A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTHCARE WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that, as a result of the
- 2 novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19), many healthcare facilities
- 3 experienced unprecedented staffing shortages as staff members
- 4 became sick or were dedicated to COVID-19 treatment units and
- 5 therefore unavailable for other types of duties.
- 6 The legislature additionally finds that this staffing
- 7 shortage increased burdens on patients, other workers, and the
- 8 healthcare system and could be alleviated in the future by
- 9 investing in the healthcare workforce pipeline.
- 10 The legislature also finds that, according to the
- 11 Healthcare Association of Hawaii's 2019 Hawaii Healthcare
- 12 Workforce Initiative Report, there were two thousand two hundred
- 13 unfilled non-physician healthcare jobs across the State. The
- 14 professions with the highest demand include many entry-level
- 15 fields such as medical assistants, nurse aides, patient service
- 16 representatives, and phlebotomists. Open positions in these
- 17 fields take, on average, between six and twelve months to fill.



1 The legislature further finds that healthcare educational 2 programs in high schools and community colleges that offer 3 healthcare training and certifications have been a success. 4 These programs expose students to the career possibilities 5 within healthcare at a young age, allowing certain students to receive healthcare credentials, hands-on training, and college 6 credits that enable many participants to begin their careers in 7 8 entry-level positions that pay well above minimum wage. 9 Existing educational programs, such as high school health 10 academies or certain pipeline programs at community colleges, 11 can serve as a template for efforts to expand and enhance the 12 State's healthcare workforce pipeline. 13 The legislature further finds that the pandemic created a 14 difficult economic environment for the State. While not every 15 displaced or newly employable worker can enter into healthcare, 16 it is a viable field for many in the State to help fill the

State's healthcare shortages. This is an opportunity to support

local jobs and educational opportunities in a field that needs

eligible workers.

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1	The purpose of this Act is to establish a public-private

4	SECTION 2. Chapter 202, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
5	amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately		
6	designated and to read as follows:		
7	"§202-A Healthcare workforce development; public-private		
8	partnership	o. (a) The workforce development council shall	
9	implement a	and manage a public-private partnership to develop and	
10	increase th	he healthcare workforce in the State. Subject to	
11	available 1	funds, the public-private partnership shall:

9	(7)	Offer paid internship programs to ease the transition
10		to employment in the healthcare industry after
11		graduation;
12	(8)	Provide transportation and other supports necessary to
13		ensure equitable access to educational, training, and
14		internship opportunities; and
15	<u>(9)</u>	Expand offerings at community colleges that put
16		students into a direct workforce pipeline.

- 4 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the healthcare
- 5 workforce development special fund the sum of \$ or so
- 6 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 and
- 7 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 8 year 2022-2023 to implement and manage a public-private
- 9 partnership to develop and increase the healthcare workforce in
- 10 the State.
- 11 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the workforce
- 12 development council for the purposes of this Act.
- 13 SECTION 4. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 14 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 15 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 16 the new sections in this Act.
- 17 SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
- 18 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.
