In consideration of SENATE BILL 700, SENATE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO SEARCH AND RESCUE

Senate Bill 700, Senate Draft 1 proposes to require government entities that engage in search and rescue operations to seek reimbursement when the rescued person required search and rescue efforts due to intentional disregard of their own safety, including, but not limited to, disregarding a warning or notice. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) offers comments on this measure.

The Department is in support of any strategy that will incentivize the general public to behave safely in the backcountry, and not endanger themselves or others. The Department produces materials on backcountry and hiker safety and etiquette, and installs signs warning of backcountry hazards. Despite all this, people still manage to get themselves into trouble, either through negligence or ignorance, and the pattern will probably continue. Better hiker data, as provided by a new app in development by the Department, may provide insights on what can be done to help minimize rescue situations.

It should be noted that that county is primarily responsible for search and rescue activities, and the Department defers to the county fire and rescue agencies in regard to the charging of people for rescue. While this may be an incentive for people to obey the rules, it could also discourage people from calling for help when they really need it. What is really needed is a disincentive for people calling for help frivolously, but that would be very hard to enforce.

This legislation is inappropriate for the following reasons:

- We are not applying liability reasonably or fairly. Everyday the majority of our population, in their vehicles, speed, follow too closely, and make improper lane changes. And the majority of our vehicle collisions are the result of this neglience. And this is neglience that actually kills about 130 people a year, puts thousands in the hospital, and causes millions in damage and lost productivity. Logically if we're going to make people that do anything the government doesn't approve of liable for all costs associated with rescue and other governmental services, we need to have that apply to everyone. So don't pass this bill unless you'd do the same for people who do any of the above criminal acts. As you know, that probably includes every senator in this room.

- We are creating a situation where people have to choose between their health and their financial security and future, all while being in an emergency situation. Nothing about that is okay and that's why we administer aid without signatures in the event of a more common automobile collision. This bill serves to undermine our status as a civilized society.

- We don't actually have a widespread problem with rescuing people on illegal hikes. Most of our rescues occur on legal hikes. Many times they are our visitors, the same people who power our economy and allow us to have the lifestyles we all enjoy. So this really is a non-issue and the costs associated with tourism are investments in our own financial security.

- Our larger problem with illegal hikers is our lack of liability protection for the state. And our legislature turned down a bill seeking to protect that protect about 5 years ago. Instead of worrying about the symptoms, let's address the actual problem and work on bills that protect the state from frivilous lawsuits so the Board of Water Supply can breath easy. In the end, unimproved and unincorporated land that's owned by state or county entities should be free to access by all people unless there's a very specific reason it shouldn't be. That reason should not be "because we're afraid of getting sued." It is time to stop criminalizing hikers, not increase our attacks.

- This won't deter hikers if that's the goal, it will only serve to add administrative costs to

any serves rendered as the people with liaiblity will simply refuse to pay or work a deal. This will also be great at creating lots of articles making worldwide circulation that will show how petty Hawaii is, potentially reducing our visitor counts. This may very well cost our state lot and lots of money in tourism income.

This bill probably won't stand up to judicial review anyways, so let's save ourselves the time, money, and trouble associated with passing poor legislation; vote no on this bill.

I STRONGLY SUPPORT SB 700 SD1. Our tax dollars should NOT be paying for the rescue of people that purposely decide to holoholo OFF of the trails and hiking paths. Everyone that hikes has a kuleana to take care of themselves and follow the rules. I just witnessed yet another rescue by HFD in their helicopter here in Kamilonui Valley over the weekend. Its beyond time to charge people for unnecessary rescues. Maybe then they will think before they decide to venture off the paths.

Aloha mai kakou,

I am a lineal descendant of 'ohana who trace our mo'okū'auhau to Pololū valley which has in recent years reached its max capacity of visitors and therefore, a steady increase in traffic resulting in massive search and rescue efforts. In just this calendar year of 2021, there have been no less than five (5) extrication efforts made by the County of Hawai'i Fire Department for individuals and families in Pololū and beyond. I also write to you as the wife of a Rescue Fire Personnel who has intimate knowledge of the valley trails since he grew up just ma uka of the valley. More often than not residents of this area will advise tourists who then decide to pursue their hike despite posted placards, warnings, and verbal instructions to not go down into the valley because they are unprepared to deal with sudden flash floods, rip tides, strong currents, and big surf. Moreover, when tourists and residents alike access other valleys through Pololū they are in fact trespassing onto private property and should be fined for not only their extrication but also, violating state and county laws. It is extremely frustrating in my position to have to educate visitors who do not take the necessary time to read through the possible dangers and potential threats to their lives when they undertake their hikes thereby, putting their rescuers in a perilous position too.

I want to articulate that legal hunting that has been granted to individuals permitted by leaseholders and property owners to eradicate invasive species, kanaka maoli entering wao nahele realm to gather plants for cultural practices, and clean up the trail paths are an entirely separate faction of people that have expert knowledge of these spaces. The law should take into consideration how to pursue their reimbursement when it comes to these folks who do their best to malama 'aina, incorporate conservation practices, and cultural ideologies that are essential to the kanaka way of life. All human life is sacred and no one should be treated as a special case but, I think that this law neglects the existence of people in the aforementioned context who have permission to go beyond the trails and require assistance.

Dear Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Keohokalole, and Members of the Committee on Judiciary:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on SB 700, SD1, RELATING TO SEARCH AND RESCUE. I appreciate the intent of the bill and advocate having the state and counties seek reimbursement from those who enter "state, county, or private property that is closed to the public and marked with a sign giving notice of a closure", and need to be rescued. I also support the additional language in Section 137-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

My comments are as follows:

- The bill should be broadened to include search or rescue for those who engage in ocean recreation (swimming, surfing, stand-up paddleboarding, kayaking, SCUBA diving, freediving, cliff-jumping, spearfishing, etc.). China Walls, a treacherous surf break in East Oahu, has been the site of numerous deaths and serious injuries. Many inexperienced and weak swimmers often underestimate their abilities or the existing dangers and ignore warnings to stay out of the water, resulting in ocean rescues by lifeguards and/or bystanders.
- The bill needs to include adequate resources for outreach and education of visitors about the safety and potential dangers on land and at sea. Such dangers include flash floods, strong winds, strong currents, and high surf. Although there are safety videos online, there is no assurance that these videos are actually viewed by people.
- There are various mobile phone apps that may be used to communicate and educate outdoor enthusiasts.
- The bill needs to include a means for the state and counties for enforcement of the law and reimbursement of expenses. If a visitor is rescued, but does not have an ID on his/her person at the time of the rescue, how can that person or his/her estate be properly billed for the rescue?
