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Testimony in SUPPORT of S.B. 1144 S.D. 2 H.D. 1 RELATING TO MARRIAGE LICENSE FEES

Fiscal Implications: Increase in the marriage license fee will continue the support of the Hawaii
 Birth Defects Program and allow for the modernization of the Vital Statistics data system.

3 Department Testimony: The Department of Health (DOH) **strongly supports** S.B. 1144 S.D.

4 2 H.D. 1, which is part of the Governor's Administrative Package, to increase the marriage

5 license fee to provide fiscal support to continue the work of the Hawaii Birth Defects Program

6 and modernize the outdated Vital Statistics data system. The DOH respectfully requests that

7 the \$100 fee recommended in S.B. 1144 be reinstated in S.B. 1144 S.D. 2 H.D. 1.

8 As specified in HRS §321.422, the purpose of the Birth Defects Program is to collect

9 surveillance information on birth defects and other adverse reproductive outcomes; report the

10 incidence, trends, and causes of birth defects and other adverse reproductive outcomes; report

11 information for the development of prevention strategies to reduce the incidence of birth defects

12 and other adverse reproductive outcomes; and develop strategies to improve the access of

13 children with birth defects to health and early intervention services.

14 There are 43 states that have birth defects programs. The Hawaii Birth Defects Program is

15 needed for the collection, analysis, and reporting of birth defects data. It is an active surveillance

system in which birth defects data are directly abstracted from medical and other records at

17 hospitals and other medical facilities statewide. It provides more complete data (birth defect rate

of approximately 4% births) compared to the limited data in the birth certificate (congenital
anomaly rate of less than 0.2% births).

3 Based on diagnostic codes, the number of possible cases reviewed increased from approximately

4 1,000 to over 2,000 cases in the past few years. Of the cases reviewed each year, approximately

5 400 babies are found to have birth defects and the entire medical record needs to be reviewed.

6 The data is essential to identify and investigate factors which may cause higher rates of birth

7 defects and to provide information to answer community concerns about birth defects in Hawaii.

Increasing the marriage license fee to support the Hawaii Birth Defects Program will ensure that
the program maintains its mandated responsibilities. The Birth Defects Program has been
supported by a fee of \$10 per marriage license since 2002 as mandated by the legislature to help
support identification of risk factors that may affect adverse birth outcomes. However, the
program's salary and fringe expenses have almost doubled between 2002 and 2020. The program
currently does not have sufficient funding for operating expenses.

14 Increasing the marriage licenses fee will support the DOH system that collects the marriage 15 license fees and the vital statistics system that issues the marriage certificates. There were over 21,000 marriage licenses issued to couples in Hawaii in 2019. No portion of the current \$60.00 16 17 marriage license fee is retained by the DOH to maintain the statewide marriage license registration system. The current vital statistics computer system that includes the marriage 18 19 license issuance and registration system is over 20 years old and needs to be modernized. Post 20 9/11 laws like the REAL ID Act create an increased demand for marriage records to prove legal 21 name changes for state-issued driver's license and identification cards. Individuals must provide 22 proof to the Departments of Motor Vehicles that the individual's last name differs from their 23 birth certificate's last name due to marriage to obtain their "gold star" by October 1, 2021.

The increased marriage license fee will also support two spouse and child abuse special funds and marriage license agents which have not had a fee increase since 1998.

26 The DOH respectfully requests that the proposed \$100 fee be allocated as in the chart below:

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Offered Amendments: Re-insert language of SB1144, Sections 2 through 5, as follows: 2

3 SECTION 2. Section 338-14.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:

5 "(c) The fund shall consist of fees remitted pursuant to section 338-14.5[.] and section 572-5. All realizations of the 6 7 fund shall be subject to the conditions specified in subsection 8 (b)."

SECTION 3. Section 572-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended by amending subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows: 10

The department of health shall appoint, and at its 11 "(a) pleasure remove, one or more suitable persons as agents 12 authorized to grant marriage licenses under this chapter in each 13 14 judicial circuit. The agents may issue licenses from any state 15 facility when deemed necessary by the director. Any agent 16 appointed under this subsection and receiving an application for a marriage license shall collect from the applicant for the 17 license [\$60,] \$100, of which the agent, except those provided 18 for in subsection (b), shall retain [\$9] \$15 for the agent's 19

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1	benefit and compensation and shall remit [\$51] <u>\$85</u> to the
2	director of health. Upon the receipt of remittances under this
3	subsection, the director of health shall deposit:
4	(1) [\$32] $\underline{$35}$ for each license issued to the credit of the

6	(2) [\$4.50] <u>\$5</u> for each license issued to the credit of

24	health. Upon the receipt of remittances under this subsection,
