DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports this

measure, DHS currently projects an additional \$1,000,000 appropriation in general funds for operations to maintain the level of benefits and services at pandemic levels. See administration measures SB1088/HB934.

PURPOSE: The purpose of the bill is to appropriate funds to address the response to the COVID-19 pandemic.



AN EQUAL OPPORTUNITY AGENCY

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Since the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic, the caseloads of all major public benefits programs have dramatically increased. The table above illustrates the primary example that shows as of January 25, 2021, Med-QUEST enrollees exceed 400,000 Hawaii residents, a 22.5% increase since March 2020.

We anticipate program caseloads will remain high throughout 2021 and that due to general fund shortfall, we will likely need to maintain this high level of services at current staffing levels.

In State Fiscal Year 2022, we anticipate requiring an additional appropriation of \$1,000,000 in general funds to support the likelihood of overtime and other potential operational expenditures needed to maintain benefits and services as well as to adjust to additional federal changes. In 2020, we incurred overtime costs to process the surge in applications for example, child care subsidies that saw **100% increase** in applications received during April – Oct 2020 versus the same period in 2019, resulting in 60% more families receiving child care subsidies.

The number of individuals now receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Benefits (SNAP) is hovering at 190,000 residents. The table below shows the change in case load since January 2019 through December 2020:



Where appropriate we will be able to access federal match funds. This request is also addressed in administration measures SB1088 and HB934.

These dramatic increases are influenced by numerous programmatic waivers approved by federal agencies. As pandemic related waivers recede and regular program rules are reinstated, we anticipate additional administrative expenses as eligibility redeterminations and other program integrity measures return. We also anticipate with eligibility re-determinations, their will likely be an increase in requests for administrative review and fair hearings.

There may also be operational and IT systems expenditures as we continue to modernize our IT infrastructure and business processes to make access to benefits and services easier for Hawaii's residents and to provide our workforce with better tools and capabilities, while maintaining our priority to everyone's health and safety.
