2 Department Testimony: The Department of Health (Department) supports SCR0023 SD1 to ensure that recyclable plastic waste collected by the Department's Deposit Beverage Container 3 Program redemption centers are transported in compliance with the 2021 amendments to the 4 Basel Convention on the Control of Transboundary Movements of Hazardous Wastes and their 5 Disposal. The Department respectfully requests that SCR0023 SD1 be amended to acknowledge 6 7 that the Department does not have the enforcement authority to compel out-of-state recycling destinations to which the State's recyclable waste may be transported to abide by the 8 9 environmental standards as outlined by the Basel Convention.

Aloha, Chair Lowen, Vice Chair Marten, and Members of the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection:

The Environmental Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i and its Natural Resources Committee are in **strong support** of SCR 23, SD1 as this Resolution urges the Department of Health's Environmental Management Division to Ensure that destinations to which the State's recyclable waste is transported for out-of-state processing abide by the environmental standards as outlined in the Basel Convention.

The overarching objective of the Basel Convention is to protect human health and the environment against the adverse effects of hazardous wastes. Its scope of application covers a wide range of wastes defined as "hazardous wastes" based on their origin and/or composition and their characteristics, as well as two types of wastes defined as "other wastes" – household wase and incinerator ash.

The provisions of the Convention center around the following principal objectives;

- (1) The reduction of hazardous waste generation and the promotion of environmentally sound management of hazardous wastes, wherever the place of disposal;
- (2) The restriction of transboundary movement of hazardous wastes except where it is



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perceived to be in accordance with the principles of environmentally sound management; and

(3) A regulatory system applying to cases where transboundary movements are permissible.

The regulatory system is the cornerstone of the Basel Convention. Based on the concept of prior informed consent, it requires that, before an export may take place, the authorities of the State of export, i.e., Hawaii, notify the authorities of the prospective States of import and transit, providing them with detailed information on the intended movement. The movement may only proceed it and when all States concerned have given their written consent (articles 6 and 7). In the event of a transboundary movement of hazardous wastes having been carried out illegally, i.e., in contravention of the provisions of articles 6 and 7, or cannot be completed as foreseen, the Convention attributes responsibility to one or more of the States involved, and imposes the duty to ensure safe disposal, either by re-import into the State of generation or otherwise (articles 8 and 9). The Democratic Party of Hawai'i (Party) has adopted at its 2018 State Convention, clear safeguards to promote and protect our clean and healthy environment. At page 17 of the Party Platform, it specifically provides, to wit:

We believe in supporting best management practices in sustaining our environment and in increased citizen involvement. We support programs that encourage sustainable clean, efficient, creative and environmentally friendly modes of transportation, recycling and waste reduction.

The conservation, preservation and restoration of Hawai'i's natural resources are connected to health and welfare of our people; therefore, we support the conservation and protection of our natural environment, which includes reducing our carbon footprint for the benefit of current and future generations.



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We support the protection of our ' $\bar{a}ina$ against destruction by corporate, government, or military usage and expect full restoration and reparation of environmental damage.

We believe in the vigorous enforcement of our environmental laws and increased publicprivate stewardships and citizen involvement in protecting our resources.

We know that climate change is a real threat to our islands and the world. We strongly urge our candidates and elected officials to take immediate action to mitigate and adapt to the consequences of climate change. This includes funding adaptation measures including coastal retreat, effective participation of indigenous peoples in climate change governance, and recognition that indigenous, local, and traditional ecological knowledge is key in climate change adaptation solutions.

We strongly urge you to pass SCR 23, SD 1 as this Resolution urges the Department of Health's Environmental Management Division to ensure that destinations to which the State's recyclable waste is transported for out-of-state processing abide by the environmental standards as outlined in the Basel Convention, all of which requirements are consistent with the Democratic Party Platform as they require the vigorous enforcement of our environmental laws to observe the fundamental principles of environmentally sound waste management in protecting our resources.
