II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Kokua Kalihi Valley Comprehensive Family Services (KKV) is a community health center with the mission: *"Together we work to advance health, to inspire healing, to foster reconciliation, and to celebrate abundance in the ahupua'a of Kalihi through strong relationships that honor culture and place."*

Founded in 1972, KKV has 50 years of experience providing residents of Kalihi with a broad array of comprehensive and holistic care that includes medical, dental, vision, mental health, pharmacy, and a variety of related social services. Our programs range from Elder Care, Maternal Child Health, three Youth Services programs, to a unique Cultural Food program "Roots", and Ho'oulu 'Aina, a 100-acre nature preserve where KKV offers indigenous healing programs, plant-medicine, and education. At Ho'oulu 'Aina, KKV is actively engaged healing through community-engaged forest restoration, farming, and agroforestry. KKV's programs have served as models for culturally responsive care and malama 'aina/ care for the land. Additionally, KKV supports Pacific Island women through NieiRek and Seams Wonderful, two programs that offer group therapy and social entrepreneurship. KKV expanded services in response to the COVID pandemic and has been a leader in community health and social determinants of health assistance.

In 1989, KKV was designated a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) and serves a Medically Underserved Area (MUA) and a Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) for Primary Care, Mental Health, and Dental Care. KKV provides care for over 11,000 patients annually with a staff of 261 that provides interpretation services in 26 languages and dialects. KKV's patients are >93% Asian and Pacific Islanders, 86% at or below 100% of federal poverty guidelines, and 53% which are best served in languages other than English. We operate from nine service locations, including a large medical clinic and wellness center, and are the only FQHC in the nation to care for a nature preserve.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

This Program proposal focuses on three of KKV's community programs that provide culturally responsive care and support for families, small children, and Micronesian women. The programs include KKV's Parenting and Family Strengthening (Maternal Child Health), the Medical Legal Partnership for Children, and Seams Wonderful. Our proposal responds to lessons learned from the COVID pandemic which disproportionately impacted Pacific Islander and Filipino patients and forced KKV to redesign patient care, expand language interpretation services, and focus on the most vulnerable in our community.

We have three main goals:

- 1. To expand access to care and strengthen patient relationships with new parents and young families.
- 2. To provide legal counseling and services to KKV's families.
- 3. To support social entrepreneurship, job training, and peer counseling for Micronesian women.

Maternal Child Health's (MCH) Parenting and Family Strengthening program is centered around community health workers (CHW) supporting pregnant women, new parents, infants, and young families by providing outreach, home visits, and education services. The majority of KKV's patients are Micronesian and Pacific Islanders living in public housing who associate coming to the clinic with being

sick. The intention of the program is to engage parents through in language patient outreach, home visits, pediatric visits, and the distribution of diapers and other supplies. By building relationships with patients, the CHWs become trusted navigators who listen to the needs of women and new parents, refer them to care, sometimes even attending medical or dental visits as interpreters. In this way, the CHWs can encourage patients to seek routine or preventive care and are able to identify issues such as domestic violence, which is prevalent among KKV's patients, and offer culturally responsive support. The program also focuses on pre-literacy and literacy training for young families and offers role modeling, peer counseling, and free in language books and activities.

Medical Legal Partnership for Children is an innovative collaboration between KKV and the University of Hawaii William S. Richardson School of Law to provide preventive legal care alongside preventive health care. Since April of 2009, MLPC lawyers, law students, doctors and medical residents have worked together on-site at KKV's Wellness center to provide direct legal services to over 500 low-income families in Kalihi. MLPC attorneys and law students often meet with families right in the exam rooms, while children wait for their vaccinations and booster shots. The program regularly offers "Know Your Rights" outreach and educational workshops and responds to urgent issues regarding impending loss of housing and other situations that impact a family's ability to thrive.

Seams Wonderful is KKV's vocational training and social entrepreneurship program for Micronesian women. Located in a classroom at the Towers at Kuhio Park public housing, the program is within walking distance for many KKV patients. Seams Wonderful provides introductory sewing classes led by peer teachers on a drop-in basis. Women learn to make items such as quilts, embroidered bags, water bottle holders, baby blankets, and skirts. Advanced sewing classes build each participant's skills. Seams Wonderful also has a revolving Sewing Machine Loan Program, providing time to practice and utilize their sewing skills at home, alleviating economic barriers such as childcare. In addition to training and sales opportunities, the program is a safe space for peer counseling. Led by a Micronesian community navigator, Seams Wonderful serves as a center for patient referrals, assistance with job applications, development of language skills, and even food distribution. Annual sales events provide opportunities for the women to earn money with the products they make.

