1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

The Moloka`i Land Trust (MLT) is a federally recognized 501c3 public charity originally created in 2006 to preserve and restore Moloka`i's unique natural and cultural resources and to benefit the island's population, particularly Native Hawai`ians. MLT has embarked on an ambitious program to restore the roughly

2,000 acres it presently owns to pre-settlement natural habitats, to protect and make accessible the valuable archeological resources on its lands, and to make the land accessible for educational, cultural and subsistence practices. MLT has already gained recognition from Private, State and Federal preservation programs both for its innovative scientific approaches and its practical success, having already returned over 58 acres and ³/₄ mile of shoreline of former Kiawe scrub to native vegetation and protected the archeological evidence of both a major adze quarry and a fishing village dating to the 16th century.

As part of its community orientation, MLT initiated a program to involve, inform, and educate Moloka`i's youth in the value of this mission. This education program was started through a partnership with teachers at the Moloka`i Middle School as a way to integrate hands-on outdoor science related activities to complement the classroom curriculum. These activities were woven into MLT's pioneering and impressive ecological restoration projects on its protected lands, including the largest dune restoration project of its kind in the State. The program has proven to be a solid success with firm partnership with all schools on the Island participating and supporting the STEM science education aspects of the program. In 2015, MLT expanded its mission to include education in response to the communities growing demand for participation in our service-learning program.

- 2. The goals and objectives related to the request;
 - a) Transform the educational programs thus far implemented by MLT into a solid STEM related environmental science education program for all schools on Moloka`i, including workforce development and workspace for advanced 3D printing services for the community.
 - Provide a native plant facility accessible to and within walking distance for over 75% of all students on Moloka`i.
 - c) Provide an indoor and open air classroom spaces in which science teachers can also prepare their students for service learning projects, including a convenient starting and ending point for student activities on MLT lands.
 - d) Provide space for an advanced 3D printer to be integrated into the island's STEM programs through the schools, and provide community 3D printing services, workforce development, and training programs.
 - e) Provide a location for an island seed bank to facilitate genetic storage and stock material for restoration activities.
- 3. The public purpose and need to be served;
 - a) Improve science education opportunities for all K-12 students on Moloka`i, supplementing the Department of Education STEM efforts.
 - b) Expand the service learning opportunities which have proven to motivate previously disinterested students in the exploration of environmental

sciences, including technological skills training and workforce development.

- c) Provide the foundation for development of a center on ecological restoration, native plants, history of Moloka`i, and cultural practices for the entire community of Moloka`i.
- d) Provide a community resource for seed material for islandwide community restoration effort.
- 4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The primary target population to be served is the K-12 school children of Moloka`i, their teachers, and predominantly the faculty of Department of Education schools on the Island. The nature of the program skews to serve middle school and high school students who are in formal STEM programs, and Hawai`ian Immersion programs that are interested in ecological restoration.

The secondary target population is the extended group of adult community volunteers who help organize these programs and support the children and the teachers as they explore native plants and the lands owned and managed by MLT. The proposed center will greatly simplify delivery of volunteer support in both logistics and in providing a centralized laboratory classroom where group discussions will be easier and more effective than in the open spaces on MLT lands.

The third target population is groups and organizations interested in restoration efforts and needing to store or source seed material needed for reforestation efforts.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

This project will facilitate services to the entire island of Moloka`i as well as visitors from off island interested in participating in our programs.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

Funding from this request will go towards the construction of Phase II of the 10,136 s.f. facility on a one-acre commercial lot, selected for its location relative to the schools serving the vast majority of Moloka`i students. Moloka`i Land Trust has secured support from EcoTrust with funding through the New Markets

Tax Credit Program for land acquisition, initial site development and a portion of the building costs. Construction and site work have been completed on Phase I (3,660 s.f. structure) of the project. Moloka`i Land Trust Executive Director managed all of the above activities and worked with an approved contractor (Artistic Builders Corporation) to carry out the civil site work, and construction of the first portion of the building and ensuing educational program activities with the local schools. Moloka`i Land Trust will also submit proposals through private foundation Capital Grant programs for additional funds as necessary to complete the building (Phase II) now that construction is complete on Phase I (as per the requirements of the grantors).

