II. Background and Summary

The Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center is constructing an Emergency Food Warehouse facility and is requesting \$900,000 for the \$4,550,000 project.

1. A brief description of the applicant's background

The Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center (Health Center), established in 1972, first opened its doors with one doctor and five staff. This year, the Health Center celebrates its 50th anniversary as the oldest and largest of 15 community health centers in the state and the largest employer on the Waianae coast. The Health Center currently employs 620 staff that work throughout its main center in Waianae, satellite clinics (located in Kapolei, Nanakuli, Waianae, Waipahu and Ewa), a school-based dental clinic and three school-based primary care clinics in Waianae and Nanakuli, and at various other business and program sites throughout West Oahu.

The Health Center is the only health safety-net provider serving the medically underserved living in West Oahu. In 2020, the Health Center served 33,780 patients, the majority being Native Hawaiian (48%), followed by Asian & other Pacific Islanders (25%), and Caucasians (10%). Data shows 69% of patients are at 100% of the federal poverty level or below, 6% are uninsured, and 58% are receiving coverage under

QUEST, the State of Hawaii's Medicaid program. Of the total patients served, 905 are identified as being homeless.

The Health Center's services include: primary medical care (adult medicine, family practice, pediatric health, women's health and school based services); 24-hour emergency, laboratory and imaging services; walk-in clinics; behavioral health, substance abuse treatment, pain management; dental; specialty services; osteopathic care, nutrition counseling; health professional training; case management; transportation; pharmacy; vision; WIC, patient assistance services, health promotion; food distributions; farmers' markets; Native Hawaiian Healing, and more.

The Health Center is proud of its mission as a healing center that provides accessible and affordable medical and traditional healing services with Aloha; a learning center that offers health career training to ensure a better future for our community; and an innovator, using leading edge technology to deliver the highest quality of medical services to our community.

The Health Center achieves its mission by not only serving patients who seek services, but also by incorporating the goal of improving the overall health status of the community it serves.

An example of this is the Health Center's Health Promotion department, who, since the opening of its very first farmer's market in 2008, has developed numerous programs to support the health and wellness of the community through providing access to "good food."

The Health Promotion department addresses barriers to accessing fresh, locally grown food through food justice farmers markets (Mākeke) that accept local produce incentives such as EBT/SNAP Double Bucks and Produce Prescriptions for keiki, pregnant women and adults with nutrition related chronic disease. Mākeke will also be part of a cohort that will soon pilot the acceptance of WIC vouchers at farmer's markets.

To further expand access, the Health Center, in partnership with the Hawaii Foodbank, operates 7 weekly school food pantries, 4 weekly kupuna pantries and hosts large scale community food distributions. As the Hawaii Foodbank's largest partnering agency on the Waianae Coast, together we have distributed close to 5 million pounds of food since the onset of the pandemic.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request

The Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center is constructing an Emergency Food Warehouse facility to serve the Waianae Coast and is requesting \$900,000 for the \$4,550,000 project.

The goals for the Emergency Food Warehouse facility is as follows:

Goal 1: To strengthen community preparedness through the creation of the first emergency food warehouse facility on the Waianae Coast

Objective 1: In partnership with the Hawaii Foodbank and its 30 Waianae Coast partner agencies, act as the main operational hub to distribute emergency food rations to community members in efforts to increase food security before, during and in the recovery phase of a disaster

Goal 2: To improve food banking optimization by streamlining and shifting the supply chain focus to local food systems

Objective 2: Promote healthy and sustainable food systems by sourcing food from Waianae producers therefore increasing the quality and quantity of local food distributed to the community

Goal 3: To develop a dynamic workforce to support the emergency food warehouse and the local economy

Objective 3: Create a career training program to provide ongoing support and development to Waianae community members and partnering agencies yearly

3. The public purpose and need to be served

It is estimated that the number of tropical storms and hurricanes that pass by the Hawaiian islands will intensify by 15% as a result of climate change and warmer temperatures in our oceans. Although our islands have only had a handful of direct hits by a hurricane, some of the near misses have caused catastrophic damage to our islands and to the Waianae coast in particular.

Because of the remote geographic location of Waianae, severity of damage to the roads and infrastructure, the emergency resources needed take longer to arrive, jeopardizing the health and wellness of the Waianae coast residents. In a community already reporting a 40% food insecurity rate, a delay in response of food and water would be detrimental.

An Emergency Food Warehouse to store and distribute food to close to 40 partnering agencies is needed to ensure that the Waianae community will have the food and supplies in place for the next natural disaster as well as for the emergency response to food insecurity due to the ongoing COVID pandemic.

4. Describe the target population to be served;

The Waianae Coast is an economically distressed community with a population of 47,774. Approximately 24.2% of the community has an annual income less than 100% of the FPL, which is the highest in the C&C of Honolulu (9.8%). About 33% of

households are receiving SNAP/Cash or other forms of public assistance which is the highest rate in the C&C of Honolulu (10.1%) and the State (11.8%). The average per capita income is \$17,800 making it the lowest in the C&C of Honolulu (\$30,700) and the State (\$29,500). Waianae is one of the most "food insecure" areas in the State, about 33% of households lack the ability to acquire food that is safe and nutritious in a socially acceptable way.

Health statistics parallel the economic situation in the community. Waianae ranks highest in the State for risk based on chronic disease indicators and second highest for risk based on soci-economic indicators. Morbidity and mortality indicators show that the Waianae Coast ranks highest in the State for obesity (40.9% vs State at 22.3%); adults with diabetes (15.1% vs State at 9.6%); disease of the heart (239.2 deaths per 100,000 vs State at 138.1); and cancer (209.8 per 100,000 vs State at 137.5).