KKV's Program will have these outcomes:

 200-300 pregnant women and new parents will be regularly supported by KKV's Parenting team members with home visits, check-ins, and distribution of supplies (diapers, food, baby care items).
 200-300 parents with young children will receive free in language children's books and literacy education.

3) MLPC attorneys will provide on-site legal assistance to KKV's patients three days/ week for one year.
4) 20-30 Micronesian women will receive vocational education and have opportunities to earn additional income through sales of their sewn products.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The public purpose of KKV's health programs request is to support pregnant women, families and young children, and women with health outreach, language interpretation, literacy education, legal assistance, and vocational education/ microenterprise. KKV's culturally responsive approach centers on community health workers, early intervention, legal education, and peer learning. Our intention is to prevent

serious health issues before they occur and to support and uplift the most vulnerable low-income Asian and Pacific Islander residents in Kalihi. Below are some of the critical issues facing KKV's patients:

Women's Reproductive Health and Young Families:

Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders (NHPI) experience significant disparities in women's reproductive health, pregnancy, and childbirth. The Hawaii Department of Health identified this population as more often uninsured, less likely to start pre-natal care within the first trimester, more likely to experience high rates of infant mortality, and more likely to engage in substance abuse. Not generally reported, however, are a complex range of cultural and social issues for NHPI, such as discomfort with medical clinics, shame and anxiety associated with treatment, loss of birthing rituals and practices, food insecurity and poverty, and domestic violence. Thus, there is a significant need for early intervention and in language support that focuses on relationship building and trust as key components to changing the health narrative.

Literacy and Learning:

Kalihi Title I schools face a high percentage of English-language learners, especially at the Elementary level. This impacts the ability for youth learning to read. At the same time, the average level of educational attainment within the public housing communities is 9th grade and KKV continues to observe challenges for young parents in providing literacy and language support for their children.

COVID Impact and Legal Issues:

COVID infection rates for the Pacific Islander/Micronesian and Filipino communities were 10 times higher than other populations in Hawaii. At our COVID testing clinic, accessed by a majority Micronesians, we experienced <u>daily positivity rates</u> as high as 69% in January 2022. Families living in dense housing situations, often with as many as eight to ten residents in a small home, were impacted additionally by job losses, food insecurity, and constant anxiety regarding issues such as immigration status, housing, and access to health care. Many face urgent and predatory legal issues that compound health problems and can spiral out of control quickly. Issues such as unlawful eviction, benefits denial, and immigration documentation were already significant for KKV's patients prior to COVID.

Our COVID response clarified key insights into serving this population effectively. Examples of lessons learned by KKV include adopting a whole-of-household approach that aligns with the communal values shared by many Pacific Islander and Asian immigrant families, and the need to integrate social determinants of health assessments into clinical care (cultural foods, supplies, legal and economic support). We recognized the necessity of strengthening cultural knowledge and building trust-based relationships with patients, so have transitioned programs such as Maternal Child Health to more incommunity and home-based care. MLPC staff has also been working hard to adjust to the changing climate created by COVID and in 2020 and 2021 has addressed many issues regarding employment and housing.

Micronesian women:

Although critical for the stability of their families, many Micronesian women living in Kalihi public housing have language and educational challenges, face domestic violence, and care for young children. Opportunities to work outside the home are limited, thus perpetuating economic vulnerabilities. When given space and support to learn and work near home, the women can thrive. At the same time, peer support offers an essential lifeline for new migrants living in Hawaii.

4. Describe the target population to be served;

KKV's patient population is **97.75% racial and ethnic minority with >93% Asian (39.25%) and Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander (53.72%)**; 5.72% are unreported or refused to report. The fastest growing population in Kalihi is Compact of Free Association Micronesians (COFA), and especially Chuukese, who are the dominant population in Kalihi public housing. This population is mixed and includes recent migrants from the Republic of Palau, the Federated States of Micronesia, and the Republic of the Marshall Islands. Each is signatory to a Compact of Free Association (COFA), providing the US with military access for aid payments and the right of free migration to and from the US. From 2008 to 2013, the COFA population had a 20% growth.

