Chair Nishihara and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General (Department) appreciates the intent of this bill but has concerns.

This bill would establish an intergovernmental task force comprised of the Attorney General, the Directors of Public Safety and of Transportation, the Chiefs of Police and the Directors of Planning of all the counties, representatives of various federal agencies, and others, with the purpose of dedicating itself to the eradication of illegal gambling and drug activities

The Department has concerns with section 2 beginning on page 1, line 16, of bill regarding the duties of the task force. Specifically, subsection (d) on page 3, lines 12-14, directs the task force to "examine relevant issues, determine the resources needed to address these issues, and devise a coordinated action plan." However, subsections (d)(1) and (2) then require the task force to establish several initiatives that would more appropriately be examined by the task force when devising the coordinated action plan. The Department recommends that initiatives such as (1) a statewide program to identify and eliminate illegal gambling houses and drug houses, (2) community safe zones throughout the State, and (3) a requirement that lands and structures that may be used for gambling activities be situated more than ten thousand feet from churches, schools,

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and residential areas, should be considered by the task force when fulfilling its duty to "examine relevant issues, determine the resources needed to address these issues, and devise a coordinated action plan." These initiatives should not be mandated without the requisite examination by the task force. The resources and legislative action that may be necessary to accomplish these actions are not known at this time because, as the bill provides, it will be the responsibility of the task force to evaluate such matters and report on its findings to the legislature as provided in subsection (f) on page 4, lines 14-17.

Accordingly, the Department recommends that the words "Activities of the task force shall include:" on page 3, lines 14-15, should be amended to read "In fulfilling its duties under this subsection, the task force shall consider the resources and legislative proposals that may be necessary to accomplish the following:"

Dear Chair Nishihara and Committee Members:

The Maui Police Department OPPOSES the passage of SB 1381 RELATING TO CRIME.

This act, in part, establishes an intergovernmental task force comprised of Federal, State, and local law enforcement agencies to eradicate illegal gambling and drug activities. This is redundant as there is already an inter-county task force and established law enforcement partnerships that we call upon to combat these issues in our respective counties. The act as written will also take away our autonomy to operate within our own unique jurisdictions.

In addition, under SECTION 2(d)(2), the act will identify locations where gambling is permitted, as chosen by the same intergovernmental task force. As a law enforcement agency, we do not support legalized gambling in the State of Hawaii.

Accordingly, the Maui Police Department will NOT SUPPORT SB 1381 as written. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

Comments:

This bill creates an intergovernmental task force where there are already a range of intergovernmental task forces and interagency collaborations. As such, it is duplicative and unnecessary.

Further, less government resources should be dedicated to supply-side interdiction. More resources should instead be dedicated to demand reduction measures like medically supervised treatment for those with diagnosed substance use disorders outside of the criminal legal context.

Policymakers should also seek to reduce criminal penalties for drug possession that place an inordinate toll on governmental resources, including overcrowded jails and prisons.

<u>As noted by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs</u>, Native Hawaiians bear a disproportionate burden of the current punitive response to drug use despite not using drugs at drastically difference rates than other races and ethnicities. This disproportionality is exacerbated by sentencing laws, police and prosecutorial practices, and lack of meaningful treatment opportunities.

The current regime of prohibition has not worked and will not work. Another task force will not rectify those human hardships that are deeply felt by families and communities. A public health approach is much preferable in terms of addressing the reality of substance use and substance use disorder.
