HOUSE BILL NO. 817 HD1 RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

Chairperson Johanson and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill 817 HD1, relating to agriculture. This bill would require each state department that purchases produce to ensure that 10% of purchased produce is grown locally by 2025 and increases the required percentage every five years to a maximum of 50% locally-grown by 2050. This bill may benefit agricultural producers in the State and potentially creates a larger market for locally grown products. The Department has received reports that a similar requirement mandated by <u>Act 233, SLH 2015</u> achieved measurable increases in utilization of locally-sourced agricultural products. The Department supports the intent of this measure but defers to the State Procurement Office and those departments with large food service programs regarding this measure's operational impacts on their respective programs. The Department additionally has concerns regarding the logistics for data collection and reporting that would be necessary for effective enforcement the milestones and percentages imposed by this measure.

The Land Use Research Foundation of Hawaii (LURF) is a private, non-profit research and trade association whose members include major Hawaii landowners, developers, and utility companies. One of LURF's missions is to advocate for reasonable, rational, and equitable land use planning, legislation and regulations that encourage well-planned economic growth and development, while safeguarding Hawaii's significant natural and cultural resources and public health and safety.

LURF appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony in **support of HB 817, H.D.1**, and to offer comments.

HB 817, H.D.1. The purpose of this bill is to establish benchmarks that require each state department to ensure that a certain percentage of the produce purchased by that department is locally grown, and to report to the Legislature on the progress of each department toward meeting those benchmarks, thereby facilitating the increased use and consumption of locally grown and locally raised food products from Hawaii farmers, ranchers, and food producers.

LURF's Position. LURF members include farmers, ranchers and landowners who own, maintain, and engage in agricultural enterprises, and who consider efforts such as that proposed by this bill significant to the conduct of their operations and to help sustain their businesses. These landowners and agricultural stakeholders believe HB 817, H.D.1 will greatly assist with the endeavor to achieve long-term sustainability of Hawaii's food supply, economic growth, and disaster preparedness, including increased production of food for institutions and facilities throughout the State.

The purpose of this bill is consistent with the underlying intent and objectives of the IAL laws (Hawaii Revised Statutes, Sections 205-41 to 52), which were enacted to fulfill the mandate in Article XI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, "to conserve and protect agricultural lands, promote diversified agriculture, increase agricultural self-sufficiency and assure the availability of agriculturally suitable lands."

LURF therefore appreciates the objective of HB 817, H.D.1, which is to support agriculture and instigate further collaboration by and between the State, its various departments, and agriculture-related operations. Passage of the long-awaited IAL legislation would be meaningless without implementation of such measures.

By recognizing the significance of, and need to assist the local agriculture industry, and implement measures which help to support the growth and maintenance of agriculture in the State, this bill significantly helps to promote economically viable agriculture and food self-sufficiency in Hawaii.

Dear Chair Johanson and Members of the Committee:

My name is Micah Munekata, and I am the Director of Government Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawai'i-focused impact investment firm that strives to improve quality of life throughout the islands by helping our communities become more resilient and selfsufficient through locally produced food; renewable energy and clean transportation; and better management of freshwater and waste.

Ulupono <u>supports the intent</u> of HB 817 HD 1, which requires each State department to ensure that a certain percentage of the produce purchased by that department is locally grown, and report to the legislature on each department's progress toward meeting locally grown produce benchmarks.

Ulupono supports the State leading by example in purchasing 100% locally grown, raised and harvested produce as part of each department's purchases. By establishing the 50% by 2050 goal, with relative benchmarks along the way, the State is supporting local farmers and ranchers with a consistent market, providing fresh, healthy products to the community, and keeping State money here in the islands. This effort can be extremely important in supporting our local food production goals while also increasing the State's food security.

Ulupono would like to offer a few amendments for consideration. Knowing that there are times that the entire plate or meal may need to include a processed or value-added product in order to make the greatest local product impact on the overall meal, we recommend adding language and definitions to be include in meeting the local purchasing goals listed in the bill as such.

