H.B. 1195 RELATING TO HIGHWAYS

House Committee on Transportation

The Department of Transportation (DOT) offers comments to H.B. 1195.

This bill requires the DOT, in collaboration with the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, to develop plans for the construction of secondary access roads for the Waianae district of leeward Oahu and appropriates funds to develop the construction plans.

The DOT supports efforts to make improvements to the Leeward Coast corridor. The DOT is underway with the Farrington Highway Corridor Study. This study will identify and prioritize safety, congestion and resiliency improvements along the entire Farrington Highway (Route 93) corridor. It is expected that most improvements would be identified within the Westside community areas from Nanakuli to Makaha. Discussions regarding second access and parallel access will be discussed in our reports; however, the focus will be on what can be done on, or to Farrington Highway itself. The Farrington Highway study should be finalized by the end of summer 2021.

In addition, since this effort would include both State and City involvement, the DOT recommends that it be led by the Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization (OahuMPO) in accordance with the transportation planning process. It is the role and responsibility of the OahuMPO to develop transportation studies that include both State and City roads and as such they would facilitate participation between the various jurisdictions involved. The OahuMPO is currently developing the Farrington Highway Mākaha Beach Realignment Feasibility Study. The purpose of this study is to identify the social, environmental, technical, and economic impacts, costs, and benefits of a potential realignment of Farrington Highway in the vicinity of Mākaha Beach Park near Kili Drive. This study could provide help inform the efforts to construct a second access.

The short answer is that it is not acceptable.

HB1195 Testimony

I am writing in SUPPORT of HB 1195

I am a lifelong resident of the Waianae coast, I've grown up here and have noticed traffic always getting worse. I remember when a hostage situation lasting more than 12 hours shut down the entire Waianae coast. The response to that was to build an 'access road' less than 10 yards from where the hostage situation took place, and if the exact same situation had occurred, would have shut down the bypass road for safety reasons as well.

While projects like the widening of Farrington Highway and adding turn lanes along most of it (for some strange reason stopping sort of one of the worst choke points on this side of the island) and increasing public transit has helped in small amounts to help alleviate traffic, it is not enough. The Bypass Roads put in help slightly in situations when they are authorized to be open but they are not a solution and only help in certain situations.

Below I have sketched out a very rough path for a potential alternate route that would connect Lualualei Naval Road and Kualakai Parkway together. This route would more than likely require at least two if not more tunnels. However since it connects to a military base (Lualualei Naval Ammunition Depot) there could be the potential to get federal funding and make it the 'H4' freeway. If this was combined with extending the turn lane in Nanakuli to Lualualei and permanently opening the Pa'akea road extension, it would not only help alleviate traffic but also provide a true alternate route in and out of the Waianae coast. The line in red would be an extension of Nanakuli Avenue to the bypass road allowing residents in that area another route.

This testimony is written to the Chair, Vice Chair and the Board of Transportation Committee. My Name is Annette Ferris. I write this testimony ,because I could not be there in person, as I have been asked to return to work, during this crisis, of a pandemic that we are facing here in hawaii. I was Born and raised here almost 48 years now. I grew up in Nanakuli, and lived through the floods of 1978, as a little girl, I lived through Hurricane Iwa in Nov. 1982, and also Iniki in Sept. 1992. Since then there has been an influx of people who continue to frequent our coastline area, trying to "Get a taste of the West side" or wanting to live in the" wild wild west". It's crazy.

Our roads are taking a beating. Our infrastructure which is our basic underlying framework or features of our system, roads, hwys, and bridges are under assault down here. We still have no sidewalks in parts of our communities, children still walk through mud, and muddy water to catch the school bus to go to school, our older citizens still have to walk down the center of the road sometimes because of street flooding. And this is the 20th Century!!!

Our drainage systems don't seem to work properly, as our roadways are always flooded. And this is on a federal hwy system. And we are not even talking about the road widening construction project that was started in 2014, and never completed. Till today and it is what, 7 years of no action???

