S.B. 667 RELATING TO LICENSE PLATES

SUBJECT: Senate Bill No. 667, Relating to License Plates

I am Calvin Tong, Major of the Traffic Division of the Honolulu Police Department (HPD), City and County of Honolulu.

The HPD opposes Senate Bill No. 667, Relating to License Plates.

The elimination of the requirement for a front or rear license plate decreases our ability to identify vehicles involved in criminal activity by one-half. Some of our leads are based on the identification of a suspect vehicle using the front or rear license plate. A few examples of a these cases are the many pedestrians who only see the front license plate before being struck or fled scene crashes where the suspect vehicle's plate fell off from the vehicle upon impact. If there were no witnesses to the collision, the elimination of one license plate would remove another tool to aid us in identifying a suspect.

Additionally, the absence of the front or rear license plate gives our officers probable cause to effect a traffic stop. These traffic stops in turn usually lead to other criminal activity involvement, such as a stolen vehicle.

The front license plate is used as a reflective material for speed laser devices used during speed enforcement. Eliminating the front license plate will also affect our current and future projects such as the Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR) and the Red Light Enforcement cameras. The full capability of the ALPR is its ability to read The Honorable Chris Lee, Chair and Members February 2, 2021 Page 2

license plates coming towards and away from the officer's vehicle. We would lose 50 percent of the recoverable data without a front license plate.

There are currently 31 states that require front license plates, and the public's opposition to it is purely aesthetic. Owners of high-end and classic cars feel that the front plate detracts from the vehicle's appearance.

The HPD urges you to oppose Senate Bill No. 667, Relating to License Plates, and we appreciate the committee's consideration of these concerns.