KKV Patient Demographics

In 2020, **87.64% of KKV's patients were at or below 100% of the Federal Poverty Guideline** and 96.69% were at or below 200% of FPG. Many of KKV's patients work as low-wage service industry workers for the tourism sector. These positions were the most vulnerable in 2020. Job losses in 2020 due to COVID-19 were extensive in Kalihi; by late May, 21.38% of the workforce in zip code 96819 had filed for unemployment and others were still struggling to do so. This is high compared to Hawaii's overall 11.6% unemployment rate 2020 which was among the highest in the nation (in July 2021, the state rate is 7.7% unemployed vs. 5.9% nationwide). Prior to 2020, the two census tracts immediately surrounding the main KKV health center, where a large percentage of KKV's population resides had an unemployment rate of above 17%.

6. Describe the geographic coverage.

KKV's service area encompasses **zip code 96819**, an urban and industrial area with a population of 52,981 residents within the City of Honolulu, Hawaii. The area's zip code aligns with the historic ahupua'a (Hawaiian territorial land division) called Kalihi, meaning in the Hawaiian language "the edge." To the southwest lies the Honolulu airport; to the west is Pearl Harbor, Hickham Air Base, and Schofield Barracks. Kalihi was geographically divided into the mountainous region (the "mauka" area of Kalihi Valley) and the area closer to the ocean (the "makai" area) by the H1 highway that was built from 1959 to 1986.

KKV's service area is located within Hawaii's First Congressional District and includes census tracts 60, 61, 58, 59, 62, 63, 64. Kalihi has been designated by the U.S.Public Health Service as a Medically Underserved Area (MUA) and a Health Profession Shortage Area (HPSA) for Primary Care, Mental Health and Dental Care. Located within State House District 29, the area has more public housing complexes than any other district in the state. Hawaii's largest and third largest public housing complexes are located within a block of KKV. The district also includes the Oahu Community Correctional Center and is the planned home of four stations for the future rail transit line.

KKV's service is not limited to residents residing in zip code 96819. When KKV was founded in 1972, most patients lived in Kalihi Valley above the H1 highway. This was not a firm boundary, rather one that made geographic sense in that it was easiest for patients in the valley to walk or take the bus to the clinic. KKV did take patients from other zip codes, including 96817 where the area's only high school is located, and other areas where KKV patients had moved. As KKV's capacity has increased over the years, we now serve patients throughout Kalihi as well as other zip codes, ensuring a continuity of care when patients move to other areas on the Island of O'ahu.

KKV has the capacity and staff to monitor, evaluate, and respond to issues regarding the proposed CIP project at the Judd Medical Clinic. KKV's twelve-member Board of Directors oversees our financial position. We have an eight-member Accounting team that monitors all financial transactions, including all grant expenditures. Annually, KKV undertakes a single audit that is comprised of the consolidated statement of financial and the related consolidated statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the consolidated financial statements. KKV's management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the U.S.; this includes the

design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Each of the KKV programs has a Coordinator who is responsible for staff scheduling, training, implementation, and evaluation. MCH and Seams Wonderful are fully KKV programs, staffed by employees on KKV's payroll. The Coordinator is supervised by KKV's Executive Director and participates in KKV's Management team meetings. The Coordinator of Seams Wonderful is supervised by KKV's Chief Operations Officer, who works with KKV's Grants team on reports and documentation. Sales activities are coordinated with KKV's Accounting office to track sales and receipts. The MLPC program works on contract with KKV that is renewed annually and approved by KKV's Executive Director.

In 1989, he was hired as KKV's first Clinical Director and remained in this position until being named as KKV's Executive Director in 2003. Dr. Derauf worked from 1987-1988 as the Assistant Director of Public Health in the Thai Highland Project on the border of Thailand and Burma. He is board certified in General Preventive Medicine. Dr. Derauf has served as Assistant Clinical Professor of Public Health, Medicine, and Nursing at the University of Hawaii. He serves as a board member of the Association of Asian and Pacific Island Community Health Organizations (AAPCHO), the Hawaii Primary Care Association, and Aloha Care, a Hawaii Medicaid Managed Care Corporation, as well as Lawyers for Equal Justice. He is also a member of Na Limahana o Lonopuha, a consortium of Native Hawaiian Health Organizations. Under Dr. Derauf's leadership, KKV was named a Center of Excellence in Women's health care by the

Federal Government in 2002. In 2008, KKV was honored by HRSA with its Special Populations Service Award, recognizing KKV's excellence in service to minority populations.

