S.B. 57, S.D. 2, H.D. 2 RELATING TO VEHICLE INSPECTIONS

House Committee on Finance

The Department of Transportation (DOT) **supports** S.B. 57, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, which proposes to eliminate the reconstructed vehicle inspection program on Oahu as of January 1, 2022. The bill also requires the DOT to submit a report addressing the effects of repealing section 286-85 Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) to the Legislature prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025. The Act will be repealed on July 31, 2025 and section 286-25, HRS will be reenacted in the form in which it read on December 31, 2021.

The purpose of the reconstructed vehicle program is to ensure that modifications to motor vehicles do not result in a significant degradation of highway safety. However, the people who inspect the vehicles are not engineers and often lack the expertise necessary to make an accurate judgment of the quality of work that was done on the modifications or their ramifications. To compensate for this weakness, the inspectors often rely on section 19-134-22, Hawaii Administrative Rules, which requires the vehicle owner to obtain approval of the design plans by a registered professional engineer. This is a difficult requirement, because the vehicle owners typically do not have a design plan, and they come to the recon station after the work is finished. Finding an engineer that will accept responsibility for the plans and the work that was done at this point is virtually impossible.

Two modifications that require approval by a registered professional engineer are (1) converting an independent suspension to a straight single axle and (2) a C-notch modification used to lower a vehicle. Both modifications involve welding or cutting the frame. When a frame is cut or welded, it voids the manufacturer's warranty and certification of Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards compliance. The engineer would be asked to identify federal standards that are defeated or compromised by the modification and then explain why the vehicle is as safe or safer than it was before the modification. In addition, the engineer must approve the design plans.

Even if an engineer certifies a plan, that does not guarantee that the modification will be made in accordance with the plan. As a result, people who make or desire to make these modifications cannot pass a recon inspection and register their vehicles in Hawaii.

If Honolulu had no recon program, reconstructed vehicles would need only to meet the regular motor vehicle inspection requirements. These requirements duplicate some of the recon inspection items, such as maximum bumper height and tire treads being covered by a fender or fender flare.

The reconstructed vehicle inspection program is not required on the neighbor islands. In those Counties reconstructed vehicle owners simply need to pass the periodic motor vehicle inspection program to register their vehicles. We suggest that this system should work on Oahu as well as it does on the neighbor islands.

I am Calvin Tong, Major of the Traffic Division of the Honolulu Police Department (HPD), City and County of Honolulu.

The HPD appreciates the intent of Senate Bill No. 57, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, Relating to Vehicle Inspections, and submits the following comments.

Currently, vehicle inspectors at reconstruction stations are severely understaffed. Permitting the state director of transportation to supervise and certify all inspectors authorized to conduct vehicle inspections at official inspection stations will allow the public more options for seeking a reconstruction vehicle permit.

However, we do have concerns with the elimination of the reconstruction permitting process. Without the permitting process, those seeking to modify their vehicles would be given free rein to modify their vehicles as they wish, with possible disregard to the safety of their occupants and other motorists on the roadway.

My name is Li Cobian of the Oahu Motorsports Association.

Our organization supports the Recon Inspection Repeal Bill SB57.

Oahu is the only island in the State if Hawaii with Recon inspection. It is a outdated requirement that started in the 60's that was enacted to inspect cars for stolen parts, it had nothing to do with safety. Current safety check is more stringent that RECON and covers all safety aspects of motor vehicles.

Cars affected by the Recon are Hobby Sports Vehicles ranging from; exotic cars, sports cars, muscle cars, jeeps, crawlers buggies and even lowriders, mainly the FUN weekend cars.

These are CLASS 1 & 2 GVW Category Vehicles that are classified by the Federal Highway Administration AS LIGHT DUTY Vehicles .

There was concern if RECON is repealed that these hobby cars may damage the roads. There is NO Sports modification that would change a Class 1 or 2 GVW vehicle into a class 3 and increase weight to a Higher Duty Vehicle. If Anything sports hobby cars are made lighter after modifications not heavier.

