# 3. Public Purpose

The public purpose for protecting the historic Kwong Fook Tong Chinese cemetery located at TMK (2) 3-2-013:003 in Waiehu, Maui is to dignify the final disposition of human remains in accordance with State statutes and municipal rules and regulations. It also serves as a protection for the historical, memorial, spiritual, aesthetic and passive greenspaces within the rural / urban environment.

From a historical point of view and for research purposes, it is vital that burial sites are not disturbed. The location and marking of an individual's grave tells a portion of a life story. Cemeteries are among the most valuable of historic resources. They are reminders of various settlement patterns, such as villages, rural communities and urban centers. Cemeteries can reveal information about historic events, religions, culture and traditions, lifestyles, and genealogy.

# II. Background and Summary

# 1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

The Waiehu Chinese Cemetery Association (WCCA) has been managing the Kwong Fook Tong on a volunteer basis, which is a 4-acre historic Chinese cultural cemetery, in the conservation district, containing over 800 grave sites of first-generation immigrant Chinese laborers, dating from the late 1800's to the 1960's. From about 1995 to 2005 the cemetery fell into disrepair and became overgrown and inaccessible to people wanting to pay respects to the ancestors.

In 2005 the WCCA reorganized and began to clean up the over-grown vegetation on a monthly basis with the support of volunteers and partnership organizations

such as the Hawaii Government Employees Association Community Action Committee and Malama Maui Nui.

WCCA recently registered with the State of Hawaii Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs as a domestic non-profit corporation that is administered by a 5-person Board of Directors.

# 2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal is to protect the Kwong Fook Tong cemetery from unauthorized vehicular access that is damaging to historic grave sites and the peaceful aesthetic nature of the area. Over the past 2 years there has been an increase in homeless persons and drug users that are driving onto the cemetery, loitering, dumping trash and creating a nuisance for the community of Waiehu. The objective is to install a 300 foot long 3 feet high wood railing with concrete posts, same as those seen at County of Maui Beach Parks, to prohibit vehicles from driving onto the cemetery. An entry gate will also be installed to allow for authorized volunteer maintenance vehicles as needed.

#### 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The public purpose for protecting the historic Kwong Fook Tong Chinese cemetery located at TMK (2) 3-2-013:003 in Waiehu, Maui is to dignify the final disposition of human remains in accordance with State statutes and municipal rules and regulations. It also serves as a protection for the historical, memorial, spiritual, aesthetic and passive greenspaces within the rural / urban environment.

From a historical point of view and for research purposes, it is vital that burial sites are not disturbed. The location and marking of an individual's grave tells a portion of a life story. Cemeteries are among the most valuable of historic resources. They are reminders of various settlement patterns, such as villages, rural communities and urban centers. Cemeteries can reveal information about historic events, religions, culture and traditions, lifestyles, and genealogy.

# 4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Direct benefits will be to those 800+ ancestors buried at the Kwong Fook Tong so that they may rest in peace.

In-direct benefits will be to members of the Waiehu, Waihee and Kahakuloa communities that may learn from the presence and protection of this historic Chinese cemetery and all the customs and traditions related to Chinese burial sites that include a grandfather tomb, guardian tomb, fire pits for burning symbolic money, the bone house and the historic gathering house.

Furthermore, by keeping the premises protected from unauthorized vehicle access, it will be easier for volunteers to keep the cemetery in a clean and orderly manner and protect the fragile historic grave sites intact. Finally, we anticipate that the more than 1,000 households in the Waiehu, Waihee and Kahakuloa community that drive by the cemetery on a daily basis will appreciate a clean looking, culturally appropriate, community asset.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The Waiehu Chinese Cemetery Association manages the Kwong Fook Tong which is a 4-acre historic Chinese cultural cemetery containing over 800 grave sites dating from the late 1800's to the 1960's. The CIP project will encumber about 600 square feet along a 300-foot linear corridor abutting the Kahekili State Highway. The cemetery sits adjacent to the Waiehu Kou Hawaiian Homestead on the way to Waihee village.

# III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

Design and construct a 300' long x 3' high wood (2"x 8" x 16') railing hung on 6" x 6" x 5' concrete posts using ½" galvanized hardware. Post will be installed 2' deep at 8' intervals. A 12' entry gate will also be fabricated an installed for authorized maintenance purposes. Installation will be done by volunteer labor and overseen by a licensed contractor. Rental of a mini excavator will be necessary to dig each 2' hole for placement and movement of the 6" x 6" x 5' concrete posts. We expect the entire project to take one weekend (3-days) for mobilization and installation.

2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service:

The railing project will be completed in 3 days. Outcome will be a completed 300' x 3' wood railing

Railing will be built to specifications noted above. Project will be overseen by licensed and insured masonry and landscaping contractors.



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# Study: Bypass boosts survival in heart failure

CHICAGO — Heart failure patients with clogged arteries have a better chance of surviving 10 years if they get bypass surgery plus medicine rather than just drugs alone, according to an international study.

Earlier results from the same research raised questions about the benefits of bypass versus medicine alone, but researchers said that the long-term evidence clearly favors surgery.

The lead author of the study, Duke University cardiologist Dr. Eric Velazquez, said that the results "are so definitive and so robust" that they would likely to lead to stronger recommendations favoring bypass surgery for these patients.

Nearly 6 million Americans and 23 million people worldwide have heart failure, and many of them also have artery disease similar to those studied. In recent years, bypass surgery has increasingly been recommended for such patients, along with medicines to ease heart failure symptoms.

Concerns were raised when results after nearly five years of research showed about equal number of deaths in bypass patients and in those who got only medicine, despite fewer heart-related deaths in the bypass group. Those findings were published in 2011.

The 10-year results were published online Sunday in the New England Journal of Medicine and presented at an American College of Cardiology meeting in Chicago.

The study involved 1,200 heart failure patients in 22 countries, including the United States. Most were men around age 60 when the study began. All were taking heart medicines, and about half were assigned to also get bypass surgery.

More than half the patients in each group lived beyond the study's first phase. The 10-year results are a look back at all patients studied.

A total of 359 bypass patients died from any cause, or about 59 percent, compared with 398 medicine-only patients who died, or 66 percent. Deaths from heart disease-related causes totaled 247 in the bypass group, or 41 percent, versus 297 medicine-only patients, or 49 percent.

A journal editorial published with the study says that the latest results "solidly support" strengthening treatment guidelines to say that bypass surgery is "probably beneficial" for these patients.

The long-term results "are very encouraging" and
