In consideration of H.B. 757 RELATING TO THE HAWAII HOUSING FINANCE AND DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION.

The HHFDC **opposes** H.B. 757. The placement of the DHHL Chairperson on the HHFDC Board as proposed in this bill reduces the number of public members on the HHFDC Board from 4 to 3. Public members on HHFDC's Board have knowledge and expertise in public or private financing and development of affordable housing. HHFDC's public members have been a valuable resource to the agency and have guided the agency in fulfilling its mission through economic ups and downs.

We believe that the current collaboration between HHFDC and DHHL on areas of mutual interest and benefit is far more productive. HHFDC has partnered with DHHL on the development of water infrastructure to support housing development in Lahaina, Maui and North Kona, Hawaii. HHFDC is providing \$10 million in DURF funds for a Honokowai well to facilitate housing development by DHHL and HHFDC in Leiali'i, Maui.

HHFDC is also partnering with DHHL for the development of North Kona wells (Keopu Well – Well no. 4 and/or Ota Well) that will benefit their project in the Villages of La'i'opua. HHFDC also regularly collaborates with DHHL on the Hawaii Housing Planning Study.

The mission of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) is to manage the Hawaiian Home Lands trust effectively and to develop and deliver lands to native Hawaiians. HHFDC is tasked with developing and financing low- and moderate-income housing projects and administering homeownership programs. There are many examples of collaboration between DHHL and HHFDC and allowing the Chairperson of the HHC or the Chairperson's designee to serve as an ex officio voting member of the HHFDC similar to the Director of Business, Economic Development and Tourism and the Director of Finance or their designated representatives would allow for greater advocacy for beneficiaries of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act.

TESTIMONY IN OPPOSITION TO HB757 RELATING TO THE HAWAII HOUSING FINANCE AND DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

Dear Chair Quinlan, Vice Chair Holt, and Members of the Committee on Economic Development:

EAH is a nonprofit developer and manager of low-income rental housing serving those with incomes at or below 60% of the area median income. We are a customer of the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation (HHFDC) as we finance our housing communities utilizing Low Income Housing Tax Credits and the State's Rental Housing Revolving Fund.

EAH Housing is **opposed** to HB757, which would replace a public member of the Board of Directors of the HHFDC with the Chairperson of the Hawaiian Homes Commission. EAH believes that displacement of a public member on the HHFDC Board in this way does not serve the public interest.

HHFDC's mission is to increase housing for ALL residents regardless of race or ethnicity. Public members on HHFDC's Board have knowledge and expertise in public or private financing and in the development of affordable housing. They are valuable because they provide guidance to the agency on policies and decisions that have resulted in successful affordable housing developments like ours throughout the State.

HHFDC already supports Native Hawaiians through its current finance and development programs. A good percentage of the inhabitants in LIHTC or HRS 201-H assisted projects are Hawaiian. HHFDC is already collaborating with DHHL on infrastructure on Maui and the Big Island to support their efforts to develop homesteads in those counties. EAH therefore does not see the need for the changes to the HHFDC Board proposed in this bill. If anything is going to be changed, we would encourage more public participation on the Board.

Comments:

I strongly oppose allowing a public position on the HHFDC board to be given up for a DHHL position. DHHL operates autonomously for the most part to provide homes for Native Hawaiians. Their membership on the board is a conflict, especially when HHFDC board members must approve for actions that grant subsidies federal and state to fund housing projects. They are also a State agency that receive such funds and often competing for funds during the legislative process.

To also reduce additional public representation on the board not only reduces transparency of decisions but also limits the broad perspective of the public's needs on housing. We need public representation not tied to a governmental agency to ensure that the community's needs come first in making decisions about financing housing.