Project Director: Yuet Mui Kong, Chief Operations Officer. Ms. Kong comes to KKV from the Department of Human Service, Homeless Program Office. She is experienced working with contracts and ensuring compliance with federal/ HRSA grant projects. Ms. Kong previously worked for Lanakila Pacific/Lanakila Meals on Wheels as their Operations Manager and served in various positions in Catholic Charities Hawaii: Director of Developmental Disability Medicaid Waiver Program, Coordinator of Lanakila Multipurpose Senior Center, and Home Study Specialist of Statewide Resource Families Program. Prior to that, she served as the Assistant Director of Mission to Market for the Girl Scouts of Hawaii. Mui has a master's degree in human services administration from the University of Northern Iowa and has a bachelor's degree in Social Work from Hong Kong Polytechnic University. She is trilingual in English, Cantonese, and Mandarin.

Chief Financial Officer: Chan Hou Lei, Chief Financial Officer. Mr. Lei joined KKV as Controller in July 2014. He is experienced with federal audits and HRSA compliance. Lei has also supported KKV's telehealth activities, ensuring software licenses are updated and patient data plans are monitored and implemented. Lei received a Bachelor of Business Administration concentration in Accounting and Finance from the University of Hawaii in 2008. Lei has more than 12 years of combined accounting and finance experience. Before coming to KKV, he served as senior accountant at a public accounting firm.

Director of Maternal Child Health, Sara Bauer. Ms. Bauer has been a Public Health Nurse with KKV since 2017 as Coordinator for VOCA Trauma and Resilience-Informed Care Grant. In 2017, she was Adjunct professor for clinical portion of the senior-level Public Health Nursing course at Chaminade University, Honolulu, and a Lecturer for the Community Health Worker Certification at Kokua Kalihi Valley Clinic with Kapiolani Community College. Bauer completed the Registered Nurse (RN) pre-licensure program at the University of Minnesota School of Nursing and has been a public health nurse since 2013.

Legal Director MLPC, Dina Shek, JD. Ms. Shek is a licensed attorney in the state of Hawai'i. She is a proud graduate of the William S. Richardson School of Law where she currently serves as a Faculty Specialist. Prior to entering law school in 2003, she spent nearly ten years as a community organizer, educator, and advocate for social and community justice. She also has extensive development and fundraising experience, all of it on behalf of the public sector. Dina holds a Master of Arts degree from San Francisco State University in Ethnic Studies (Asian American Studies). In 2012, Dina was named the Rhoda Lewis Award recipient presented by the Hawai'i Women's Legal Foundation, and she received the Distinguished Service Award from the Japanese American Citizens League (Honolulu Chapter) for her work with Micronesian communities in Hawai'i. Hawai'i Business Magazine recently featured Dina as one of their "20 for the Next 20: People to Watch in 2013."

Program Coordinator Seams Wonderful, Amenina Opet. Ms. Opet is a skilled bilingual navigator in the Chuukese Community. Currently completing her degree in social work, she provides assistance with job applications and connects participants with a wide range of services including medical, dental, behavioral health care through KKV's Satellite at the Towers at Kūhio Park (TKP) and Main Clinic locations, eligibility and enrollment assistance for public benefits, and ESL classes offered in partnership with the McKinley School for Adults.

4. Future Sustainability Plan

The programs funded by this request are long-standing KKV social determinants of health programs that have different sources of funding.

MCH Parenting and Family Strengthening is traditionally grant funded as KKV does not receive insurance reimbursement or charge fees for these services. The program as outlined in this proposal reflects an expansion/ reorganization of MCH services in response to COVID and was funded in 2021 (and continuing for part of 2022) by a variety of sources ranging from a federal grant, TANF, and private funding. In 2022, KKV faces a shortfall for MCH Parenting staff and is actively working to find new grant support for the personnel. Should KKV not receive GIA Program funding, we will continue the program through general funds and seek other funding sources. The success and efficacy of the MCH Parenting program in 2022 will make it a priority program for grant funding going forward.

MLPC has been funded by KKV with general funds for the past decade. As resources become more scarce and need for the program increases, KKV is working to secure grant funding to support this contract. KKV is actively seeking funding to pay for the contract (\$50,000/year) going forward.

Seams Wonderful is a grant-funded program. Currently it secures some sewing supplies from TANF funding and recently was awarded a small grant from the Women's Fund. KKV is hoping to expand the program to serve more Micronesian women and stabilize its financial position. We are actively seeking grant funding from private foundations for 2022 and 2023/ beyond.
