# MILLIONS IN FEDERAL STIMULUS FUNDS FOR HAWAI'I TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENTS

The State of Hawai'i, together with the four counties, will receive \$246 million in federal stimulus funds to improve transportation infrastructure statewide.

The state estimates the federally funded transportation projects will generate approximately 3,170 jobs statewide in the construction industry and other related sectors. The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism estimates that for every million dollars in stimulus money invested, 12.9 jobs will be created or preserved.

The federal stimulus funds will further support Hawai'i's efforts to modernize the state's infrastructure, including the Airports Modernization Plan launched in 2005 and the Highways Modernization Plan introduced this January. The federal funds will also augment the \$1.8 billion capital improvement project (CIP) plan unveiled by Governor Lingle in December 2008, whose goal is to start more than 1,500 construction projects within the next 18 months.

"I anticipate a stabilization for our work force and greater economic health for Maui County as a result of this statewide stimulus package. It will be important to stay vigilant in evaluating the focus of these funds to maintain and create jobs." said Sen. English. Federal funds made available through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) allocated for Maui County include:

- •\$6,000,000 Reconstruction and improvements of Market Street from Kahawai Street to Makuhau Road.
- •\$7,000,000 Resurfacing areas of Pi'ilani Highway and Hana Highway.
- \$2,000,000 Federal Transit Administration funding to improve public bus transit systems.
- •\$18,500,000 Used to install Explosive Detection Systems (EDS) at Kahului Airport.

The EDS projects at Kahului Airport and at the Overseas Terminal at Honolulu International Airport will relocate the security equipment from the ticket lobbies to behind the ticket counters, resulting in more spacious lobbies for the passengers. The equipment will be integrated into the outgoing baggage conveyor system, which will cut down on the time it takes passengers to check in baggage. Also, because TSA staff will no longer need to monitor the EDS, they can be redeployed to the passenger check points.

The Kahului project began in May 2008 and is scheduled to be completed in July 2010. Construction of the Honolulu EDS project will begin late summer and be completed in May 2011.

# Hawai'i's Clean Energy Initiative Back In Power

Maui County and residents are closer to realizing the energy conservation ideals discussed and projected for years, that reduce fossil fuel emissions while expanding non-tourism dependent businesses and jobs.

Recently, the Obama Administration granted \$15,068,200 in federal stimulus money for energy efficiency and conservation projects in Hawai'i. In addition to state infrastucture improvements that reduce energy waste and emissions, these federal monies will directly affect individuals taking more personal responsibilty in their conservation efforts. Programs may soon be available for home weatherization assistance, energy audits, improved building codes and inspections as well as financial incentives that make the costs of these residential and commercial building upgrades.

Hawaiian Electric Co. (HECO) has announced a plan to buy wind energy from both Lana'i and Moloka'i. *First Wind*, co-owner of the Kaheawa Wind Farm on Maui, plans to generate 200 megawatts of wind energy on Moloka'i.

This collaboration, titled *Big Wind*, awaits approval by the State Public Utilities Commission and it will support HECO's commitment to the State to increase its renewable energy sources statewide to 1,100 megawatts by 2030.

"The industry of energy is becoming a positive growth in our local economy rather than the deficit it has been asscociated with in the past," said Senator English.


