Aloha Chair Nakashima and Members of the Committee:

My name is Kealii Lopez. I am the State Director of AARP Hawaii and we support this bill.

AARP is a non-profit non-partisan membership nationwide organization that advocates for the interest of persons 50+ in age. We have about 38 million members across the nation, including over 145,000 members in Hawaii.

The elderly are disproportionate victims of natural disasters. That is why AARP has a keen interest in maximizing the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency's (HI-EMA) mitigation management capability.

This bill will modify HRS 127A-18 HRS by creating a new special fund that meets the definition of such a fund as found in 37-62 HRS. There are no costs associated with this change. We believe that it will allow the agency to better monitor its hazard mitigation projects and improve fund administration within HI-EMA.