- Replace "as measured by the cost of the produce" throughout the bill with "as measured by the per cent of the total food cost"
- Replace "locally grown produce" throughout the bill with "fresh local agricultural

product and local value-added, processed, agricultural, or food product"

- Add the following definitions:
 - "Fresh local agricultural product" means fruits, vegetables, nuts, coffee, eggs, poultry and poultry products, livestock and livestock products, milk and milk products, aquacultural and maricultural products, and horticultural products 100% grown, raised, and harvested in Hawai'i.
 - "Local value-added processed, agricultural, or food product" shall be defined to mean at least fifty-one per cent of the product's primary agricultural product shall be grown, raised, and harvested in Hawai'i."
 - "Primary agricultural product" means the major agricultural product in a processed or value-added agricultural or food product

These definitions were mirrored after the Department of Agriculture's Seal of Quality Program – the top-of-the-line program established to protect the Hawai'i brand for both fresh and value-added products.

Aloha and thank you for the opportunity to testify in **support of HB817 HD1 with a recommended amendment**, which requires each state department to ensure that a certain percentage of the produce purchased by that department is locally-grown.

Hawai'i Public Health Institute (HIPHI) works to advance policy and systems change to reduce disparities and improve the health of Hawai'i residents. HIPHI is home to and testifies here on behalf of the Obesity Prevention Task Forceⁱ and the Hawai'i Farm to School Huiⁱⁱ, which **collectively represent over 60 organizations from across the islands**.

In order to highlight the importance of indigenous staple crops such as taro, breadfruit, and sweet potato in Hawaii's journey toward food security and food self-sufficiency, we respectfully request that HB817 HD1 be amended to include "staple starches" within the definition of "Produce" on Page 4, Line 7, as follows:

<u>"Produce" means fruits, vegetables, staple starches, nuts, coffee, eggs, poultry and poultry products, livestock and livestock products, milk and milk products, aquacultural and maricultural products, and horticultural products.</u>

Also, due to the immensity of the important work ahead as proposed in this bill, we maintain the stance that a farm to state/farm to school program and one or more dedicated coordinator positions are needed in *both* the Hawai'i Departments of Agriculture and Education (as per our testimony for HB767 HD1 Relating to the Farm to School Program).

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in SUPPORT of HB817 which will require each state department to ensure that a certain percentage of the produce purchased by that department is locally-grown. **I SUPPORT HB817 with the ammendment that "staple starches" be added to the definition of "produce"** (page 3, line 20).

We formed the Hawai'i 'Ulu Cooperative in 2016 to build a network of smallscale, diversified farms that grow breadfruit and want to improve community access to this amazing, nutritious food. From 2018 to 2020 we were a primary local supplier for the DOE's 'Aina Pono program, providing minimally processed sweet potatoes, bananas, green papayas, and 'ulu - which transitioned to be not only a special Harvest of the Month menu item but also a regular part of the school lunch cycle in school year 2019-2020.

Through this experience we are living proof not only that farm to school / farm to institution is possible in Hawaii, but of its huge potential benefit for both local farmers and children. As general manager of HUC, one of my most memorable and gratifying experiences was standing in a supermarket in late 2019 handing out samples of 'ulu when a school-aged boy excitedly ran up to my booth and told his mother how much he knows about and loves 'ulu *because he ate at in school*.

At the same time, the partnership between our co-op and DOE had a meaningful impact on the 100 small-scale, diversified, family farmers of the co-op - located on both Hawaii island and Maui - by enabling us to expand the number of crops we purchase from farmers and to grow our overall volumes from 20,000 pounds in 2017 to 40,000 pounds in 2018 and nearly 200,000 pounds by 2020. About half of our volume was going to local schools at the pinnacle of this relationship. Seeing as our state imports over 99% of the starches we consume, we believe adding "staple starches" to the definition of "produce" in HB817 is critical to leverage the great potential of farm to state initiatives to help drive increased local staple crop production and consumption in Hawaii.

The impact that farm to state can have on the future of our islands is immeasurably important to our food security, native Hawaiian cultural perpetuation, the preservation of working agricultural lands, vitaility of our rural communitiess, and our long-term environmental, social and economic resilience.
