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## Testimony COMMENTING on S.B. 1138, SD1 RELATING TO THE OFFICE OF HEALTH CARE ASSURANCE SPECIAL FUND.

- 1 **Fiscal Implications:** The intent of this bill is to lessen reliance on general funds by shifting
- 2 costs to special funds. This can only happen if the legislature retains funds in the OHCA special
- 3 fund for the Department's use.
- 4 **Department Testimony:** The Department supports this bill with amendments as originally
- 5 proposed to establish the Department's spending limit through the state's budget process to lessen
- 6 reliance on general funds especially during this period of budget uncertainly resulting from the
- 7 state's economic impacts due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 8 The Department respectfully requests to remove spending limits in statute and replace it
- 9 with the authority to establish the spending limit through the budget process which must be done
- anyway even with a spending limit in statute. This would allow spending to fluctuate from year
- to year as needed. In anticipation of passage of this bill the Department requested an OHCA
- special fund spending ceiling of \$800,000 per fiscal year in its budget request to cover costs of
- salaries and fringe benefits to fund unbudgeted positions that include health care facility
- inspectors and investigations on unlicensed care facilities, fund contracts that support licensure
- survey activities and operating modernization, and to offset other general fund reductions.

1 In addition, this bill would allow the Department to retain revenue in the special fund to 2 provide more special fund funding to the Office of Health Care Assurance (OHCA) and further reduce reliance on general funds during the pandemic. 3 Finally, this bill would authorize contingency spending in statute on unplanned and 4 5 emergency items as approved by the Director of Health consistent with the purpose of the OHCA special fund. For example, if in effect last year, it would have allowed spending on 6 7 communication technologies for skilled nursing facilities' residents to virtually communicate with family during the pandemic and on emergency personal protection equipment (PPE) for 8 residential care homes. Fortunately, federal civil monetary penalty (CMP) and CARES Act 9 10 funds were available but CMP and other federal funds might not be available for future emergencies. The state and OHCA would have to rely on other funding sources or not respond 11 timely to emergencies. 12 13 Thank you for the opportunity to testify in SUPPORT of this measure with amendments 14 as requested. **Offered Amendments:** 15 The purpose of this Act is to [increase] 16 SECTION 1. 17 establish the ceiling of the office of healthcare assurance

3	facility education and outreach to assure appropriate and high-

5	SECTION 2. Section 321-1.4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
6	amended by amending subsections (b) and (c) to read as follows:		
7	$^{\prime\prime}$ (b) Moneys in the special fund shall be expended by the		
8	department of health:		
9	(1) To assist in offsetting operating costs and		
10	educational program expenses of the department of		
11	health's office of health care assurance; and		
12	(2) For the purpose of enhancing the capacity of		
13	office of health care assurance programs to:		
14	(A) Improve public health outreach efforts,		
15	program and community development, and		
16	consultations to industries regulated;		
17	(B) Educate the public, the staff of the		
18	department of health, and other departments		
19	within the State, as well as staff and		
20	providers of all health care facilities and		
21	agencies regulated; [and]		

1	(C)	Administer and support the durable medical	
2		equipment supplier license program	
3		established pursuant to part XLIII[ $\div$ ]; and	
4	(D)	Expend funds in excess of the approved	
5		spending ceiling for emergencies as approved	
6		by the Director of Health. Emergencies may	
7		be identified as man-made or acts of God.	
8		Funds shall only be expended for purposes	
9		identified in this section (b) and total	
10		funds expended shall not exceed the	
11		reasonably anticipated special fund balance	
12		as of June 30 of that year less any reserve	
13		balance. A reserve balance of not less than	
14		\$5,000 shall be maintained as of June 30.	
15	<u>[Not more than</u>	[\$327,000] \$500,000 of the s]Special fund	
16	expenditures approved through the state budget process may be		
17	used during any fiscal year for the activities carried out by		
18	the office of health care assurance. [		
19	(c) Any amount in the special fund in excess of [\$387,500]		
20	\$600,000 on June 30	of each year shall be deposited into the	
21	general funds.]"
