Re: S.C.R. No. 7 / S.R. No. 5

The Hawai'i Civil Rights Commission (HCRC) has enforcement jurisdiction over Hawai'i's laws prohibiting discrimination in employment, housing, public accommodations, and access to state and state funded services (on the basis of disability). The HCRC carries out the Hawai'i constitutional mandate that no person shall be discriminated against in the exercise of their civil rights. Art. I, Sec. 5.

The HCRC supports S.C.R. No. 7 and S.R. No. 5, which, if adopted, would require the Disability and Communication Access Board, in collaboration with the Office of Enterprise Technology, to convene a Working Group on Accessible Government Documents

Pursuant to the Americans with Disabilities Act, all documents posted on the internet by any government agency must be accessible. However, technology sometimes moves more quickly than many of its users, and not all documents posted are actually accessible. As a proposed member of the working group, the HCRC supports S.C.R. No. 7 and S.R. No. 5 and looks forward to working with the expert groups charged with helping the State of Hawai'i create solutions for accessibility.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 7/Senate Resolution 5 – Requesting the Disability and Communication Access Board, in Collaboration with the Office of Enterprise Technology Services, to Convene a Working Group on Accessible Government Documents

The Disability and Communication Access Board (DCAB) supports the intent of Senate Concurrent Resolution 7/Senate Resolution 5, which asks DCAB and the Office of Enterprise Technology Services to convene a working group on accessible government documents.

When it comes to accessible government documents, Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act requires state and local governments to provide equal access for individuals who are disabled, especially persons with communication access needs. It is acknowledged that the increasing use of technology to post government documents on state agency websites has presented challenges with ensuring compliance with accessibility requirements. Convening a working group to address various issues involving accessible government documents would be a positive step in overcoming such challenges and ensuring equal access for persons with disabilities.

Unfortunately, DCAB cannot serve as a co-chair of the proposed working group due to a lack of staff. DCAB lost its Communication Access Specialist position, which had responsibility for providing technical assistance on issues involving website accessibility, including the concerns raised by SCR 7/SR 5. Nevertheless, DCAB would like to contribute input as part of the working group.

Good afternoon committee chairs, vice chairs, and members. My name is Katie Keim, a blind business woman residing at 2943 Kalakaua Avenue in Honolulu, and a member of The National Federation of the Blind of Hawaii. I strongly support SCR 7, SR 5 and the position of The National Federation of the Blind of Hawaii.

The inaccessibility of government documents that I cannot fully access or not at all is a daily challenge during my work, civil community advocacy and care and maintenance of my health. The resolution clearly addresses the issue I and other blind individuals deal with attempting to access vital state agency information and I ask you for your full support on this resolution.

7 years ago I worked as a public servant in 1 of our state agencies. The job application was not accessible to me even using my alternative technology. It required I seek assistance from a sighted individual. Although during my public service, I had access to a shared administrative assistant, I spent at least three times as long completing many of the forms required in my professional capacity or adding an extra load to my assistant who served 4 other professionals who did not have the barrier to access the documents i did.

Today as a business woman in the private sector, government documents are still a requirement to do business in Hawaii and most of them are not accessible for me using alternative technology. Again, although I have an office manager and bookkeeper I hire, it is added cost to my business to have them fill out forms that I should be able to do if the forms were fully accessible to the blind.

With the COVID pandemic, we run into scheduling barriers for tests and vaccinations putting us at risk with no alternatives to set our appointments that we should be able to easily do with our alternative technology.