The Waianae Coast ranks highest in Honolulu County and the State for debilitating health conditions related to nutrition and food insecurity. Risk begins early. Over 50% of WCCHC patients over 6 years old are overweight or obese. It was estimated that nearly 1/7 Hawaii residents was food insecure prior to the pandemic. In a 2019 survey of over 1000 WCCHC patients, 38% of adults indicated that in the last 30 days they "worried about having enough food for themselves and their family". Food insecurity has dramatically worsened with the current Covid-19 pandemic as witnessed by community utilization of our emergency food distribution programs.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center serves its primary service area of the Waianae Coast and its secondary service area of Kapolei, Ewa and Waipahu.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

The Health Center's Chief Human Resources and Facilities Officer and Director of Planning and Design will work closely with the construction and engineering and architectural firms to ensure that the Emergency Food Warehouse meets city building code requirements, including federal ADA compliance. The Director of Health Promotion will oversee program development, operations as well as the purchase of equipment and supplies.

While construction is being completed, program development will be ongoing building on what has already been established with partners committed to food security for the

Wajanae Coast.

Medical providers, clinical and non-clinical management, mid-management, and program managers are active in addressing quality management components at the Health Center through the following committees: Peer Review Committee; Quality Improvement Committee; Disaster Preparedness Committee; Health and Safety Committee; and the Leadership Team.

Improvement of the overall organization is addressed through the Quality Improvement Committee, the Leadership Team, and the Board of Directors.

The Health Center has developed many close and committed partnerships since the Pandemic, in particular the Hawaii Foodbank. The Health Center is in the process of fundraising for the project and is confident in receiving support for the funding needed.

The Health Center is not, and will not, be pursuing tax credits for any current capital projects or planned projects.

The Health Center has not closed its books for the month of December 2021 as of January 20, 2020. Based on the most recent financial statements (November 30, 2021), the Health Center had \$67.7 million in unrestricted net assets. Some \$62.1 million of the total unrestricted net assets are held in building and equipment (net of depreciation) and other long-term assets. The federal Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) -- the agency that has oversight over the community health center program under which the Health Center is funded -- expects a health center to maintain cash on hand to cover at least two months' operating expenses. Based on the board approved budget of \$88.5 for the current fiscal year, the Health Center is expected to have \$14.0 million cash on hand. As of November 2021, the Health Center's cash on hand excluding donor restricted funds is \$20.5 million.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

The Health Center is a non-profit community health center that has served the community for 50 years. The growth of both the physical and program aspects of the Health Center over the past 50 years demonstrates the Health Center's experience and ability to plan and manage financial resources and capital development activities.

The Health Center has managed a number of large capital development projects over the years, including the building of a laboratory and dental facility, a dining room/restaurant facility and wellness center, a three-story medical building for women's health, pediatrics and training (2009), a substance abuse treatment services building (2012), a two-story integrated adult medicine and pharmacy building (2013), a two-story emergency medical services building (2018), a satellite clinic in Nanakuli (2021) and numerous renovations and expansions of its facilities at its main center and satellite clinics.

The Health Center has been ranked as one of the top three largest community service providers in the state for many years (Pacific Business News), managing an annual operating budget of over \$70 million.

WCCHC's Health Promotion Department that will manage the Emergency Food Warehouse has been a leader in the emergency food supply chain for Waianae communities since 2008. In response to high rates of food insecurity and low access to nutritious food, the Health Center developed the following programs to strengthen Waianae's food system:

• Makeke Farmers & Green Markets- WCCHC owns and operates several weekly farmers markets on the Waianae Coast to support Waianae food

- production and access to fresh locally grown food since 2008. These markets not only provide access and affordability of fresh locally grown food, it provides a venue for our Waianae farmers to bring their goods to market for direct sale.
- **EBT Double Bucks Program** offers EBT/SNAP beneficiaries the ability to double their benefits in an unlimited amount on the purchases of fresh local produce and proteins from Waianae farmers and local food producers at the Makeke Farmers' & Green Markets since 2013.
- Produce Prescription programs- first keiki produce prescription program in the state (2018), offering \$50/month over 6 months to keiki with nutrition related chronic disease or food insecurity. Has since expanded to offer produce prescriptions to adults and pregnant women for a longer duration (18 months), tracking changes in BMI, blood pressure and A1C (if applicable) through a USDA GusNIP research grant.
- **Keiki & School Pantries-** in partnership with the Hawaii Foodbank, this weekly food distribution provides keiki with 5 lb. bags of shelf stable foods, healthy snacks and fresh local produce. These pantries operate out of 7 public schools on the Wai`anae coast, serving 900 + keiki weekly.
- Ohana Nights- large community events hosted at keiki pantry school sites in partnership with the Hawaii Foodbank, providing keiki and their families with a healthy dinner, cooking demonstration of the meal served and an average of 70 lbs of fresh local produce and shelf stable ingredients and recipe to recreate meal at home (pre-pandemic).
- COVID Emergency Food Distributions- Emergency food distributions at community sites along the coast for keiki, kupuna, community and frontline workers since March 2020, distributing over 4.5 million pounds of food and over 275,000 meals to keiki and kupuna.

2. Facilities

The Health Center operates out of a main center in Waianae, satellite clinics located in Kapolei, Nanakuli, Waianae, Waipahu and Ewa, a school-based dental site, three school-based primary care sites, and various other business and program sites.

The Health Center's 16-plus acre main campus is situated on Department of Land and Natural Resources and Department of Hawaiian Home Land parcels centrally located on the Waianae Coast. Permanent structures have been constructed or renovated through funding support from the state, city, federal government and private foundations.

The Emergency Food Warehouse will be located at the Health Center's main campus which is central to the 10 mile Waianae Coast community with direct access from Farrington Highway, the main route throughout the coast.
