#### RELATING TO THE STADIUM DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) has concerns with the creation of the Stadium Development Special Fund (SDSF).

House Bill (H.B.) No. 1348, H.D. 1, establishes the SDSF to be administered by the Stadium Authority (SA) into which shall be deposited:

- 1. All revenues from the Stadium Development District (SDD).
- 2. All gifts or grants awarded in any form from any public agency or from any other source for purposes of the SDD.
- 3. All proceeds from revenue bonds issued by the SA.
- 4. Appropriations made by the Legislature to the fund.

SDSF funds are directed to be used by the SA for the payment of expenses arising from any and all use, operation, repair, maintenance, alteration, improvement, or any unforeseen or unplanned repairs of the SDD.

The bill also amends the general bond authorization made in Act 268, SLH 2019; revises the general development guidance policies for the SDD; broadens the powers

and duties of the SA; exempts land to which the SA holds the title from the definition of "public lands"; authorizes the Hawai'i Community Development Authority, with approval by the Governor, to delegate to other State agencies implementation of capital improvement projects, under certain conditions; broadens the representation of the SA by adding two members to its membership; and makes the financial disclosures of members of the SA public records pursuant to Section 84-17(d), HRS.

As a matter of general policy, B&F does not support the creation of special funds that do not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, HRS. Special funds should:

1) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries of the program; 2) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 3) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining.

Regarding H.B. No. 1348, H.D. 1, it is unclear if the sources of revenues will be able to adequately support the SDSF aside from appropriations into the special fund.

Chair Luke, Vice Chair Cullen, and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on H.B. 1348, H.D. 1.

The Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS) strongly supports and appreciates H.B. 1348, H.D. 1, and offers the following revisions to more fully enable the intent of Act 268, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, and to provide necessary powers, appropriations, and guidance to ensure optimal development of the stadium development district for the enjoyment of Hawaii's residents and visitors.

- To give the Stadium Authority full administrative oversight of the Stadium development district special fund, establish the Stadium development district special fund under the Stadium Authority:
  - a. Revise Part II, Section 6, page 17, lines 4 -10 to read:

"SECTION 6. Chapter 109, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

### "§109-\_\_\_\_Stadium development special fund; established.

- (a) There is established in the state treasury another special fund to be known as the stadium development special fund, into which funds collected by the stadium authority shall be deposited, including:"
- b. Amend Part III, Section 11, Page 26, lines 15 16, as follows:
  "(36) Stadium development special fund under section [206E-\_\_\_]109-\_,"
- c. Amend Part III, Section 12 of the Bill, Page 30, lines 1-2 as follows:
- "(30) Stadium development special fund under section [206E\_\_\_]109-\_,"
- 2. To sunset the existing Stadium special fund as established in Section 109-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, after such time that all remaining balance within the fund may be fully applied, used, and disposed of by the Stadium Authority, add new part (c) in Part II, Section 9, page 19, after line 3, to read:
  - "(c) Upon the effective date of Act \_\_\_\_\_, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, the stadium special fund established herein is abolished, and all appropriations, encumbrances, and the remaining unencumbered balance shall be transferred to the stadium development special fund."
- 3. To designate the stadium authority as the expending agency:
  - a. Amend Part V, Section 14 of the Bill, Page 33, lines 11 19 as follows:
     "SECTION 14. Act 268, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, is amended by adding a new section to read as follows:

"SECTION 7A. [The Hawaii Community Development

Authority]Stadium Authority, as the designated expending agency for capital

improvement projects authorized in this Act, may delegate to other state agencies

in the implementation of projects when it is determined advantageous to do so by [both the Hawaii community development authority] the stadium authority, as the original expending agency and the agency to which expending authority is to be delegated."

b. Amend Part V, Section 16, Page 35, line 1 through page 36, line 3 as follows:

"SECTION 6. (a) The director of finance is authorized to issue general obligation bonds in the sum of \$170,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary is appropriated for fiscal year 2019-2020 to the [Hawaii community development authority] stadium authority for the stadium development district; provided that the appropriation made for the capital improvement project authorized by this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation unencumbered as of June 30, <u>P022</u>,] <u>2024</u>,shall lapse as of that date.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the [Hawaii community development authority]stadium authority for the purposes of this Act.

(b) The director of finance is authorized to issue general obligation
bonds in the sum of \$180,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary and
the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary is appropriated for
fiscal year 2021-2022 to the [Hawaii community development
authority]stadium authority for the stadium development district; provided
that the appropriation made for the capital improvement project authorized by

this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation unencumbered as of June 30, 2024, shall lapse as of that date."

c. Amend Part VI, Section 17, Page 36, lines 5 - 12, to read as follows:

"SECTION 17. General obligation bonds appropriated by Act 268,
Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, as amended by Act 4, Session Laws of Hawaii 2020, that have been allotted and encumbered prior to approval of this Act shall continue to be expended by the stadium authority [in accordance with the memorandum of agreement executed by and between the Hawaii community development authority, the stadium authority, and the department of accounting and general Services].

