SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU TO CONDUCT A STUDY
EXAMINING THE EFFICACY OF THE HAWAII CARES PROGRAM OFFERED
BY THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH'S BEHAVIORAL HEALTH
ADMINISTRATION ADULT MENTAL HEALTH DIVISION.

1 WHEREAS, Oahu has about 4,448 homeless people, twenty-three
2 percent of whom report having mental health issues, and eighteen
3 percent of whom report having a substance use problem; and
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5 WHEREAS, many of those homeless people have encounters with
6 the police that result in arrest and incarceration when
7 experiencing a behavioral health crisis; and
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9 WHEREAS, calling the police to intervene when someone is
10 experiencing a behavioral health crisis can be deadly both for
11 law enforcement and community members; in the United States, at
12 least one in four people killed by the police has a serious
13 mental health problem; and
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15 WHEREAS, a mobile response team comprised of qualified
16 health care professionals would be much more effective than the
17 police in responding to homeless people in distress and others
18 with mental health and/or substance use disorders, and this new
19 approach could save the State millions in incarceration,
20 ambulance, and emergency room costs; and
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22 WHEREAS, an example of a jurisdiction that has successfully
23 implemented mobile non-violent response teams is the Crisis
24 Assistance Helping out on the Streets (CAHOOTS) Program in
25 Eugene, Oregon, which in 2019, responded to twenty-nine thousand
26 calls, about twenty percent of the city's dispatches, of which
27 only one-half of one percent required police backup; and
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29 WHEREAS, the CAHOOTS Program reports that it saves the city
30 of Eugene approximately \$22,500,000 in public safety, ambulance,
31 and emergency room costs every year; and

2 WHEREAS, currently, the Department of Health's Behavioral
3 Health Administration Adult Mental Health Division coordinates
4 crisis services statewide, which comprise an array of options
5 that are accessible by contacting the Hawaii CARES Program,
6 including the State's twenty-four-hour a day, seven days a week
7 behavioral health call center; and
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9 WHEREAS, when an individual contacts the Hawaii CARES
10 Program and indicates a need for community-based behavioral
11 health support, CARES staff assist the individual by linking
12 them to appropriate crisis services, including crisis mobile
13 outreach, mental health emergency workers, short-term
14 stabilization beds, and twenty-four-hour residential group home
15 placement with specialized programming; now, therefore,

17 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first
18 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, the
19 House of Representatives concurring, that the Legislative
20 Reference Bureau is requested to conduct a study examining the
21 efficacy of the Hawaii CARES Program offered by the Department
22 of Health's Behavioral Health Administration Adult Mental Health
23 Division; and

25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study include the
26 following:
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- 28 (1) A summary of the responses and interventions made by
29 the Hawaii CARES Program during the past five years,
30 including intervention responses to incidents related
31 to mental health, substance abuse, suicide threats, as
32 well as providing conflict resolution and welfare
33 checks on the island of Oahu;

- 35 (2) Whether any of the responses and interventions listed
36 in subparagraph (1) involved an armed response; and
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- 38 (3) A financial report for the preceding five fiscal
39 years; and
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41 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in conducting the study, the
42 Legislative Reference Bureau is requested to seek input from the




