Aloha Chair Nakashima, Vice Chair Matayoshi and Committee Members,

The Hawaiian Humane Society supports the passage of House Bill 416, HD1, which would prohibit the use of specific tethering equipment and techniques that are injurious to dogs. It further prohibits the unsupervised tethering of dogs less than six months of age. Puppies lack the physical coordination to be safely left alone on a tether or pulley system. Crate training is preferable when puppies must be left by themselves.

Hawaiian Humane respects the importance of ensuring pet owners have options to keep their animals safe. We appreciate that HB 416, HD1, does not ban tethering, which would disadvantage pet owners who cannot otherwise secure their property or face lease restrictions that limit their options for housing their pets. Rather this bill requires that when tethering is used, it is safe for the animal. Proper tethering equipment is readily available and appropriate techniques are easy to implement.

Having a clear, enforceable tethering law also allows the county animal service providers to educate pet owners about other potential issues with dog tethering, such as keeping dogs isolated from human contact. Dogs are social beings who do best when fully integrated into their human families. Improper or prolonged tethering is frustrating to dogs, which increases the risk of serious dog bites. The victims of such attacks are often children.

l urge you to pass HB 416, HD1, to protect animals and people. Mahalo for your consideration.

Tethering HB416 HD1

This bill rightly prohibits specified trolleys, pulleys, cables, or running lines designed to attach a dog to two stationary objects in a configuration that endangers the dog, including by even depriving the dog of sustenance, which is surely an act of cruelty.

It also prohibits the unsupervised tethering of a dog under the age of six months.

It gives dog guardians the flexibility they need to keep their animals secure, protects the community from unsecured dogs if necessary, and ensures that dogs who have to be tethered are confined in ways that are safe and allow them adequate shelter, sustenance and sufficient freedom of movement.

We understand that proper tethering equipment is readily available and appropriate techniques are easy to implement and that the provisions of the bill are meaningful and enforceable. Having a clear, enforceable tethering law allows the county animal service providers to educate companion animal guardians about other potential issues with dog tethering, such as keeping dogs isolated from human contact.

Animal Interfaith Alliance in Britain would like to formally endorse this bill.

Dear Chair Nakashima and Members of the House Judiciary Committee,

We **STRONGLY SUPPORT HB416 HD1** and have worked on this measure for a number of years, with the bill sponsor, law enforcement, animal care and control agencies and concerned community members, to achieve the current language in the bill.

Chained dogs are 3 times more likely to bite and become aggressive than unchained dogs. Of those bites, children are 5 times more likely to be the victim. This bill allows for the prevention of dog aggression and potential neglect by allowing law enforcement to intervene to educate dog owners before an animal becomes aggressive or the dog endangers itselft, by being chained or tethered in a dangerous manner.

This bill is a modest but necessary step to protect both animal welfare and community safety.

Dear Chair Nakashima, Vice Chair Matayoshi, and members of the House Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs,

My name is Lindsay Vierheilig and I am the Hawaii State Director for The Humane Society of the United States. I am writing to express support for HB 416 with amendments, which creates reasonable standards for chaining dogs who live outdoors. I appreciate the opportunity to submit this written testimony on behalf of our Hawaii members and supporters, and I am grateful to the House of Representatives for recognizing tethering as a critical issue. While our hope is that every dog would share a home with his or her human family, we understand that is not always the case, so it is important that dogs who live outdoors be protected.

Constant, improper chaining puts a dog's health and safety at risk. In many cases, the necks of chained dogs become rubbed raw and covered with sores, the result of cruelly heavy chains, poorly fitted collars and the dogs' yanking and straining to escape confinement. Additionally, it is shockingly common for law enforcement to find dogs with embedded collars, a horrible situation where the collar grows into the skin, typically requiring surgery.

The vagueness of current law makes it difficult for enforcement officers who want to take action before a dog has suffered injury or death. Often, it is too late for the dog and the owner faces criminal charges. HB 416 will create clear guidelines for both owner and officer. The intention is not simply to punish violators, but to create reasonable expectations for the humane treatment of dogs, and allow owners the ability to take proactive steps to comply.

HB 416 offers the following common sense protections for Hawaii's dogs: a) ensures that dogs who are kept outdoors be provided proper and humane restraints, with collars that will not cause pain and tethers that are not egregiously heavy and b) ensures chained dogs are provided adequate food and water. HB 416 is an important step in protecting the people and dogs of Hawaii and we look forward to its passage. Thank you very much for your time.

The Hawaii Association of Animal Welfare Agencies (HAAWA) supports the passage of House Bill 416, HD1, which prohibits specified equipment designed to attach a dog to two stationary objects in a configuration that endangers the dog. It also prohibits tethering a dog under the age of six months unless the dog is engaged in a supervised activity.

HAAWA's members include the largest animal shelters in each of the four counties, as well as the leader in pet animal spay/neuter on Molokai. Our independent local nonprofits are united in support of HB 416, HD1.

The inappropriate tethering of dogs is an issue on all of our islands. Tethering a dog in ways that cause injury; prevent access to food, water or shelter; or isolate the animal from opportunities to bond with his human family are traumatizing and can lead to aggression. The specific and enforceable provisions of this bill will allow humane investigators to educate dog owners so they can correct violations while still keeping their pets safe on their property. We urge you to pass HB 416, HD1, to ensure animals and their human family members are safe from harm.

I support House Bill 416, HD1, which balances the need for pet owners to have options for keeping their dogs confined to their property, while also making sure dogs are not at risk of entanglement or injury from the very equipment meant to keep them safe. Proper tethering equipment is readily available and appropriate techniques are easy to implement.

I also support the bill's ban on the unsupervised tethering of dogs who are less than six months old. Puppies are notoriously uncoordinated.