4. To enhance and strengthen the dynamic relationship between the partnering agencies primarily supporting the implementation and management of the stadium development district, DAGS recommends revising Part II, Section 10, page 22, line 10, through page 23, line 6, as follows:

"SECTION 10. Section 206E-225, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"[[]§206E-225[]] Stadium development district governance; memorandum of agreement. Notwithstanding [section] sections 206E-3[, for] and 206E-4.1, the stadium authority established pursuant to section 109-1 shall have sole jurisdiction regarding matters affecting the stadium development district[, the]; [provided that the executive director of the Hawaii community development authority shall serve directly under the stadium authority for those matters;] provided [further] that the Hawaii community development authority, department of accounting and general services, and

the stadium authority shall enter into a memorandum of agreement regarding implementation responsibilities of the respective agencies. [The executive director of the Hawaii community development authority, state comptroller, and the stadium authority shall also execute a memorandum of agreement with the appropriate state agencies, as needed.]"

The DAGS continues to collaborate closely with the Stadium Authority and the Hawaii Community Development Authority to ensure our on-going project efforts coincide with the future goals to bring benefit in the best interests of the State and its people.

#### HB 1348 HD1 – RELATING TO THE STADIUM DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

Chair Luke, Vice Chair Cullen, and members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to present testimony today. The University of Hawai'i (UH) is supportive of House Bill No. 1348 HD1, Relating to the Stadium Development District, and requests further amendments to the bill where it relates to the UH. Among a number of things, this bill seeks to establish a special fund, broadens development authority of the Stadium Authority, amends the bond financing structure for the new stadium project, and adds two members to the Stadium Authority.

The UH requests that the bill be revised to allow the UH representative to have a vote on the Stadium Authority Board. Considering that the new stadium project is primarily for, and will rely on the UH use of the stadium as a major activity, it is more prudent to ensure that UH is a contributing participatory decision maker in the Authority decisions. I recommend the bill (page 7, lines 4 through 9) be amended, as follows:

Each member of the authority shall have been a citizen of the United States and a resident of the State for at least five years next preceding the member's appointment. The <u>eleven members shall</u> include the president of the University of Hawaii and the superintendent of education, or their <u>designated representatives</u>, who shall be ex-officio members of the authority [but shall not vote].

The inclusion of the UH President to the Stadium Authority Board originated out of the recognition that UH athletics was a primary anchor of the stadium and a foremost purpose for the stadium itself. This purpose remains a prominent component of the planned new stadium and the broader stadium district project. Having the UH President, or their designee, serve in a full capacity on the Stadium Authority will ensure that the broader project and eventual operation of the completed project has the governance input and involvement of one of the primary users and beneficiaries.

Lastly, the UH recently provided a list of desired objectives to the State's project leadership (Department of Accounting and General Services) that should be incorporated as business outcomes as part of the structure for the new stadium and district project. Those items can be more thoroughly considered once the State gets underway negotiating terms with the project partners.

As background, the Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA),
Department of Accounting and General Services, and the Stadium Authority have been
discussing this bill and the Senate version. HCDA respectfully offers **comments**suggesting amendments to this measure, as follows:

### 1. Part II, Section 6, Pages 17-19

In order to facilitate the ease of releasing and using of funds needed by the Stadium Authority, we suggest that the stadium development special fund be moved from Chapter 206E to Chapter 109.

### 2. Part II, Section 10, Pages 22 to 23

To clarify the respective roles of the agencies supporting the implementation and management of the stadium development district, we recommend the changes as follows:

SECTION 10. Section 206E—225, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

§206E-225 Stadium development district governance; memorandum of agreement. Notwithstanding [section] sections 206E-3 [, for] and 206E-4.1, the stadium authority established pursuant to section 109-1 shall have sole jurisdiction regarding matters affecting the stadium development district [, the]; [provided that the executive director of the Hawaii community development authority shall serve directly under the stadium authority shall enter into a memorandum of agreement with the Hawaii community development authority, and the department of accounting and general services regarding the implementation of responsibilities of the respective agencies. [The executive director of the Hawaii community development authority, state comptroller, and the stadium authority shall execute a memorandum of agreement with the appropriate state agencies [.], as needed.

