The Obama Hawaiian Africana Museum is a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation incorporated in Hawaii with a volunteer governing board whose members have no material conflict of interest and serve without compensation. The OHAM is in full compliance with **HRS 42F-103**.

3. Public Purpose

Obama Hawaiian Africana Museum (dba) is currently housed on the 2nd Floor of the Hawaii National Bank building, 1311 Kapiolani Boulevard, Suites 203/207 on the mauka

side of Ala Moana Center. The museum uses the common space to exhibit history about the early Africana settlers, WWII Pacific Theater and Pearl Harbor history to educate visitors (residents & tourists).

In 2021, Hawai'i domestic visitor arrival totaled 5,788,669. Approximately 25% were African American visitors whooccupied rooms in Waikiki hotels.



The museum volunteers welcomed over 500 visitors on the 2nd floor of Hawai'i National Bank building in 2021. They came looking for local history about the 44th President. The museum's small gallery space provided visitors an opportunity to learn about Hawaiian Africana descendants and the experience of the early African settlers to the Hawaiian Islands long before the missionaries arrived in 1820.

The museum repository consists of rare hidden historical documents about Africana settlers, and their Hawaiian descendants, retrieved from the State and Bishop Museum archives from the late 1700s through WWII and to the present.

Since 2006, the organization has been exhibiting photographs, archival documents, and artifact in these public venues: Honolulu Hale Municipal Gallery, public libraries, the University of Hawai`i at Manoa, military bases, and public schools.

OHAM's partnerships include the National Park Service, World War II Valor in the Pacific, Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum, Historic Hawai'i Foundation, Hawai'i Judiciary History Center, NAACP, and the Department of Education schools.

In addition, the Quonset Hut structure in Pearl City was nominated in 2019 to the National Register for Historic Places. The structure was one of 100 Quonset huts in Manana Barracks where African Americans military personnel lived in segregated housing during WWII at Pearl Harbor. Nearby at Ft. Shafter, there was another segregated housing unit for Black military personnel that has been demolished.

On August 24, 2021, the National Park Service Underground Network for Freedom in collaboration with OHAM commemorated the Anthony D. Allen Wayside Signage Ceremonies at the Washington Middle School where Mr. Allen made Hawai`i his home 211 years ago.

II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

In 2018, the tradename Obama Hawaiian Africana Museum was registered with DCCA, and DUNS subsequently. The parent organization is the African American Diversity Cultural Center Hawaii.

The Obama Hawaiian Africana (OHAM) museum's repository consists of historical documentation about Cape Verde African settlers of Portuguese descent whose heirs are part-Hawaiian. During the nineteen century, Blacks came to the islands on British and American merchant and whaling vessels as ship hands. These young men jumped ship to escape slavery were from Africa, Brazil, and Caribbean and later from North America. The earliest know settler of African descent was a man called Mr. Keaka`ele`ele (Black Jack) who lived on O`ahu starting in 1796. He became a sail master for King Kamehameha II and made a living in the maritime industry. Anthony D. Allen arrived in 1810 was of African descent. He was an advisor to King Kamehameha the Great for many years, including at the time the King died in May 1819.

In 1898, the first black civil rights lawyer, Thomas McCant Stewart arrived in Hawaii with several letters of references from white NY lawyers, and one from ex-president Grover Cleveland. Stewart became immersed in local politics. He is credited with the initial effort to obtain self-government in Hawaii which led to Hawaii's statehood. Stewart and four other members of the committee drafted the Municipal Act of Honolulu. Stewart became the first black American to appear before the Hawaii Supreme Court. Between June 1899 and November 1904, Stewart appeared before the Hawaii Supreme Court sixteen times defending Queen Liliuokalani land rights and rights of Chinese under the Chinese Exclusionary Act.

In 1901, William Francis Crockett, an 1888 graduate of the University of Michigan's law school, arrived in Wailuku, Maui where he practiced law. Charles Cottrill, a black lawyer was appointed by President Taft to be Hawaii's Tax Collector in 1911. The following individuals served in the Hawaii Territorial Legislature: Stewart, Crockett, Cottrill, and Nolle Smith; serving after statehood were Charles Campbell, and Helene Hale, to name a few that were the most noted Black contributors to Hawaii history since the late 1700s to the present.

