Hawaiian Kamali'i, Inc. dba Hawaiian Canoe Club (HCC) has a mission to perpetuate and preserve the art of Hawaiian canoe paddling by providing an environment rooted in traditional Hawaiian values that promote personal growth, character development, and achievement in physical fitness.

Founded in 1960, Hawaiian Canoe Club has provided a cultural and educational program to about 90 children every summer since 1992. Competitively, HCC has held the Maui County Championship title since 1985 and has won the Hawaiian Canoe Racing State Championship 14 out of the last 20 years.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of this request is to sustain cultural learning and competitive paddling for young people, families, and na kūpuna in Maui County. The objectives are as follows:

- 1. Purchase two fiberglass canoe hulls for canoe tours, which generate income for our youth programs and provide an authentic cultural experience for visitors.
- 2. Repair the Traditional Hale at Hoaloha Park, originally built in 2009, so it will continue as a place to perpetuate and celebrate Native Hawaiian culture.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

This project will sustain our long-standing commitment to the youth of Maui County through summer cultural and educational programs. These programs have operated since 1992 and have always been free for Maui families. No other canoe club in Hawai'i can match this record of uninterrupted cultural programming for children.

Prior to the pandemic, HCC developed a canoe tours product for visitors with the Norwegian Cruise Lines. This venture proved successful due to our proximity to the dock and the availability of kupuna members who volunteer every week. The three-hour tour is held every Sunday and Monday. Our guests learn about canoe racing, the formation of the Hawaiian Islands, and Polynesian navigation and migration. They learn the basics of paddling technique, entering the water on stable double hull vessels that are captained by experienced paddlers. From the ocean, our guests learn more about the island, such as the cultural significance of Haleakala, the Battle of Kepaniwai, and the conquest by Kamehameha.

At moderate capacity, this venture earns \$70,000 annually to support HCC youth programs. Funding is used for staffing, supplies, insurance, snacks, and other expenses of the six-week summer enrichment programs. Unfortunately, canoe tours have been halted since Spring 2020 due to Covid-19, which has limited our ability to invest in new equipment.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Since its founding in 1960, HCC has been dedicated to nurturing and supporting the youth of Maui. With the rise in popularity of ocean sports, paddling attracts at-risk youth who may not identify with traditional sports teams or educational programs. Using "sports as a hook" to engage young people, paddling opens the door to learning about culture, history, navigation techniques and the environment. Through years of involvement, our kids learn to see themselves as lifelong learners, disciplined athletes and stewards of the environment.

HCC is comprised of 300 members, out of which about 150 are keiki paddlers. The summer cultural and educational program serves up to 90 children, ages 10 to 14, and 10 youth leaders,

ages 14 to 18. For many children, HCC provides tremendous opportunities they will not get otherwise. Over years of involvement, children from single parent- and low-income-households, poor grade performance and other risk factors thrive as they develop confidence and a sense of kūleana (responsibility). We also serve a growing kupuna membership through paddling, cultural programs and social activities for older adults.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

HCC operates on a .75 acre parcel at Hoaloha Park on Kahului Harbor on the north shore of Maui. This central location is accessible to students from various schools in the Baldwin – Kekaulike – Maui Complex Area. Our site is a drop-off location for the Maui Economic Opportunity bus program, so youth from central and upcountry schools can ride the bus to practices and activities.

HCC holds a fifty-year lease with the County of Maui. HCC seeks to invest in this vital public space for our community and future generations of paddlers.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

The scope of work involves purchasing new canoe hulls and repairing the traditional hale.

The HCC Board of Directors seeks to limit use of traditional racing canoes for canoe tours, as racing boats are more expensive and suffer wear and tear with high usage. Additionally, the traditional hull is too narrow for many visitors to sit comfortably. The proposed canoes will be fabricated with wider hulls to accommodate visitors and people with limited ocean experience. Canoes will be lashed as double-hulls vessels, which is the safest option for canoe tours because they cannot "huli" or flip over.