### 3. Part III, Section 11, Pages 23 to 26

In connection with our suggestion to move the stadium special development fund from Chapter 206E to Chapter 109, we suggest the following change:

"(36) Stadium development special fund under Section 109-.."

### 4. Part III. Section 12, Pages 27 to 30

In connection with our suggestion to move the stadium special development fund from Chapter 206E to Chapter 109, we suggest the following change:

"(30) Stadium development special fund under Section 109-..."

### 5. Part V, Section 14, Page 33

In connection with our suggestion to move the stadium special development fund from Chapter 206E to Chapter 109 and to specify the stadium authority as the expending agency, we suggest the following change:

SECTION 14. Act 268, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, is 12 amended by adding a new section to read as follows:

SECTION 7A. The <u>stadium authority</u> [Hawaii community development authority], as the designated expending agency for capital improvement projects authorized in this Act, may delegate to other state agencies the

implementation of projects when it is determined advantageous to do so by both the [Hawaii community development authority] stadium authority as the original expending agency and the agency to which expending authority is to be delegated.

### 6. Part V, Section 16, Pages 34 to 36

In order to reflect that the stadium authority, rather than the Hawaii community development authority, is the expending agency, we suggest the following changes:

SECTION 16. Act 268, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, as amended by Act 4, Session Laws of Hawaii 2020, is amended by amending section 6 to read as follows:

SECTION 6. (a) The director of finance is authorized to issue general obligation bonds in the sum of \$170,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary is appropriated for fiscal year 2019-2020 to the [Hawaii community development] stadium authority for the stadium development district; provided that the appropriation made for the capital improvement project authorized by this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for which the appropriation is made; provided further that all moneys from the appropriation unencumbered as of June 30, [2022,] 2024, shall lapse as of that date.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the [Hawaii community development] stadium authority for the purposes of this Act.

SUBJECT: SUPPORT OF H.B. 1348 HD1, RELATING TO THE STADIUM

**DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT.** Establishes the stadium development district special fund. Revises the general development guidance policies for the stadium development district and clarifies the respective roles the stadium authority and Hawaii community development authority in the development of the stadium development district. Broadens the powers and duties of the stadium authority, including authorizing the stadium authority to acquire and hold title to real property. Exempts land to which the stadium authority holds title from the definition of "public lands." Authorizes the Hawaii community development authority, with approval from the governor, to delegate to other state agencies implementation of capital improvement projects, under certain conditions. Adds two members to the stadium authority. Amends the general bond authorization made by Act 268, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019. Makes the financial disclosures of members of the stadium authority public records.

#### Comments:

My name is John Kawamoto, and I support HB 1348 HD 1 with an amendment. This bill establishes legal infrastructure to facilitate the development of the stadium development district.

Aloha Stadium was built in 1975. Although its design was innovative, its steel has never stopped rusting because of the salt air from the nearby ocean. In 2019 the Legislature appropriated \$350 million to build a new stadium.

On Dec. 17, 2020, the Aloha Stadium Authority announced that it would close Aloha Stadium indefinitely. The stadium was experiencing safety issues due to corrosion and a lack of sufficient funding to maintain the facility.

In early January, 2021, the University of Hawaii Athletic Department announced that it would expand the Clarence T.C. Ching Athletics Complex on the Manoa campus and play home football games there for the following three years.

Although the University of Hawaii's football program had been the anchor tenant at Aloha Stadium, the UH Athletic Department issued a memorandum saying that it was only the fourth priority in making decisions for the new stadium. The UH Athletic Department contended that it would have no direct input into the RFP criteria, the RFP process, the selection of the contractor(s), or the provisions of the contract that the state would enter into.

According to the UH Athletic Department, "UH is being forced to fend for itself to identify and prepare a home field for football for at least 2021-2023, likely longer, and potentially indefinitely."

The potential absence of UH football from the new stadium creates an uncertainty about its viability and the viability of the stadium development district. It is possible that the new stadium will not be built and the stadium development district will be abandoned.

HB 13348 HD 1 accounts for this possibility. The provision on page 14, lines 17-21 would return the land to the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Instead, however, due to Hawaii's housing crisis, the land should be transferred to the Housing Finance and Development Corporation.

Hawaii faces tens of thousands of housing units, which disproportionately impacts families earning the median income and below. A recent Aloha United Way report, entitled, "ALICE: A Study in Financial Hardship in Hawaii" (ALICE = Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed), 59% of Hawaii households cannot afford the basic necessities of life. Housing is the biggest item in a typical family's budget, so these families are in dire need of housing that is affordable to them.

HB 1348 HD 1 should be amended so that if the land is no longer needed for the stadium development district, it should be transferred to the Housing Finance and Development Corporation to develop housing for the people of Hawaii that is affordable to them.