Owners of these Sports Hobby Cars do NOT modify them to make them heavier or to increase the GVW, its not like they are going to use these cars for heavy Transport of Cargo or heavy equipment. These are Sports CARS, they are not made or modified for commercial transport capacity.

Repealing Recon will NOT make these cars heavier and increase road damage. Thus there should not be a increase in Road Tax .

Also this Recon should not be reenacted in 2025 but if this measure passes, SB57 should be REAUTHORIZED contingent to a DOT report. Because what if DOT doesn't do a report on time, RECON should

I appreciate the Reconstruction Law as a privilege to car enthusiasts who wish to modify their vehicles for recreation. A reconstruction permit is needed only if a vehicle is modified beyond the extent that can't be passed by safety check. Safety check doesn't allow for much modification beyond changing tires, exhaust, and body kits. Therefore, I am testifying in opposition to this bill of repealing recon.

My main concern though is that the majority of the community who are following this bill and in support of it are under the impression that with the passing of this bill, they will be free to modify their vehicle as they please (which will still be illegal to do so), making it a safety hazard for public roadways. For example, a straight front axle conversion where the frame is cut and welded to change the axle thus compromising the structural strength of the frame (welds can break causing axle to fall off which will allow for a potential accident while driving) or lifting a vehicle beyond safety regulations (headlights will be higher than normal blinding others in front and inability to see smaller cars in a blindspot). Under the reconstruction law presently, these are not allowed. If the reconstruction law is repealed, then those under the impression of a "free-for-all" will modify with no regard to the safety of others on the road.

To get a reconstruction permit, one only has to pay \$15 for the inspection pass or fail (with 90 days to fix whatever was failed) and can update or change modifications on the permit as needed free of charge.

Some will argue that those who process the reconstruction permits are not well educated in the field. The City & County Motor Vehicle Control who issue the reconstruction permits also manage and certify all the safety check stations and inspectors on the island of Oahu, therefore are well informed of what's required to pass. They were/are ASE certified and were previous safety check inspectors.

The recon station is fully booked into 1 month (they won't book anything past that) which also proves why the reconstruction law is still needed. Many people still want to modify their vehicles to a reasonable extent and need the reconstruction permit to be able to drive the vehicle legally.

I hope this testimony is taken into consideration.

Aloha Committee Members,

As a registered voter and automotive enthusiast, I am here today to submit my written support of Senate Bill SB 57 SD2 HD2 to repeal the requirement of the Secondary Vehicle Safety Inspection also known as the Recon Inspection of reconstructed and or modified vehicles. This secondary vehicle safety inspection is only required and performed in the City & County of Honolulu (CCHNL), at present time none of the other Counties in the State of Hawaii and no other state in the Union of the United States require or perform this type of inspections on reconstructed or modified automotive vehicles. As I recall in its original intent the secondary vehicle inspection was primarily checking the legality of items or components being replaced on motor vehicles, sales receipts of replaced components were required to present at the time of the inspection to insure items were not stolen. As of late this secondary vehicle safety inspection has evolved into an inspection to deem if the vehicle is safe and road worthy to operate on the streets and highway of the CCHNL which is not much different than the annual motor vehicle safety inspections that are performed on every vehicle that operate on the roads across the state. Each of the vehicle safety inspectors throughout the state are individuals that are required to take a test on a scheduled frequency for them to maintain their certification to perform these inspections. Question has been raised whether individuals that perform these secondary vehicle safety inspections are required to hold the same standards as those that perform our annual vehicle inspection. A House Committee raises concerns of an un-inspected reconstructed vehicle weight change would cause more damage to the State's roads. Majority of all the reconstructed vehicles are not one's primary used vehicle for everyday transportation but are more of a leisure or recreational use on weekends, holidays and special events. The vehicles that do more detrimental wear & tear, damage of our State's roadway are the large commercial vehicles each day of the work week.

