In 1964, Governor John A. Burns created by Executive Order the Hawai‘i State Commission on the Status of Women (CSW or Commission). The work of the CSW is detailed in section 367-1, Hawai‘i Revised Statutes (HRS) and sections 367-3 (1) through (8), HRS. This report details the CSW's events, programs, conferences, and activities during State fiscal year (SFY) 2020-2021 amid the second year of the COVID-19 pandemic. Note that in this year's events and programs section, items were not disaggregated by island due to the digital nature of the majority of events, although specific neighbor island programs are described.

V. National Advocacy and Legislation

Patriarchy is metastatic so women's advocacy must be simultaneously tackled globally, nationally and locally. Section 367, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, recognizes the hyper globalization of systemic sexism by requiring an active engagement by the Commission at the county, national and global levels. To fulfill this mission, HSCSW:

1. Testified before United States Congress on the state of women in Hawai'i and the gender pay gap;
2. Provided consultancy to various U.S. states, national non-profit organizations, universities, and grassroots organizations on women's rights;
3. Provided public trainings on women's political organizing, women's leadership development, and gender based violence prevention to various U.S. states, national non-profit organizations, universities, and grassroots organizations on women's rights.

VI. Recommendations

A. Pass Legislation that Implements Hawai'i's Feminist Economic Recovery

The Hawai'i feminist economic recovery plan from 2020 recommended a broad range of policies to correct backsliding on women's rights during the pandemic. No plan of this magnitude can be institutionalized into law and government in one year. Legislators and electeds at the State and County level should continue to support community proposals for Legislation in 2022, especially since all four county councils passed Legislation committing to executing a feminist recovery plan:

- Equal employment for mahu. Transgender women struggle to find decent, dignified, living wage jobs and safe workplaces. Social service providers report that trans women in the hospitality industry were forced to return to prostitution as a result of the pandemic job crisis;
- Pass the Bodies Back Model on the sex trade, which enables sustainable exit and healing from systems of sexual violence. Establish a support system that prioritizes economic empowerment for women who cannot easily exit the sex trade, regardless of how they entered;
- End the commodification of land and change definitions of affordable housing. Women who do not own property and struggle to remain housed in Hawai'i due to rising rent costs;
- Provide universal, free access to menstrual supplies for all women and marginalized genders who need to menstruate;
- Develop policy around the needs of single mothers;
- Undocumented immigrant women;
- Disrupt the pipeline of runaway Native Hawaiian girls and missing women;
- Improve conditions for incarcerated women, decrease incarceration for women;
- Shift the state's plan on gender based violence to a prevention and education model for men and boys;
- Create a movement incubator for women. Women and girls' "issues" are often sacrificed or unseen by funders and decision-makers, which indicates a lack of political will, knowledge, and interest in prioritizing feminism. Hawai'i needs a school and center for women and girls to develop skills to lead their communities, build power, and shift the political winds toward feminism

B. Fiscal Support for the Missing and Murdered Native Hawaiian Women and Girls Taskforce

The disappearance of Ariel Pilialoha Sellers, a Native Hawaiian girl misidentified as white, is currently top of mind across the government and community. Although Ariel's tragic case is framed as "shocking," it bears similarities to the life patterns of other missing and murdered women and girls in Hawai'i. There are concerns that Ariel may have been impacted by poor system responses to child abuse and missing persons, including bias in law enforcement alleged by HPD whistleblower Maile Rego. Thankfully, the 2022 Legislature created the Missing and Murdered Native Hawaiian Women and Girls Taskforce to systematically investigate government and community responses to gender-based violence against Native Hawaiians. The taskforce deliverables include a preliminary report to the Legislature in 2022 and a final report of findings and recommendations in December 2023. The following are an example of data variables that the report will hopefully include:

- Number of unattended female deaths. Unattended means further inquiry is needed to

- determine if any suspicious circumstances;
- Female homicide victims;
- Female runaways from JSS even though they are not considered missing persons by CID;
- Female adult missing persons from CID;
- Female suspected/alleged trafficking victims from Vice;
- Female confirmed trafficking victims;
- Number of taskforce members trained in how and why to ask for race & indigeneity;
- Rate of repeat runaways;
- Percentage of runaways from Hawaiian Homelands;
- Customers/buyers seen per day by trafficked women;
- Number of violent assaults on trafficked and prostituting women per week;
- Arrests for prostitution and commercial sexual exploitation;
- Race and zip code of sex buyers.

Unfortunately, the task force was not funded at inception. Both CSW and OHA feel there is an urgent need for funding to hire a full-time researcher because neither agency has the capacity to undertake an investigation at the scale and depth needed due to short staffing. A full-time researcher will be able to fully identify what data is needed, where data is housed, how the group can access data, establish protocols for survivor and family interviews, create data sharing agreements, and execute a state-wide qualitative data-gathering plan.
