

#### Lana'i's Wish Becomes Reality

Ceremonies launching the new Manele Small Boat Harbor on Lana'i occurred on Saturday February 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2003. I worked together with Representative Sol Kaho'ohalahala, (13<sup>th</sup> House District: East Maui, Moloka'i, Lana'i, Kaho'olawe), Mason Young (Department of Land and Natural Resources, DLNR), and Manuel Emiliano (DLNR), to successfully secure \$600,000 in funds from various State and Federal sources. The ramp will be moved 15 feet inland and extended from 60 to 80 feet; the area in front of it will be dredged for safe boat launching. In an effort to upgrade the harbor facilities infrastructure, parking and landscaping, I introduced Senate Bill 1207, which appropriates \$4,043,538 for the improvements.

PRISM Student Presentation

The students of Moloka'i demonstrated enormous talent

during their presentations at the 7<sup>th</sup> Annual PRISM Symposium. PRISM: Providing Resolutions with Integrity for a Sustainable Moloka`i, is a program at Kualapu`u Elementary School, that emphasizes environmental education and explores sustainable living techniques by embracing concepts of responsibility and accountability.

Groups of 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders presented research from projects that addressed environmental issues affecting Moloka`i. In an in-depth study, students performed a telephone survey to gather data, with results scientifically analyzed to derive conclusions about how residents felt

towards local issues. Topics investigated were: water conservation and native habitat creation at Kualapu'u School, coastline management, discarded cars, alternative fuels, sonar testing by the Navy, commercial advertising in schools, and cruise ship visitation to Moloka'i. The impressive Power Point presentations clearly displayed data in graphs and showed that Moloka'i teachers and students are working together by embracing 'pono' (correct) actions that create a future to look forward to.

#### Kalaupapa: Small Community-Big Effect Investing in the Environment

On March 10<sup>th</sup>, 2003, we visited the community of Kalaupapa and met with residents to 'talk story' and discuss plans for Kalaupapa's future. It was evident that great strides have been taken to adopt and practice a sustainable lifestyle, and I was extremely impressed to hear about the waste management, landfill diversion, and recycling programs. Last year Kalaupapa sent by barge to O`ahu for recycling: 1000 used tires, 40 broken appliances, 12 old vehicles, 2 twenty foot dumpsters of

scrap metal, 1 twenty foot container of crushed aluminum and 50 pallets of miscellaneous metal parts. In addition, chemicals from cars and appliances were extracted for recycling and safe disposal. This working environmental management program proves that when communities unite, the common goal can be obtained. Congratulations to Kalaupapa for leading the way and setting an example for Hawai`i.

#### Cruise Ship Negotiations Imperative

Moloka'i residents voiced their concerns about cruise ships visiting the island during a community gathering and concert on the evening of March 8<sup>th</sup>, 2003. The evening featured a locally created documentary and presentations that detailed the potential effects visiting cruise ships could have on the current lifestyle of Moloka'i residents and the stresses added to the environment. Senate Bills 485 and 503, which I introduced this legislative session to protect Hawai'i's oceans from cruise ship pollution, while preserving the economic benefits they would bring to the island, were not passed out of the Transportation Military Affairs and Government Operations Committee (TMG). In an effort to ensure that Hawai'i's waters are guarded and that the cruise ship industry meets Hawai'i's environmental standards, I introduced Senate Concurrent Resolutions 158, 162 and 167 and Senate Resolutions 107, 11 and 116.

#### Improvements Authorized for Rural Island Schools Funds Released for Capitol Improvement Projects

Students at three island schools will soon be enjoying the benefits of improved accessibility to playground facilities, made possible from the March 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2003 release of funds by the Governor. Part of my 2002 State Budget was for improvements to rural school facilities, and I am pleased the Governor recognized the importance of enhancing conditions for the students at these schools. Hana High and Elementary School will receive \$1,056,000 for playground accessibility improvements and a new softball field, while Lana`i High and Elementary School and Pa`ia Elementary School will receive \$238,600 and \$245,600 respectively for playground accessibility improvements and for the removal of an old cesspool at Pa`ia Elementary.