As you may have read the submitted testimony by the State Department of Transportation both this and last year, they are in support of this measure to repeal the need for the secondary vehicle safety inspection. They have also provided data that the fact that modified and or reconstructed vehicles are not the leading cause of motor vehicle accidents on the roads throughout the State of Hawaii. This year the Honolulu Police Department has submitted written testimony to the State Senate on SB 57 SD2 HD2 in support of the measure along with many other automotive enthusiasts that have submitted their written testimonies in support of this measure. I ask the committee to also support this measure, SB 57 SD2 HD2 that will repeal the need for this secondary vehicle safety inspection.

Please support this bill, to abolish the current reconstruction permitting system. I've been literally in love with modifying vehicles ever since I could drive. When I was young, I would look forward to just working on my car, and I would spend countless hours with modifying suspensions and working on body work...back then, I never followed the rules of obtaining a recon permit, because I always felt that putting in my time and building it safe for myself and for my family, were always safe enough, however, I would always get pulled over for no recon. It finally got to the point where I finally decided to apply for one. When I finally did, it seemed primitive to see how much knowledge these inspectors really had. They didn't really know what they were looking for, in fact, they would turn me down for reasons that would actually fail the regular safety check, such as having a simple sticker on the back window, or the battery wasn't attached well enough. What I'm trying to portray here is that a simple safety check should be sufficient enough to check for a vehicles safety....further more, because we build and do things for the safety of our own families and the safety of our friends, it will be safe. This reconstruction permitting is, as you know doesn't exist in any other states, including even the other neighbor Hawaiian island chain. Given that, if safety was truly an issue, then there would be traffic accidents on the neighbor islands due to unsafe reconstructed vehicles. I also want to point out that there are many vehicles on the road that are modified, and don't have any reconstruction permits, and they are able to avoid it because the vehicles are still brand new, and since their safety check is valid for two years, they're never under the radar since they don't need to obtain a new safety check. In short, I encourage you to pass this and remove the need to obtain a reconstruction permit, as I strongly feel that us car enthusiasts can bring some (it may not be much) income to the state, as we spend money on parts, and even open shops whom modified vehicles. The Oahu Reconstructed Car Inspection is a very complicated, time consuming and expensive issue for anyone needing to get one. Here's how it works...Step One: The office is located in Honolulu on Kapahulu Avenue and does not take appointments. This means you have to one, take the day off from work, and two if your car isn't licensed, you need to find a method of transporting it there. If you have a friend with a trailer that makes it easy but most of us don't have either.

Ok, option two, have your car transported on a car carrier or tow truck! Do you have an extra four to six hundred dollars for the tow? It might be more, depending on where you live. Once you have arrived, the car comes off the truck and is inspected by the Reconstruction Officials. Great if you pass but if you didn't, then you will be returning again, after taking the day off and paying tow charges.

Ok, great you passed, now the tow truck has to take your car to the scale if it was never registered before. The scale is located in the middle of town, so another tow charge to that area and the driver's waiting time. Again, the car comes off the tow truck and is driven onto the scale, the tow truck driver is very upset at all this waiting. After the vehicle is weighed, the tow truck heads to the Safety Inspection Station to inspect your vehicle, another tow, charged by the mile. The Inspector tells you to take the car down from the tow truck so he can inspect it, more lost time and not for free.

Now if you are lucky and your car passed these two inspections, which took most of the day and spent all of your savings, the car is towed home. But wait, you now have a reconstruction sticker but failed a safety inspection since you have no registration. The State Department of Transportation supports the passage of SB 57, to eliminate Oahu's reconstructed car inspection requirement. I whole-heartedly agree with DOT's position for the following reasons:

The Oahu Reconstructed Car Inspection is a very complicated, time consuming and expensive issue for anyone needing to get one. Here's how it works...Step One: The office is located in Honolulu on Kapahulu Avenue and does not take appointments. This means you have to one, take the day off from work, and two if your car isn't licensed, you need to find a method of transporting it there. If you have a friend with a trailer that makes it easy but most of us don't have either.

