On the following measure: H.C.R. 150, URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE AND CONSUMER AFFAIRS TO AMEND TITLE 16, CHAPTER 89, OF THE HAWAII ADMINISTRATIVE RULES TO PROHIBIT REGISTERED NURSES FROM DELEGATING THE INTERPRETATION OF DIAGNOSTIC LABORATORY RESULTS TO UNLICENSED ASSISTIVE PERSONNEL

Chair Yamane and Members of the Committee:

My name is Lee Ann Teshima, and I am the Executive Officer of the Board of Nursing (Board). The Board offers comments on this resolution.

The purpose of this resolution is to urge the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to amend Hawaii Administrative Rule title 16, chapter 89, to prohibit registered nurses from delegating the interpretation of diagnostic laboratory results to unlicensed assistive personnel.

As noted in the first paragraph of the resolution, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) section 457-7.5 already provides that the practice-pervasive functions of assessment, evaluation, and nursing judgment shall not be delegated. As such, the Board does not believe amending its administrative rules to specifically prohibit this act is necessary. In fact, prohibiting this particular practice by rule without identifying other types of prohibited delegation may create uncertainty about the interpretation of this statutory section.

To the extent the Board may need to provide additional guidance or education regarding delegation, the Board is both willing and able to do so.

Comments on HCR150/HR126

Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Tam, and members of the House Committee on Health, Human Services, & Homelessness, thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on HCR 150. This resolution urges the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to amend HAR Title 16, Chapter 89 to prohibit registered nurses from delegating the interpretation of diagnostic laboratory results to unlicensed assistive personnel. The Hawai'i State Center for Nursing (HSCN) respectfully commends the Hawai'i Board of Nursing (BON) for establishing this national standard for delegation through laws and rules by adopting the Model Nurse Practice Act as it relates to the standards and scope of practice.

The topic of this resolution is of great improtance. Improving patient outcomes and addressing potential for harm are high priorities in nursing. Additionally, delegation is one mechanism to ensure patients' care plans are fulfilled and maximizes the healthcare team. Yet, delegation should be limited to appropriate actions conducted by individuals who have the competence to complete the task. In all circumstances, the delegating nurse must evaluate the outcomes and maintain accountability for the delegated task. ¹

In 2010, the Hawai'i State Legislature enacted Act 46, thereby adopting the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) Model Act and Rules related to the standards and scope of practice and delegation. Chapter 457-2.5 and HAR Chapter 89, Subchapter 17 addresses the scope of nursing and standards of care and Chapter 457-7.5 and HAR 89, Subshapter 15 addresses delegation. NCSBN Standards Related to RN Responsibility to Organize, Manage, and Supervise the Practice of Nursing guides that a delegated task "does not require assessment, interpretation, or independent decision making during its performance or at completion."² NCSBN's Natioanl Guidelines for Nursing Delegation also clarifies regarding delegation that a nurse "cannot delegate nursing judgment or any activity that will involve nursing judgment or critical decision making" and "the delegated responsibility is within the delegator's scope of practice."¹

HSCN agrees with the importance addressing misdiagnosis and applauds the State Legislature and the BON's proactive approach to ensuring appropriate delegation practices needed to protect the people of Hawai'i are in place.
