A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII YOUTH CONSERVATION CORPS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

	1	SECTION 1.	The	legislature	finds	that	Hawaii	went	fro

- 2 having one of the lowest unemployment rates of any state in the
- United States to one of the highest, leaving many skilled and 3
- promising young people out of work. Given the impact that 4
- 5 prolonged youth unemployment can have on the lifetime earnings
- 6 and well-being of individuals, the limited work opportunities
- 7 for youth and young adults require action on the part of the
- 8 State.
- 9 The legislature further finds that the Civilian
- 10 Conservation Corps was a work relief program created in 1933 to
- 11 employ Americans during the Great Depression through
- 12 conservation projects of local, state, and national benefit,
- 13 providing opportunities for displaced young adults.
- 14 of Hawaii established the Hawaii youth conservation corps, which
- 15 provided young people with opportunities in conservation on a
- 16 much smaller scale. This program currently operates within the
- 17 policies set out under chapter 193, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

- 1 Conservation Corps continues through local and state service and
- 2 conservation corps, especially those accredited under the
- 3 national corps network.
- 4 The legislature also finds that during the regular session
- 5 of 2020, the legislature passed Act 9, Session Laws of Hawaii
- 6 2020 (Act 9), which used funds designated for the State by the
- 7 federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act to
- 8 establish a workforce and training program that, among other
- 9 accomplishments, funded a short-term green jobs program in
- 10 partnership with the nonprofit Kupu. Under the Kupu Aina Corps,
- 11 over three hundred fifty displaced workers and recent graduates
- 12 were matched with work and training opportunities across the
- 13 State. Kupu's partnership with conservation and agricultural
- 14 host sites enabled individuals to work in their own communities
- 15 while also giving back to Hawaii's economy and environment.
- 16 The legislature additionally finds that more must be done
- in order to support the diversification of Hawaii's economy, but
- 18 that the program established under part XV of Act 9 is no longer
- 19 active.
- 20 The purpose of this Act is to enable the same benefits of
- 21 the workforce program under Act 9 in terms of economic

- 2 adults, and placing it within an existing, permanent program
- 3 established in law under the administration of the agency most

- 9 SECTION 2. Section 193-32, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

- 14 the department of land and natural resources, or any
- other state department or departments as the state

9		to administer or enter into an agreement or agreements
10		for the administration of a green job youth corps
11		program that provides temporary work and training
12		opportunities in one or more of the following fields:

15		sustainability professions. The program shall
16		prioritize work and training opportunities for young

	respect to the programs or any other proportion of the
	costs of the programs, which may be required by the
	applicable laws of the United States, out of any
	moneys appropriated to the department or departments
	designated to participate in the programs, without
	regard to the original purpose of the
	appropriations[-]; and
(4)	Designate the department of land and natural resources
	to administer or enter into an agreement for the
	administration of a green jobs youth corps to provide
	temporary work and training opportunities in one or
	more of the following fields:
	(A) Natural resource management;
	(B) Agriculture; or
	(C) Other sustainability-related professions;
	provided that these opportunities shall be available
	to young adults who are thirty-eight years of age or
	younger; provided further that the department shall
	partner with an organization that received

2	experience providing similar programming statewide in
3	the State, or both."
4	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
5	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$5,000,000 or so much
6	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for the
7	green jobs youth corps as provided in this Act; provided that
8	the sum appropriated shall be used only for the payment of
9	salaries for not more than one thousand participants with
10	experience in the green jobs youth corps for a period of nine to
11	twelve months, subject to sufficient funds; provided further
12	that notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the department of
13	land and natural resources and its partner or partners shall be
14	permitted to obtain and utilize federal or other outside funding
15	for the purpose of matching state funds provided for the green
16	jobs youth corps.
17	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
18	land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.
19	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
20	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
21	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2022.