Ok, option two, have your car transported on a car carrier or tow truck! Do you have an extra four to six hundred dollars for the tow? It might be more, depending on where you live. Once you have arrived, the car comes off the truck and is inspected by the Reconstruction Officials. Great if you pass but if you didn't, then you will be returning again, after taking the day off and paying tow charges.

Ok, great you passed, now the tow truck has to take your car to the scale if it was never registered before. The scale is located in the middle of town, so another tow charge to that area and the driver's waiting time. Again, the car comes off the tow truck and is driven onto the scale, the tow truck driver is very upset at all this waiting. After the vehicle is weighed, the tow truck heads to the Safety Inspection Station to inspect your vehicle, another tow, charged by the mile. The Inspector tells you to take the car down from the tow truck so he can inspect it, more lost time and not for free.

Now if you are lucky and your car passed these two inspections, which took most of the day and spent all of your savings, the car is towed home. But wait, you now have a reconstruction sticker but failed a safety inspection since you have no registration. Honolulu is the only county in the entire 50 states requiring a secondary inspection.

Reconstruction Rules are antiquated and do not make the roads safer.

The latest revision of the rules was written in July 11, 1986, almost 34 years ago. In the 80's there were fewer performance aftermarket companies manufacturing parts/kits for vehicles. Modern aftermarket suspensions are designed on computers offer better fitment and safety. According to 2015 NHTSA crash statistics only 2% of accidents are caused my mechanical failures. 94% are caused by driver error. There is no significant data that shows mandatory auto inspections are making the road any safer.

Requirements for Reconstruction Inspectors are far lower than the requirements for a safety check station.

HAR 19-134-12 Recon Inspector Requirements

(1) Be a high school graduate or have an equivalent education level certificate:

(2) Have at least one year of employment experience in automotive repair or a related technical field (one year of experience in vehicle safety inspection activities or the supervision of vehicle safety inspection activities, may be substituted for this requirement):

HAR 19-142-11 Safety Inspector Certification

(9) Applicant's Technical licenses

HAR 19-142-12

(5) Each applicant shall have 1 year of training in auto mechanics or 2 years of work experience.

(6) complete a performance examination

Safety check stations have licensed mechanics that have ASE certifications. This requires formal education, many hours of on the job experience. ASE certification require multiple testing on different aspects of automotive fields like brakes, suspension and steering, They are also required to renew their certifications every 5 years. The amount of skill and professional experience of a safety check inspector far exceeds the technical knowledge of Reconstruction Inspector. It is redundant to require a secondary inspection by a less qualified person and could open up the state to unwanted liability.

The Reconstruction Office is unable to service public adequately.

According to HAR 19-134-16 Hours of operation. (a) county reconstructed vehicle inspectors and facilities shall be made available on a regularly scheduled basis and for such periods of time as may be necessary to insure that all reconstructed vehicles are inspected in an efficient and expeditious manner. (b) Reconstructed vehicle inspection stations designated by the county department shall have at least one appointed reconstructed vehicle inspector available to conduct inspections for a total of at least four hours during the period from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 pm, five days a week, except designated holidays.

Pre-COVID - 12-4pm only 4 hours a day. The reduced hours are not providing adequate services to the public. They are not providing reasonable times for inspection. Willam Chang, the manger at Motor vehicle control told me the change in hours was due to a staff shortage. In the past they were open at 7:30 am. I have been there when vehicles are backed up to the entrance of the parking lot, preventing people from entering. Wait times are increased and there is only a 4 hour window for inspection.

