SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THAT THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, HAWAII HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION, BIG ISLAND INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION, OAHU INTERSCHOLASTIC ASSOCIATION, INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE OF HONOLULU, MAUI INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE, AND KAUAI INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION CREATE A PLAN TO IMPLEMENT BASS FISHING AS A SANCTIONED HIGH SCHOOL SPORT.

1	WHEREAS, bass fishing is a popular sport in the United
2 3	States; and
4	WHEREAS, high school fishing is one of the fastest-growing
5 6	sports in the nation; and
0 7	WHEREAS, the State has an existing population of largemouth
8	bass fish for which the Department of Land and Natural Resources
9	issues fishing licenses; and
10	
11	WHEREAS, nationally, bass fishing supports more than
12 13	828,000 jobs and generates more than \$48,000,000 annually in retail sales; and
13 14	recarr sares; and
15	WHEREAS, bass fishing is recognized as a high school sport
16	in Arkansas, Georgia, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan,
17	Mississippi, Missouri, New Hampshire, Texas, and Vermont; and
18	
19 20	WHEREAS, there are multiple local, national, and
20 21	international organizations that promote bass fishing tournaments, including the Hawaii Freshwater Fishing
22	Association, the Bass Federation, and Fishing League Worldwide
23	that can provide guidance for the implementation of bass fishing
24	as a high school sport; and
25	
26	WHEREAS, local bass fishing led to the launch of the Let's
27 28	<i>Go Fishing</i> show in 1969 and has been featured on the popular Animal Planet show, <i>Top Hooker</i> , in 2017; and
20 29	Animal Flance Bnow, Top nookel, In 2017; and
30	WHEREAS, Hawaii has an established history with bass fish
31	beginning with the first observation on the island of Hawaii in

1856, followed by observations on Oahu, Maui, and Kauai in 1897; 1 2 and 3 WHEREAS, a Kauai Economic Development Board survey compiled 4 5 in 2000 reported that anglers rated Hawaii as the second most popular destination to visit for freshwater fishing; and 6 7 WHEREAS, Oahu has a pre-established bass hatchery located 8 9 at Wahiawa Middle School, which is supplied by the Department of 10 Agriculture's Division of Aquatic Resources; and 11 WHEREAS, the Division of Aquatic Resources receives federal 12 13 funding from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services' Sport Fish Restoration Program fund; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the Sport Fish Restoration Program provides grants 16 to the states for fishery projects, boating access, and aquatic 17 education to ensure the continuation of sport fish 18 19 opportunities, including freshwater sportfish; and 20 WHEREAS, high school sports instill a sense of pride and 21 22 belonging in students, gives students a reason to attain academic achievement, and provides a competitive outlet for our 23 24 keiki; and 25 WHEREAS, accredited colleges and universities offer partial 26 27 and full scholarships for members of collegiate bass fishing 28 teams; and 29 30 WHEREAS, the State and the people of Hawaii would benefit from increased awareness of this traditional sport; now, 31 32 therefore, 33 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 34 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, 35 36 that the Department of Education, Hawaii High School Athletic Association, Big Island Interscholastic Federation, Oahu 37 38 Interscholastic Association, Interscholastic League of Honolulu, 39 Maui Interscholastic League, and Kauai Interscholastic Federation are requested to create a plan with clear goals to 40 41 establish bass fishing as a sanctioned high school sport by 42 January 1, 2022; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii High School Athletic Association is requested to provide a report of its progress, findings, and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the Regular Session of 2022; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 8 Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the Board of 9 Education, Superintendent of Education, Executive Director of 10 the Hawaii High School Athletic Association, Executive Director 11 of the Big Island Interscholastic Federation, Executive Director 12 of the Oahu Interscholastic Association, Executive Director of 13 the Interscholastic League of Honolulu, Executive Director of 14 the Maui Interscholastic League, and Executive Director of the 15 Kauai Interscholastic Federation. 16