Upon notice of award of funding through this proposal, MLT will immediately

Upon notice of award of funding through this proposal, MLT will immediately initiate a contract for the additional construction work (see Exhibits A & B) on the property, which is anticipated to be complete within 18 months of the awarding of funds. MLT will expand current STEM service learning programs at the new facility upon completion of construction (estimated 18 months after award of matching funds).

3. Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results; and

Moloka`i Land Trust has a strong track record of completing the deliverables of awards from federal, state, county, and private funding sources for the last 13.5 years. Representatives from the USFWS, USDA, Office of Hawaiian Affairs, DLNR DoFAW, The Nature Conservancy, and multiple foundation funds through Hawaii Community Foundation can verify that MLT is fully capable of performing stated objectives within time parameters and producing results at or beyond stated intentions.

MLT will review expenditures and progress on the construction portion of this project on a monthly basis with the addition of weekly progress updates from the contractor. Any budget discrepancies will be addressed immediately with corrective measures taken to maintain the integrity of the overall product and maintenance of the program budget. Progress reports can be provided to the granting agency at a schedule that meets their satisfaction. Any unplanned changes to the overall project plan will only be implemented with the addition of new funding sources to cover any additional costs and maintain the project timeline.

MLT is willing to enter into a signed assurance agreement to provide guarantees as necessary.

MLT has secured a \$1,469,000 private equity investment from Wells Fargo Bank and Ecotrust through the New Markets Tax Credit Program for the completion of Phase I of this project. Additional funds needed for project completion will be requested should funding from this proposal result in a partial award. The following funding sources will be pursued along with a funding request from our New Markets Tax Credit Program partners at Ecotrust and Wells Fargo Bank.

MLT has been working with Pacific Growth Associates on the federal New Markets Tax Credits Program for the initial \$1,469,000 for the project. MLT closed on the deal with EcoTrust, the Community Development Entity with the tax credit allocations back in March 2017 for a \$7M QEI investment into the project. This funding paid off the land and financed the \$1.2M construction of Phase I of the project (initial site work and the first 3,660 s.f. of the structure).

MLT is in discussion with Pacific Growth Associates and EcoTrust to leverage new assets acquired over the past 24 months at the time work begins on Phase II to leverage additional NMTC investment into the project to bridge any gap in funding to complete the project.

No federal, state or county contracts or grants have been awarded for this project.

MLT also has three open USDA NRCS Landowner Assistance Contracts (EQIP Program) for restoration work on its Mokio Preserve as laid out in NRCS developed conservation plans, and an open Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) Contract through State of Hawaii for work on MLT's Mokio Preserve.

MLT is currently partnered with American Bird Conservancy (ABC) on an \$800,000 predator proof fence project located on its Mokio Preserve. ABC has

secured federal funds as a portion of this project, and is using those funds to assist in contracting the labor component to build the fence project on MLT lands. MLT workers are part of the contracted labor force for this project.

Moloka`i Land Trust approximate unrestricted current asset value as of December 31, 2021 totals \$288,897, please note that final accounting for December 2021 was not complete at the time this proposal was prepared.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

