H.B. 1062, H.D. 1 RELATING TO COMMERCIAL DRIVER'S LICENSES

House Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs

The Department of Transportation **strongly supports** H.B. 1062, H.D. 1 which clarifies the validity period for a commercial learner's permit. This bill adds a requirement for certain commercial driver's license applicants to complete an entry-level driver training course before taking other required tests for licensure.

The purpose of the bill is to establish a legal basis for implementing title 49 Code of Federal Regulations part 380, subpart F, which requires entry level driver training for certain applicants for a commercial driver's license or endorsement. A housekeeping amendment is also included.

The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration can withhold vital federal funds from states, such as Hawaii, that fail to implement these requirements. In Hawaii, the amount withheld would be \$6,185,220.00 for the first year of noncompliance and \$12,370,440.00 for the second and subsequent years. Only one-third of the states have yet to comply with this requirement, Hawaii is one of them.