In addition, the mini-gallery exhibit includes photographs and personal stories that classmates and teachers shared about the early childhood of the 44th President life grow-up in the islands.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request:

The board of directors are requesting \$1Million toward acquiring the historic property at 2234 University Avenue, where keiki o ka 'aina lived beginning at 3-years old with his mother and grandparent from 1963-1967, or a similar property in the Obama Neighborhood in Manoa or Makiki. The property was owned by Stanley & Madelyn Dunham and later sold it. It was advertised as the childhood home of the 44th President, The owner is aware he owns the historic property.

The site facility will be a repository to house OHAM's historical collection of archival documents, artifacts and exhibit space and a gathering place to talk story about Africana ethnocultural identity to strengthen our evolving diverse community by educating present and future generations of world leaders.

In addition, the site will honor the birthplace of the o ka `aiana son of Hawaii who became the 44th U.S. President.

In 2019, several members of the Board of Directors meet with Senator Donovan Dela Cruz, and Senator Gilbert Keith-Agaran to talk about the best approach to honor the President. All agreed that a facility would be appropriate by having a site. The property was recently sold by the Christian Church in Manoa who chose not to destroy the facility because it was associated with the 44th President.

The board of directors' interim plan for the next 24 months is to raise \$3M to acquire the site and operation costs.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;



The public purpose and need to be served at the historic site: to showcase over two centuries of archival collections (documents, photographs & artifacts), the hidden history about the daily life of Africana settlers and their Hawaiian descendants. Additionally, the museum's collection focus on the common threads and the different cultural patterns about the Islands' diverse population to share in

schools and visitors. OHAM's interpretative program displays provide visual representation for residents, students and visitors to gain knowledge about the Africana people's cultural heritage that is not well-known.

In 2006, the City & County of Honolulu Culture and Arts Department invited the Museum to use its public venue to exhibit Africana history in the Municipal Gallery. The Obama Hawaiian Africana Museum is the only institution in Hawaii that exhibit Africana diverse history. OHAM's exhibits tell stories about how our communities and our cultures came to be. In addition, the collection is a significant resource for the community. The museum's central theme: 'cultural heritage' grounded in human aspiration to cultivate respect, peace, and a harmonious environment to broaden the intellectual conversation.

4. Describe the target population to be served:

In 2012, Smithsonian sent two historians, both worked under Lonnie Bunch, the Chief Executive Officer of the Smithsonian Institute, to check the organization's focus and purpose. After a week's engagement with Senator Inouye's staff, University of Hawaii Chancellor and several Navy Admirals, it was concluded that the Museum's target population consist of youth (K12), general public (residents 1.5 million population) and visitors.

5. Describe the geographic coverage:

OHAM has statewide presence through membership, and the board of directors' composition includes representatives from various islands, and programs in public and private schools. Over the past 20 years, the Museum has served more than 150,000 school students throughout the islands, engaging them at school assemblies, elementary classroom activities (K6), middle and high school social studies classrooms, public venue exhibits, lectures at the universities and military bases.

In 2021, CBS Insider Exclusive Network TV affiliates 'Justice in America' produced a TV Special "Obama Hawaiian Africana Museum" for social media promotion to raise funds for preserving the childhood home of the 44th President.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes






\$5,000, and Hawaii Medical Institute \$2,500, and numerous businesses. OHAM is proud of its grant management.



The President/Museum Director, Deloris Guttman, has the overall responsibility for the grant and the project. She serves as liaison to coordinate efforts between the Board of Directors, and the Facilities Committee. The Facilities Committee will oversee the project and work with the owner of the property to explore if he is interested in selling the property. Alternatively, the committee will explore purchase of alternate sites in Manoa and Makiki area.

Presently, OHAM have only contract personnel: a part-time (20 hours a week) program educator for Hawaiian Africana Youth Enrichment Program (HAYEP) in-school social studies classrooms in five school; and an operations manager at 10% time on a weekly basis until we can acquire funding for at least two full-time positions.
