Public Purpose Statement

Fur-Angel Foundation (FAF) provides a public service to the State of Hawaii by offering an alternate solution for unwanted dogs. The issue of homeless, abandoned, and unwanted dogs affects many aspects within our communities and is a multifaceted issue. Our goal is to work with the community to offer aid to families faced with rehoming their pets, provide placement for homeless and stray dogs, and provide a safe place for pets as they transition to new homes. In addition, we also provide pet care education to our community. By doing so we hope to enhance quality of life for both people and pets.

Our grant in aid requests \$70,000 to achieve the objectives of this grant:

Objective 1: Spay and neuter 192 dogs

Objective 2: Offer wellness and emergent services to 192 dogs

Objective 3: Work with 300+ families, including other animal welfare organizations, either surrendering a pet or adopting one into their family.

Objective 4: To expand and grow pet care education programs within our community.

II. Background and Summary

1. Background

Fur-Angel Foundation is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization dog rescue on the island of Oahu, Hawaii. The foundation was established in October 2014 by a small group of friends who had a passion for helping the community, while also wanting to make a difference in the individual lives of animals and people. Our primary focus is to reduce the number of unwanted dogs in the community by putting our efforts towards spay/neutering, education, and screening potential families rigorously to safeguard dogs from reentering the shelter system. Our passion extends to educating the public about responsible pet ownership to influence present and future pet caregivers to plan and make good choices.

2. Goals and objectives

Our goal is to reduce the number of homeless and unwanted dogs in the community by spay/neutering all our intakes minimizing the risk of unwanted pregnancies, maintaining community health by offering wellness and emergent care to all our intakes, providing services to families surrendering pets or adopting one into their home, and educating the public on responsible pet ownership.

3. Public purpose and need to be served

There is a great need for alternate solutions and options for families and the community as a whole when it comes to unwanted animals. Currently there is a surplus of homeless and unwanted animals, causing many to choose options that are less than ideal, such as euthanasia of healthy animals, surrendering to overcrowded shelters, abandonment, etc. which cause further issues within the community. The public need is overwhelming and no one organization can handle the load alone. There is a definite need for more education within the community to address the issues of spay/neuter, options for families that have unwanted animals, proper caregiving practices, and responsible pet ownership.

4. Target population

Our target demographic is offering services to anyone interested in helping dogs in need. This includes 4 demographic areas. The first includes families experiencing unforeseen circumstances that require them to rehome their pet, homeless families, and Good Samaritans who find abandoned dogs. The second demographic includes people who care about animals and wish to help them by providing foster care. Our third target demographic is families looking to grow their families by adopting a dog. Our fourth demographic can include but is not limited to the three groups as stated above.

5. Geographic coverage

Geographically we service the entire island of Oahu, Hawaii with approximately 950,000 people.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Scope of work, tasks and responsibilities

FAF focuses on providing a secure foster network for homeless and unwanted dogs until permanent homes are processed and approved. This entails an in-depth screening process of both potential foster and adoptive homes by means of an application, phone interview, reference checks, and an in-home tour.

FAF dogs will be neutered and provided with standard wellness care. Intakes will not be discriminated against due to preexisting medical conditions. FAF will continue providing necessary supplies to fosters when needed, including emergent medical procedures, and medications.

A grant of \$70,000 will provide funding to assist a 75% increase in intakes.

2. Projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service

In the projected annual timeline, we plan to increase our operations by 75% by June 30, 2023.

3. Quality assurance and evaluation plans

FAF follows a basic standard of care for all dogs through licensed veterinarians in the state of Hawaii. All dogs are microchipped and registered through the Found Animals database. FAF tracks all dogs through the Shelter Manager software program and assesses the progress of each dog through each stage of the fostering process. Returns are closely evaluated, and any procedural improvements will be discussed at length with the management team. FAF is highly accessible to foster families to discuss foster dog's medical and behavioral needs. Applications, reference checks, in-home visits and post intake and adoption follow ups are crucial to ensure quality care for each foster dog. The public may leave reviews on various outlets to provide feedback to FAF staff.

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V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

Tiffany Kim, founder and president of Fur-Angel Foundation has more than 7 years of experience in animal rescue, including both volunteer and professional work, and 5 years of teaching experience. She is currently completing her doctoral degree in Transformative Studies with a focus on narrative research of self-affirmed conscientious pet owners that have had to surrender or rehome their pets. This research is intended to assist FAF coordinators, as well as to inform the greater community, when working with families to relinquish pets, but also when screening potential homes. Kim has worked with various rescue groups to gain further insight of the issues facing our community, such as Hawaiian Humane Society, K9 Kokua, Aloha Animal Outreach, Hawaii Dog Foundation, Paws of Hawaii, Poi Dogs & Popoki, Hawaii Cat Café, Hawaii Cat Foundation, and others. She has also established personal and professional working relationships with various veterinary practices, dog grooming, training and day care/boarding facilities that offer care and support to FAF dogs and people requesting assistance for personal pets. These relationships are essential to facilitating an interconnection between rescue and the greater community, as FAF is often sought as a resource referral.

FAF is into its 8th year of operations and has seen a 100% increase in intakes and assistance provided from previous year. Overall, FAF has provided care to 370 dogs and countless families.


1. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

FAF Operations Manager, Tiffany Kim has worked in the rescue and animal welfare field for over 7 years. She oversees managing the daily operations, coordinating intakes, processing applicants, and managing all staff and volunteers. As operations manager she also focuses on maintaining public relations, funding, and assists with coordinating the education program.

FAF Assistant Operations Manager, Nohea Kia brings 16 years of experience in office and managerial administrative work. With over a decade of experience she has accumulated extensive knowledge of business operations through working in the medical field, assisting doctors, scheduling surgeries, and building a proficiency in client relations. Going on 2 years of

working for FAF, she continues to hone her expertise working within the rescue and animal welfare field. She assists in managing the daily operations, processes new adoption and foster applicants, and serves as training coordinator to the FAF foster team. She has also served as a foster home for countless dogs and has provided a permanent home for 2 rescue dogs through FAF's foster to adoption program.