The Traditional Hale at Hoaloha Park was originally built in 2009 by master hale builder Francis Palani Sinenci of Hāna and our members who contributed more than 1,500 hours of volunteer labor. The thatch roof must be repaired periodically as it deteriorates in heavy weather and wind. Most of the repair work will be completed by volunteers. Funding will support a skilled practitioner to instruct and oversee the repair process.

The Board of Directors will oversee this project to monitor quality, oversee expenses and assure compliance on all aspects of the project. The Board will review estimates, approve the project budget, retain a hale builder to lead repairs, and inspect the project upon completion. Leading the project will be the Board President, Dave Ward. He has extensive project management experience and has overseen construction and repair projects for HCC.

Hawaiian Canoe Club (HCC) was founded in 1960 by John M. Lake, a police lieutenant and renowned community leader. The twenty-five charter members wanted to expose Maui keiki to cultural practices and values through outrigger canoe paddling. Hawaiian Kamali'i, Inc., an autonomous 501(c) 3, was created in 1992 to focus on youth development and cultural preservation in the setting of competitive racing.

The existing club hale was constructed in 1997, establishing a permanent structure to support cultural and educational programs at HCC. In 2009, the organization raised \$150,000 in private funds for sustainability upgrades to the facility. This involved the construction of a second floor and sustainability upgrades, a photovoltaic system, an energy-efficient air conditioning system, insulation, and six skylights. In 2011, HCC constructed a traditional hale to support cultural programs. The traditional hale was built by master hale builder Francis Palani Sinenci of Hāna and our members who contributed more than 1,500 hours of volunteer labor.

In 2021, the club completed a major renovation project, funded in part by the Hawai'i State GIA program. This project expanded the facility footprint to enable earned income via membership dues, added a training room for members, and upgraded program facilities for the summer programs.

2. Facilities

The HCC Club Hale occupies a .75 acre parcel that is leased from the County of Maui. The main hale was recently renovated to improve program facilities and improve member amenities to ensure long-term sustainability. The first floor has a large open meeting/gathering area, canoe storage racks, a kitchen, a weight room, and recently renovated ADA-compliant restrooms. The second floor has a classroom, a boardroom with bathroom, and an office.

Also on the park is our traditional hale, which is a gathering place to perpetuate, preserve, and celebrate traditional Hawaiian practices. In 2011, this site was designated by Maui County as a Cultural Historical Site.

VI. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

1. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

The HCC staff is led by Club Manager, Ka'ili Moikeha This individual is responsible for administering all youth programs, coordinating use of the facility and equipment, financial management, and human resources. She oversees data collection as well as program evaluation, assessment, finances and reporting. In addition to her position with HCC, Ka'ili is the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association Area Coordinator and works as a Safety Consultant with Hawaii Risk Evaluation Service.

The Program Director, Paul Ka'uhane Lu'uwai, is responsible for supervising and training the summer educational and cultural program. The Program Director works closely with the Club Manager to coordinate year-round activities. Paul has served for more 35 years as Program Director and Head Coach of the Keiki Division at HCC. Paul holds a Master's Degree in Education with emphasis in Curriculum Development from the University of Hawai'i.

Dave Ward, the HCC Board President, will oversee the proposed project. Dave is the founder and principal of Frampton & Ward, LLC, a real estate development and project management firm. Dave has led the HCC board for over 10 years and has overseen three major projects at the club site.

Sustainability is the primary intention behind this initiative. The canoe tours have proven to be a viable venture, generating income to support our long-standing youth programs. The pandemic disrupted our early success, as we had planned to invest in new canoes with earned income. Two years later, there is a pressing need to have dedicated double-hull canoes for canoe tours, which will be safer and more comfortable for our guests.

Regarding repairs to the traditional hale, the ongoing costs of maintenance and repairs have historically been met through membership dues. Having recently completed a construction project of the main building, this is good time to improve the traditional hale. HCC has one part-time staff person and one board member who oversee facilities and equipment.

This is a one-time project, so future funding will not be required. Through this investment, we can ensure long-term financial viability of HCC and its contributions to this community. Generations of families have been raised through involvement with Hawaiian Canoe Club. It is our hope that canoe tours will allow HCC to continue as a place for competitive paddling, cultural learning, and youth development for all of Maui County.
