S.B. 151 RELATING TO THE STATEWIDE TRAFFIC CODE

House Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs

The Department of Transportation (DOT) **supports** S.B. 151, relating to the Statewide Traffic Code. This bill clarifies the term "accident" to mean collision for certain provisions of the statewide traffic code.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has been encouraging the term "accident" to be a collision or crash. This was due to the definition of the word "accident" to mean an unplanned event resulting in unintended consequences. In relation to a motor vehicle, all events are planned and intended, i.e. if a driver speeds or drinks, they knowingly believe that some consequences can occur, namely striking another vehicle and injuring or killing someone. As such, NHTSA encouraged everyone to use the term collision because it infers that it was not an unplanned event.

The DOT urges the committee to pass S.B. 151 as it will be consistent with NHTSA and would help to educate the public about accidents verses collisions.

Chair Nakashima, Vice Chair Matayoshi, and members of the House Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu submits the following testimony in <u>support</u> of S.B. 151.

The purpose of this bill is to clarify that that the term "accident"—as used in sections of the Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS") regarding "leaving the scene of an accident"—actually means (and has always meant) "collision." Because the word "accident" *could* be interpreted to mean an incident that occurs purely without any fault, negligence, or state of mind involved, there is currently an argument that "leaving the scene of an accident" should never be charged in conjunction with other offenses such as Negligent Homicide (HRS §707-702.5, -703, -704); or Negligent Injury (HRS §707-705, -706); as those offenses always require that the State prove an offender had a certain state of mind at the time of offense.

From April 2019 through December 2019, our Department was part of a highly dedicated working group—coordinated and facilitated by the Department of Transportation, Highway Safety Division—which spent numerous hours identifying and developing recommendations that would effectively strengthen Hawaii's OVUII laws, and we believe S.B. 151, is reflective of that effort.

For all of the foregoing reasons, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu <u>supports</u> the passage of S.B. 151. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this matter.
