#### SB 1248 – RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL ENTERPRISES

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and members of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means:

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in strong <u>support</u> of the intent of SB 1248 relating to agricultural enterprises. Our first comment is to combine SB 1248 and SB 1025 which appear to be very similar. This testimony is comparable to that provided from HB 871.

Given the desire by the state government, state agencies, and University of Hawai'i at Mānoa (UHM), College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR) to increase all aspects of agriculture for the benefit of the residents of Hawai'i, the Hawai'i Department of Agriculture (HDOA) requires the ability and authority that is outlined in this bill. UHM/CTAHR currently works closely with HDOA. We have developed a document that outlines the different responsibilities of HDOA and UHM/CTAHR, as well as where they overlap and collaborate. This document addresses language in this bill and is a good foundation for meeting this legislations intent.

SB 1248 gives HDOA the ability and authority to accomplish its basic mission to "conserve and protect agricultural lands, promote diversified agriculture, increase agricultural self-sufficiency and assure the availability of agriculturally suitable lands."

UHM/CTAHR understands, through experience, that HDOA is critical to the agricultural future of the state of Hawai'i. It is tasked with diverse responsibilities and focuses on those responsibilities with limited human and monetary resources. SB 1248 and its intent are fundamental to HDOA's mission.

Given the state's current economic difficulties, SB 1248 will also be a mechanism for implementing the needed changes and management objectives with which HDOA is tasked.

Therefore, UH and CTAHR <u>strongly supports</u> the intent of this bill, but is aware of the current financial climate of the State of Hawai'i and realizes that state funding is reduced. UH defers to HDOA on their priorities.

## SENATE BILL NO. 1248 RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL ENTERPRISES

Chairperson Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 1248 relating to agricultural enterprises. This bill establishes a new agricultural enterprise program within the Hawaii Department of Agriculture (Department), establishes the Agricultural Enterprise Special Fund, and requires annual reporting to the Legislature. The Department **strongly supports** this measure, provided this measure does not impact the Executive Budget.

This bill is intended to allow agricultural enterprises on lands under the jurisdiction of the Department. The Department's Ag Park program and the Non-Ag Park program focus on actual, physical farming activity on the land. Limited ancillary activity is allowed only under very narrow conditions and circumstances. Moreover, strict eligibility requirements as a bonafide farmer must be met to hold any long-term lease under both programs. However, the agricultural industry must adapt to rapid developments in technology and methodology in agriculture and aquaculture in order to attain the food sustainability goals of the State. The Department needs flexibility in its disposition of public lands to support those changing conditions by allowing and encouraging the use of innovative agricultural models to optimize productivity,



supporting and promoting agriculture through farmers markets, food hubs and processing facilities, animal feed mills, etc., and enabling or providing agricultural educational training. The business of agriculture is far broader than simply the growing of an organism. This program recognizes that the business of agriculture is just as important to the growth of agriculture as the production of the crop itself.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this measure.

The Land Use Research Foundation of Hawaii (LURF) is a private, non-profit research and trade association whose members include major Hawaii landowners, developers, and utility companies. One of LURF's missions is to advocate for reasonable, rational, and equitable land use planning, legislation and regulations that encourage well-planned economic growth and development, while safeguarding Hawaii's significant natural and cultural resources and public health and safety.

LURF appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony in **support of SB 1248**, and to offer comments.

**SB 1248.** The purpose and intent of this bill is to authorize the DOA or its lessees to plan, design, construct, operate, manage, maintain, repair, demolish and remove infrastructure or improvements on any lands over which the DOA has jurisdiction where the activity is necessary to support and promote agriculture; to accept from the Department of Land and Natural Resources the transfer of any lands that will serve an agricultural purpose; and to efficiently operate or manage those resources.

This measure is also intended to promote and support diversified agriculture and increase agricultural self-sufficiency by establishing an agricultural enterprise program within the DOA, which is found by the Legislature to be in the State's best interests and helps to meet State constitutional requirements.

**LURF's Position.** LURF members include private property owners, farmers and ranchers who own, maintain, and engage in agricultural enterprises, and who consider incentives and programs such as that proposed by this bill critical to the conduct of their operations and to help sustain their businesses. These landowners and agricultural stakeholders believe SB 1248 will greatly assist with initiating such efforts and with the unaffordable costs which must be incurred in connection with agricultural enterprises, projects, and activities. Creation of the Agricultural Enterprises Program will also expressly allow for ancillary and other activities that support the economic viability and success of the local agricultural industry.

As these Committees are aware, the unsustainable costs which have already been cast upon agricultural stakeholders over the past years by various safety and security standards, programs and regulations, as well as the enactment of onerous regulations relating to water systems, infrastructure, and growing and processing machinery and facilities, are now greatly exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, proving to be overwhelming, if not devastating to the agricultural industry as well as the State's long-term objective of sustainable agriculture.

The purpose of this bill is consistent with the underlying intent and objectives of the Important Agricultural Lands (IAL) laws (Hawaii Revised Statutes, Sections 205-41 to 52), which were enacted to fulfill the mandate in Article XI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, "to conserve and protect agricultural lands, promote diversified agriculture, increase agricultural self-sufficiency and assure the availability of agriculturally suitable lands."

