### Special Session to Override Governor's Vetoes Only the second time in State history!

Legislators gathered in a one-day special session on July 8, 2003 to override Governor Lingle's vetoes. Upon receiving official notification of the fifty vetoed bills from the Governor and a statement justifying her decision, the legislature determined a number of the vetoes to be immediately detrimental with a devastating effect on the people. Legislative leaders, including Senator English, gathered in caucus to discuss strategies that would focus only on those measures of urgent and compelling public interest. This issue-focused approach proved effective to remove partisanship and resulted in the override for these six bills:

#### Bills Overridden:

Senate Bill (SB) 255: Prohibiting unnecessary restrictions on agricultural properties. Voids all private restrictions on agricultural activities that are not tied to protecting environmental and cultural resources.

**SB 317: Fiftieth anniversary of the Korean War Commission**. Appropriates \$30,000 in state general money to allow the Fiftieth Anniversary Commemoration of the Korean War Commission to complete its activities commemorating the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of the Korean War.

**SB** 745: Air ambulance helicopters. Appropriates \$1 Million for an air ambulance helicopter for Maui County and for integration of ground ambulance services with emergency services.

SB 768: Restoring collective bargaining for Hawai'i Government Employees Association. Restores binding arbitration in labor disputes involving public workers.

**SB 1305: Assigning Rainy Day Fund monies to health and social service programs**. Appropriates more than \$10 million from the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for various programs.

House Bill 282: Reimbursing the state auditor. Requires state agencies to reimburse the legislative auditor for the cost of financial audits conducted by or contracted by the auditor.

## Environmental Victory! Watershed Restoration for Leeward Haleakala

It was a historic moment for Hawai'i's environment and future generations when landowners and supporting agencies signed a Memorandum of Understanding in commitment to native watershed forest restoration. Representing over forty thousand (40,000) acres of land on Haleakala from Makawao to 'Ulupalakua and all the way to Kaupo above the 3,500 feet elevation, the James Campbell Estate, Haleakala National Park, Haleakala Ranch, Kaonoulu Ranch, Living Indigenous



Forest Ecosystems, Nu'u Mauka Ranch, State of Hawai'i Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, State of Hawai'i Division of Forestry and Wildlife, 'Ulupalakua Ranch, United States Geological Survey (USGS) and John Zwaanstra united in stewardship to work with the partnership coordinator, USGS biologist **Art Medieros** and his team in restoring the leeward Haleakala watershed.

Once this area supported thriving native ecosystems with strong Senator English with Art Medieros strands of Koa trees and has proven to be prime territory for reforestation success. The potential value of rehabilitation for these upland forests is priceless. Major benefits include enhancement of biological diversity, survival of native species, regulation of the hydrologic cycle as well as economic and cultural benefits.

Conservation has a lifecycle that affects all of Hawai'i's population and reaches to future generations. The formation of the **Leeward Haleakala Watershed Restoration Partnership** is a dramatic expression of an organized community determined to safeguard natural heritage and ensure environmental protection.

# Grand Opening Moloka'i Slaughterhouse

After a long and difficult task to find funding, the opening of Moloka`i's new slaughterhouse facility gave plenty of reason to celebrate. Determined efforts by Moloka`i Livestock Cooperative, the State and Maui County, Office of Hawaiian Affairs, USDA Natural Resources Conservation, Moloka`i Agriculture Development Program, US Department of Labor-Moloka`i Rural Development Project, UH College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources as well as many others secured the planning, design and construction funds. For local Governments, both State and County, then Councilmember and now Senator, J.Kalani English played an important leadership role.

The decimation of the Moloka'i cattle industry in 1987, due to State and Federal improved safety and health standards, was the primary influence on a group of Moloka'i ranchers to form the Moloka'i Livestock Cooperative. With the intent to build a new slaughter facility that promoted good health and disease prevention, the group dedicated years to lobbying the State Legislature, gathering allies, supporters, volunteers and funding. Their hard work finally paid off with the Grand Opening of the Moloka'i Slaughterhouse on June 7, 2003.

#### <u>Live and Learn - Senator English - Chosen Leader for Harvard</u>
