, a mandatory long-term care income tax of \$10 per month* per person** who receives a paycheck, either as an employee without regard to number of hours worked, or selfemployed, would be collected. Benefit payments for long-term care services would commence July 1, 2005; the defined benefit payment would be \$70 a day up to a cumulative period of 365 days.

The Emergency Environmental Workforce Bill Successfully Crossed Over to the House

SB 2900 makes an appropriation to continue the efforts of the emergency environmental workforce established after last year's Third Special Session, and successfully crossed over to the House. The passing of this bill is critically important in maintaining the progress the emergency environmental workforce has made towards preserving the health of our ecosystem. Having worked with the crews in Hana, I fully appreciate the hard work involved. This workforce tackles their job aggressively and effectively, and the positive results are reflective of their dedication to the objectives of the program. The State needs this program to continue its essential work.

Aeromedical Reimbursement Rates to Ensure Air Ambulance Services to the Neighbor Islands.

On January 24th I led a bi-partisan effort to urge the Federal government to adjust Hawaii's aeromedical rates by obtaining the signatures of all 76 Senate and House members on a letter to Secretary of Health and Human Services Tommy Thompson and attached Senate Concurrent Resolution 130. I introduced SCR 130 last session urging the United States Congress and Health Care Financing Administration to raise Hawaii's Medicare reimbursement rates, which are currently one of the lowest in the country, resulting in financial hardship to Hawaii's only fixed-wing aeromedical provider in the state, Hawaii Air Ambulance. This bi-partisan effort will insure that neighbor island residents are ably transported to Oahu's tertiary care facilities by trained medical personnel in certified emergency aircraft. It is unfair for Hawaii to receive one of the lowest air ambulance reimbursement rates in the country, and expect medical air transport companies to survive. Increasing the Medicare reimbursements will essentially benefit the state by enabling air ambulance companies to continue providing safe transportation for our citizens.

Pfizer Program Helps Low Income Seniors Obtain Prescription Drugs and Other Health Benefits.

The new Pfizer for Living Share Card program enables needy seniors to buy a 30-day supply of medicines for a simple, flat fee of \$15 per prescription. To be eligible for the card, you must be 65 years old or older, have an individual reported annual gross income below \$18,000, or joint reported gross income below \$24,000, and have no other prescription coverage. The Share Card provides immediate access to Pfizer medicines, and health information and guidance on how seniors can apply for health benefits through existing programs.