I find it very hard to believe that the Department of Transportation jumped to put Speed humps; which according to the coconut wireless now have become launch pads, in Nanakuli. All because Ed Warner- who was also the one to take away the crosswalks at the same location in Nanakuli; to begin with, decided that now, he needed raised crosswalks to prevent people from getting bang. However, just to let you know, there had been crosswalks at that location since I was a kid. Ed Warner - was the same guy who asked the department of transportation to take away those same cross walks after his kid got bang for j-walking at night with his back against the flow of traffic. Maybe it was to help his case that he told them to take away the crosswalk, but to me, something doesn't smell right. Considering this point, as to why I bring this up- The department of transportation jumped to build these speed bumps, while the whole coast suffers through bumper to bumper traffic every single day. How come they are not jumping to complete the road widening project started 7 years ago and not completed?

Since when did these speed humps become priority for this whole and entire coast line, when the widening project started 7 years ago never got finished.

We still have contra flow traffic, and our police officers who are supposed to be directing traffic sit in their cars, at cross streets and do whatever they want because no one can see them behind their dark tinted windows. Sure they are getting paid, but what are we as residents getting for it? Nothing Absolutely nothing. There is only 1 cop and he stands out-side the car and actually directs traffic at Piliokahi street. When he is working, traffic moves well but only at that light. The rest of the time, our community sucks wind biscuits.

And if there is an accident, we suck wind biscuits !!!! I have been stuck there several times. And that is just an Accident. Just a single two car accident. When there is a fatality... brah... good luck seeing your kids tonight!!! And if it's a major accident, don't even try to come home. Why ? because traffic goes on for miles, and miles. You get to go home every night, ok you a while collar worker, we have 80 to 90 percent of working blue collar workers. Sometimes they don't get to see their families because of traffic. Especially if they had to go to town, which is anything Past Ko'olina now.

This bridge On Maipalaoa Street, what is going on with that? It is supposed to be nearly complete, and yet it is not. It is behind schedule, delays, and whatever else excuses. During the winter holiday, we were down to 1 lane going to Waianae. The traffic went on for miles... tried to call the department of

transportation office and no answer. The phone just rings and rings or tells you to leave a message recording... for no one to call you back. Frustration on this coast is running high. And we are not even discussing the what if situations that we need to prepare for.

We have asked, and asked, and asked for geeze from when I was a little girl. I remember my grandmother complaining about the traffic in Nanakuli and we didn't have half the traffic we have now. In the 1970's. I remember her asking about a secondary road, and back then, she was told not to worry, in an emergency situation we could access Kole-kole pass, well that road has fallen into disrepair and there doesn't seem to be any funds available. Yet, as a band aid solution we are supposed to have these emergency access roads along the coast. It does not work. We are still stuck on the coast. There is no disaster preparedness, and road evacuation procedure currently in place. Why? And how I know... it is because no one knows who has the keys for any and all of the access emergency gates? It's like pulling teeth, to get somebody, anybody to open an access road, in an emergency situation. There have been several incidents where the flow of traffic could have been redirected, or alleviate through the coast line, to prevent a worsening situation but somebody in the department, whomever it is that holds the keys to all the access gates 1 either didn't wake up yet, could not be reached, or just ignored the calls for help. That is what it seems like it is in my opinion, that most of the people in my community are constantly ignored and are refused help and constantly given excuses-for lack of a better word.

Our community is constantly given bandaids, but no real solutions. It is overwhelming to me, that this committee would sit by and not allow Bill H.B.1195 to pass. My community has an overwhelming amount of hard working people, who may not be able to make it here today. But by no means, ladies and gentleman, does that mean we don't care about our area or our community. This Secondary road is vital to this community. It is a need; not a want like speed humps. This H.B.1195 is a critical need. According to the 2010 census bureau the community of Waianae has an estimated population of 13,000 people. Now that was taken in 2010. Our community has exploded since then. And it does not include the amount of visitors that we receive daily. Nor does that include the visitors that we receive during the week-ends. Now imagine a situation where we have a Hurricane Inikki, or a Hurricane Iwa where the roads were again a part of the ocean. With the Makaha bridge washed away. Just imagine the flooding, the Sand that had to be hauled away. Already during the winter swells Makaha beach washes away, it erodes. The dilapidated Makaha bridge, by Makaha beach, needs fresh repair. Which should have been done while most people were home during Covid- 19 shut down. All along the coast we need sidewalks, drainage, and repair work. This H.b.1195 will help to get it done. Thank you for your time,
