The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>SUPPORTS</u> House Bill No. 0913, RELATING TO THE HAWAII BROADBAND AND DIGITAL EQUITY OFFICE.

The bill, as received by your Committee, would establish the Hawaii Broadband and Digital Equity Office within the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, to aggressively increase broadband affordability, penetration, and competitive availability in the State.

By way of background, the HPCA represents Hawaii Federally-Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs). FQHCs provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines in rural and underserved communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellnessoriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of healthcare.

Hawaii has long been at the forefront of integrating newer technologies into daily life. One example of this is Hawaii's Telehealth Law which has served as a model across the United States. Yet, it was only after COVID struck our islands that this law became fully integrated into daily life.

Today, it is common practice to ZOOM or SKYPE with your health practitioner instead of physically going to the provider's office for a visit. When COVID first hit our islands, many health providers had to limit the number of patients that could be serviced in-person because of a scarcity of Personal Protective Equipment, restrictions in the gatherings of groups, and the need for changes to the physical arrangement of examination rooms and other diagnostic facilities.

For people with adequate broadband access, telehealth was a lifeline for the provision of essential primary health care services. Yet, health care facilities in rural areas experienced the same problems when COVID hit. They too had to limit the number of patients they could see. But because these communities lacked adequate broadband access, they were effectively cut off from primary care. Many were forced to bear their maladies until it became necessary to go to the emergency room.

The Governor's suspension of a statute that prohibits the use of standard telephonic service in telehealth has temporarily eased this inequity. For those without adequate broadband, at least for now, they are able to obtain basic primary care services over landline telephones. But that is neither adequate, tenable, nor fair to the thousands of citizens who lack broadband access.

Because of this, the HPCA views the lack of broadband access in rural areas as an issue of social equity. In this day and age, everyone should have equal access to health care. Telehealth was envisioned as the means of leveling the field between urban and rural areas. The lack of broadband ensures that urban and rural communities remain unequal.

As a member of the Broadband Hui, the HPCA urges your favorable consideration of this bill.

The report – <u>Aging Connected:</u> <u>Exposing the Hidden Connectivity Crisis for Older Adults</u> – commissioned new research by two leading academics on the digital technology gap: John Horrigan from The Technology Policy Institute and Erin York Cornwell from Cornell University.

Should the Hawai'i Broadband and Digital Equity Office, create a workforce with necessary skills for training seniors and disable people so they will become active members of the community.

America's older population is facing a public health crisis as the digital divide restricts their ability to stay healthy, meaningfully engaged, and financially secure amid the pandemic and beyond," said Thomas Kamber, executive director of Older Adults Technology Services. "This new research shows that America is failing to close the digital gap for older adults, who more than ever need the tools to be connected and engaged online. Through our nationwide Aging Connected initiative, OATS looks forward to working with nonprofit organizations, corporate partners, and government policymakers to close the technology gap and expand affordable, quality broadband opportunities for America's seniors."

Testimony in support of HB 913, Relating to the Hawaii Broadband and Digital Equity Office

Honorable Chair Takayama and members of the Committee:

Over the past year, I have seen the potential, the importance, and the need for broadband and digital equity in our state. For this reason, I support HB 913, and the establishment of the Hawaii Broadband and Digital Equity Office within the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT).

When COVID-19 shut down our schools, I was teaching first grade. My school surveyed our families and we learned that a number needed computers and internet access. While our school gathered resources to make sure that those most in need of a chromebook received one, my grade level got together and planned lessons to post on YouTube, with the idea that if they lacked a computer, our students would likely be able to access the lessons on smart phones. Over that last quarter, we learned how to meet online with our students. However, even when chromebooks were provided to those in need, it was still difficult for some students to join sessions, as we struggled to show their families how to use the technology. Over time, it also became apparent that families who had not indicated a need earlier, would have benefitted from a chromebook as different family members required a computer at the same time.

In July, 2020, I retired. Since then, I learned to use online resources to study contact tracing, help a campaign in North Carolina, testify at Board of Education and City Council meetings, text and call people in other states to encourage them to vote, and gather with family. I met with people from other parts of the country and made friends from other islands. I watched my husband help his father meet with a doctor online and obtain a COVID-19 vaccination appointment.

As this pandemic has shown, broadband access has become a necessity, essential to obtain many basic services and to participate in community life. Because my family and I are fortunate enough to have working computers and adequate internet, we have been able to continue to work, learn, get medical help, and participate and engage with our

community. But this is not true for others in our state, like some of my students and their families, and it must be fixed.

As a member of the Digital Equity Committee of the Oahu County Democrats, I have attended Broadband Hui meetings hosted by Burt Lum of DBEDT and read the Hui's Digital Equity Declaration, <u>https://www.broadbandhui.org/</u>, that provides a vision for addressing the digital needs in our communities. I have been inspired by the work being done to provide digital equity and broadband access across our state.

It is essential that the work for digital equity continues and grows, and for that, we will need the support that will come with the establishment of a Broadband and Digital Equity Office. Please support this effort and this bill. Thank you for your consideration.