Present day - the online appointment system is overloaded. It is nearly impossible to get an appointment online. Appointment slots hours are 12:30 to 3:30

Income revenue does not justify staff salaries

Cost of Recon Inspection is \$15

To my knowledge, the are 3 full-time staff members and 3-5 trainees inspecting vehicles. I spoke with Willam Chang as asked how many vehicles were precessed in an average day. He told me 30-50 cars. The cost of reconstruction is \$15. That gives a range of

\$450-\$750 per day

\$9000 - 15,000 per month

\$108,000 - \$180,000 per year

The average office manager makes about \$50,000 a year. Given that information, I suspect the state is losing money on the reconstruction program. I urge the lawmakers to look into the expenses of the department to see if what the actually costs. I think that they will find that it is fiscally irresponsible and costing the taxpayers money. I would also urge the lawmakers to talk to the William Chang at Motor Vehicle Control and get input from the employees that actually work there and run the program.

PMVI could easily be amended to accommodate safety concerns of the public and state agencies.

Aloha Chair Luke and Vice Chair Cullen,

I am in SUPPORT of SB57.

HAR 134 (Reconstruction Permit) was last revised in 1986. Reconstruction inspections have been a problem for many in the automotive industry in Hawaii, from auto enthusiasts, and classic car builders to motorcycle riders and custom car builders.

It is basically a secondary vehicle inspection on top of the primary city safety check inspection for motor vehicles. **Reconstruction inspection was originally put into law to inspect vehicles for stolen parts.** Eliminating reconstruction inspection will not affect any type of state or county vehicle weight tax.

Over the years i have been to the recon inspection station numerous times for my own vehicles and to help others get a fair inspection. I can tell you first hand that the recon inspectors where not the most knowledgeable about vehicle modifications and the components that were modified. Over these years i had got to know Willie who was the supervisor at the time. When talking to the Willie about the gualifications that recon inspectors have he told me they have some basic knowledge of automotive components but no certifications in the field. Now, when we turn to the primary vehicle safety check inspections, we see that 99% of every auto repair shop that provides safety check inspections, are certified automotive technicians who have gone through ASE certification from the national institute for automotive excellence and safety. The clearer picture is that the safety inspection stations are more thorough and experienced on inspecting a vehicle to determine if it is of safe operating order to drive on public roadways. To date, there has been no proof or evidence on any accident occurring on Hawaii's public roads due solely to an unsafe modified vehicle. There os no Recon on the other islands other than Oahu. Those islands have had no problems whatsoever with modified vehicles getting inspections through safety check stations.

As of recently, the recon inspection station has reduced their operating hours from 12pm-3pm monday through Friday, Making it harder for people to get an inspection in a timely matter. We are talking about people who have jobs, who need to take off of work just to get a reconstruction inspection and hope they pass so they can get a safety check. Here's an example of the reconstruction permit process... when you put

aftermarket wheels on your vehicle, you need to get a wheel alignment, then get a temporary safety check, then go to get a recon inspection, then back to get the permanent safety check. This takes up alot of time for people who would simply want to change their wheels. We could eliminate a whole step by just getting a safety check where they will do a thorough check of the safety of the vehicle with these new aftermarket wheels. Another issue is with many military personnel moving in and out of the islands, some bring their modified vehicles with them, it becomes a hassle for them to get their vehicle adjusted to hawaii's recon specifications. Thus alot of military vehicles being abandoned and left behind when getting deployed or when moving back out of state to get restationed.

Economically speaking, if recon is repealed, you will see less derelict and abandoned vehicles dumped on our streets. People will be able to finish their classic car project or fix their modified vehicle instead of having to trash it because they cant get a recon. You will also see a boost in the economy from automotive shops and consumers being able to modify vehicles with out the hassle associated with getting a reconstruction permit. This is a trickle down effect for the auto industry in Hawaii. Consumers will buy from auto shops, Shops will make or buy parts and accessories from the mainland, shipping companies will gain revenue for bringing them in to the islands, trucking companies will deliver cargo to shops, vehicles will get inspected at state safety inspection stations, vehicles stay on the road and pays yearly registration and taxes. This in turn will be a consistent and steady revenue stream for the state and less expenses with removing abandoned vehicles.