- a) The MLT Executive Director (ED) will be acting as the overall project manger for this project. MLT ED was a former general contractor for many years with a successful track record of managing complex private and commercial construction projects in addition to managing vendors and contracted personnel. MLT ED recently successfully completed management of the complex NMTC funding structure and the completion of Phase I of the new Environmental Science (STEM) Education facility.
- b) MLT specializes in fund development for large projects, including funding for a 196.4 acre conservation fee acquisition with \$480,000 and \$767,976 respectively from Maui County Open Space Fund and the Legacy Land Conservation Program through the State of Hawaii.
- c) Under the leadership of the MLT ED, the organization has successfully installed utilities improvements including 2 miles of water line to provide water service to NW Moloka`i for the first time in around 40 years, and constructed and maintained ungulate control fences in over a mile of remote terrain in extremely corrosive conditions. MLT is currently leading a 1.1 mile predator proof fence construction project on the remote NW coast of Molokai with its partners American Bird Conservancy and USFWS.
- d) MLT has successfully been contracted by The Nature Conservancy of Hawaii to conduct dune restoration activities at Mo'omomi for 11 years. Through this work, MLT has demonstrated its ability to coordinate multi organizational efforts to address unforeseen events in quick fashion.
- e) The MLT's ED currently directs the environmental science educational service component, and as the capacity is built through this project, additional competent personnel will be hired to facilitate the growing program needs and demands.

2. Facilities

a) MLT currently operates out of the utility wing for its planed Operations and Service Learning Facility. Offices, equipment storage, and growing facilities are sharing a single space, which results in a congested operating efficiency. This grant request is for the development of facilities to consolidate and broaden the services currently provided by MLT.



Figure 1 - Phase I of the MLT Operations and Service Leaning Center was completed in 2019. The FY23 GLA request is for completion of the second phase of the project and completion of the buildout of the site. This includes the primary offices, meeting spaces, event/classroom space and auxiliary office space.

- b) Additional funding sources have been identified above to complete the overall facility budget and allow for complete build-out once the majority of the construction of the project has been funded and initiated.
- c) Currently MLT provides STEM related field experience to every school on island as it has for the past nine years (taking in to account the Covid-19 suspension of the program). This has been accomplished with the restoration areas and test plots located remotely on the Mokio lands of MLT.
- d) Demand from other school and educational programs like the Hawaiian immersion programs, have prompted our organization to look towards building the capacity to broaden the reach of our popular educational support program, by constructing a

new 10,136 s.f. facility within one mile of 75% of Moloka`i's student population. Phase I of this project was completed in 2019 with support from the New Markets Tax Credit Program.

- e) Capacity to serve the island's students will increase dramatically with the addition of this new facility as the remote field sites require 4WD vehicle access and therefore severely reduce participation by large groups. The facility will also be made available for Native Hawaiian traditional cultural practices and arts practitioners to provide educational space to serve our community.
- f) MLT has been approached by the principal of Kualapuu Public Conversion Charter School regarding assistance in funding a full-time employee to assist MLT in coordination and execution of its service-learning and STEM related activities through a formal partnership once the facility is complete.
- g) MLT has recently been approached to begin providing after school programs for Molokai Middle and High School students with emphasis placed on restoration ecology and Hawaiian plant identification and production.
- h) MLT has entered into a partnership with an NHO and defense contractors to support an advanced 3D printer and workforce development program which also includes STEM based training opportunities for all schools on island.

 - a) Moloka`i Land Trust has a base funding for its operations through a lease of a portion of the lands it owns; this lease was in place when the lands were gifted to the Land Trust and remain as a viable long term funding source and will enable the perpetuation of MLT in its mission.
 - b) MLT has developed a solid track record in grants related to its mission related to preservation and restoration of native habitats from Federal, State, and private funding sources, which have supported the restoration efforts on the lands, installation of core infrastructure for preservation on the remote lands, and expansion of lands under management; these grants are variable depending on availability, but the total grants have continued to grow under the current management of MLT

- c) MLT has aggressively pursued funding for the educational facilities for which this GIA has been prepared; cofunders have been identified and some have committed; by funding this program in 2022, the Hawaii GIA program will enable continued private and federal commitments to fund the full development of the educational and operational facilities of MLT.
- d) MLT has also pursued direct individual funding contributions, as well as volunteer efforts, in support of the MLT mission, which provided all of the Phase I development work of property acquisition, site analysis, New Markets Tax Credit due diligence costs, preliminary architectural and engineering work, and construction of Phase I of the project; private fundraising has continued and intensified and will provide the matching base for future grants to enable completion of the project.