LURF therefore lauds the objective of SB 1248, which is to support diversified agriculture; provide needed assistance to agriculture-related operations; and to expand Hawaii's agricultural industry. Passage of the long-awaited IAL legislation would be meaningless without implementation of such measures. By recognizing the significance of, and need to assist the local agriculture industry, and implement incentives and measures which help to support the growth and maintenance of agriculture in the State, this bill significantly helps to promote economically viable agriculture and food self-sufficiency in Hawaii.

As issues relating to and food safety and security continue to be a significant concern, LURF and its members appreciate this measure being taken to assist agricultural stakeholders.

For the reasons stated above, LURF is in **support of SB 1248** and respectfully urges your favorable consideration of this bill.

The East O'ahu County Farm Bureau, which represents approximately 420 farmers and supporters of agriculture from Waimanalo to Kahuku, **strongly supports SB 1248**, "Relating to Agricultural Enterprises," which would establish an agricultural enterprise program under HDOA.

Modern agriculture often requires infrastructure such as greenhouses, shade houses, drip irrigation lines, aquaculture tanks, and processing, packing, and storage facilities. Farmers need to satisfy increased food safety requirements, to conserve water, to reduce fertilizer input, and to protect their crops from pests and diseases while minimizing pesticide use – all while maintaining or increasing yield and quality in order to compete in the marketplace. Farmers, especially new farmers or small-to-medium-size operations, often cannot afford to pay for all the needed facilities. Compounding the problem, current HDOA rules restrict the percentage ownership that outside investors can hold in a farm leasing HDOA lands, making it difficult for farmers to raise funds to build and improve their farms.

SB 1248 would establish an agricultural enterprise program allowing HDOA and/or its lessees to build and maintain agricultural infrastructure on designated lands. Under this program, HDOA could enhance its lands' productive capacity by installing needed facilities, including processing, packing, storage, and distribution facilities that can serve many farms. In addition, the enterprise leases would be subject to different rules than current HDOA leases, allowing for greater private investment in the farms themselves. The enterprise program would strongly encourage the development of new farms and improvements to existing farms on the subject lands. We therefore respectfully urge your committee to support passage of SB 1248.

My name is Isabel Thottam and I am an owner of a plant-based, vegan bakery called Happy Heart Kona. I **support SB 1248**, which authorizes the Department of Agriculture to plan, design, construct, operate, manage, maintain, repair, demolish, and remove infrastructure on any lands under the jurisdiction of the department, to support and promote agriculture. SB 1248 also establishes the agricultural enterprise program and the agricultural enterprise special fund.

This measure supports smaller-scale farming operations, particularly those in diversified agriculture, who often do not have ready access to processing, packing, storage, and distribution facilities, and usually do not have the financial resources to construct these facilities. The agricultural enterprise program would allow HDOA or a lessee to "plan, design, construct, operate, manage, maintain, repair, demolish, and remove facilities" on designated lands.

I support this measure because as a local business owner and baker, I want to be able to source the majority of my ingredients locally. Although I do currently source locally, I find it hard to specifically get local fruit produce in bulk to be able to scale my offerings. Hawaii is home to so many amazing tropical fruits, such as pineapple, dragon fruit, jaboticaba, guava, Surinam

cherries, mango, etc., all of which could be grown to a larger scale to increase the use of these tropical, local fruits in our restaurants and other food businesses. I am personally committed to only using local fruits in my bakery, and I think more businesses would do this if more was available.

Moreover, I think Hawaii is missing a huge opportunity to grow more diverse fruits. I worked for an organic tree fruit orchard in Washington State for 5 years. I know that there is a lot of opportunities for other fruits to be grown in places such as Ocean View, where it would be possible to grow things like cherries, berries, peaches, etc., All it takes is someone being able to invest in doing so and more support from the government to help such farmers get started. If farmers could start growing diversified fruits or more fruit to scale, it would help people have more access to larger quantities of such fruits. I, as an individual citizen, would love to be able to go to the local grocery store and buy locally grown apples, strawberries blueberries, and such - wow, that would be amazing! Even easier would be just having the ability to buy more diverse fruits such as surinam cherries, jaboticaba, guava, and dragon fruit, all of which you can only find in small quantities when they are in season. And from a business perspective, if we could buy fruits and vegetables in bulk, and have access to other agriculture products such as ulu flour, that would give us so much more incentive to source locally.



#### Testimony In Support of SB 1248 – Relating to Agricultural Enterprises via HDOA

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran and Committee Members:

I submit this testimony in STRONG SUPPORT of SB 1248, which establishes a new Agricultural Enterprise Program within the Hawai`i Department of Agriculture (HDOA), sets forth a special fund, and requires annual reports to the Legislature. We realize the tremendous budget shortfalls that exist during this ongoing economic crisis. However, we believe SB 1248 can support critically-needed agricultural infrastructure via the HDOA for post-harvest handling/packing, food safety certification, and perhaps also fruit-fly eradication to assist of Hawai`i's growers. Facilities such as Honalo Marshalling Yard and the Kamuela Vacuum Cooling Plant on Hawai`i as well as the Kalaeloa Harvesting Facility on O`ahu all provide Hawai`i's farmers with the structural elements necessary to transport and market their produce successfully.
