1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8	WHEREAS, from 1980 to 2014, wages for the bottom half of income earners in the United States grew by one percent, while wages for the top one percent of income earners grew by two- hundred five percent as a result of policy and court decisions that have stripped workers of the power to stand together and bargain for fairer wages, meaningful benefits, and proper working conditions; and
9	WHEREAS, the erosion of the standard-of-living of the
10	working class in the United States has contributed to a divided
11	society and pushed some individuals to embrace racism and
12	xenophobia; and

14	WHEREAS, unionized workers earn over thirteen percent more
15 16	than comparable nonunionized workers and receive fairer wages, better benefits, and have better working conditions; and
17	better benefitts, and have better working conditions; and
18	WHEREAS, special-interest attacks on state and federal
19	labor laws have eroded union membership among workers from
20	thirty-three percent in 1956 to just ten percent in 2018; and

meaningful monetary penalties for violations of the 1 NLRA against corporations and corporate officers; 2 3 4 (2) Prohibits employers from interfering with union elections, including the act of requiring workers to 5 6 attend meetings that are intended to dissuade them 7 from forming a union; 8 9 (3) Enhances worker rights to support boycotts, strikes, and similar acts of solidarity; 10 11 (4) Clarifies that employers are prohibited from forcing 12 employees to waive their rights to engage in 13 collective or class-action litigation; 14 15 (5) Allows employers and unions to enter into agreements 16 that allow unions to collect fair-share fees that 17 cover the costs of collective bargaining and 18 19 administration of the applicable collective bargaining 20 agreement; 21 (6) Facilitates timely first contracts between employers 22 and newly formed unions by requiring mediation and 23 24 arbitration to settle disputes; 25 Closes loopholes in existing federal law that allow 26 (7) 27 employers to exclude employees from becoming union members by misclassifying them as supervisors or 28 independent contractors; and 29 30 (8) Prevents workers from being denied remedies due to 31 32 their immigration status; and 33 WHEREAS, passage of the Protecting the Right to Organize 34 35 Act is crucial to restoring a healthy balance between the rights of labor and management and raising the standard-of-living of 36 37 the working class; now, therefore, 38 39 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, the 40 House of Representatives concurring, that the United States 41 42 Senate and the President of the United States are respectfully
